CONFIDENTIALITY

Sharing family photos and stories is a normal part of

life, but similar to other things, there are rules.

Take care you do not tell others about your foster child's placement or placement details to friends, family, or other individuals who have had control of the foster children, other than to professionals treating, caring for, and providing services for the children as SCDS or the licensed child placing agency deems appropriate.

SCDSS Regulations

Section W - Confidentiality Statutes:

- (1) No foster family or adoptive placement homestra directly or indirectly disclose any information regarding foster children, their biological families, or other individuals who have had control of the foster children, other than to professionals treating, caring for, and providing services for the children as SCDS or the licensed child placing agency deems appropriate.
- (2) No foster family or adoptive placement homestra post identifying information about foster children placed in their homes, including pictures on any closed or open social media group. Schools, daycares, and other extracurricular or childcare services may post pictures of foster children with permission from the agency.
- (3) Information about a foster child that is disclosed shall be limited to information that is necessary to provide for the child's needs and in the best interests.



Emergency Situations with Children in Foster Care

- For emergency situations use the below order of contact:
 - Immediate health and safety concerns of child or others: contact 911.
 - Emergency, but not immediate health and safety concerns, during business hours: Contact case manager or supervisor
 - If you cannot reach the case management team, or if switching offices are needed, contact the regional placement unit for your child's managing county and the make out-of-county has proceeded. Information for each region is below.
 - If you cannot reach the regional placement team contact the Intake Hub at 843-3487.



STANDARD OF NORMAL PAYMENT (CNP)

SC DSS offers CNP access to clients who have been determined eligible for benefits. To Access:

- 1. Go to www.dss.sc.gov.
- 2. Click "My Account" and "Access CNP".
- 3. Enter your ID number and password.
- 4. Click "Log In".
- 5. Access CNP using a tablet, iPad, desktop or laptop computer.
- 6. You can log in from anywhere you can get to your car.
