## **Domestic Violence Numbers for the Past Five State Fiscal Years**

State Fiscal Year (SFY) = July 1 of first year listed through June 30 of second year listed

You will notice a significant change in the numbers for SFYs 2019-2020 and 2020-2021. More than half of the DV programs had to relocate to hotels/motels due to the Coronavirus pandemic. Only a few have relocated back to their shelters. The service contacts were conducted face to face; however, with the pandemic services started being delivered virtually. Those shelters that did not relocate along with the ones relocating back to the shelters are/will operate at 50% capacity per federal regulations during this crisis.
