Assistance with transportation and housing is available, but we want to be sure that your decision to move is a good one for you and your family. By answering the following questions, we can better assist you in your decision.

To accept a job.

### WHAT SHOULD YOU CONSIDER

IF YOU CHOOSE TO RELOCATE? ANSWER THE FOLLOWING QUESTIONS.

- 1. Have I been unable to get a job in my home community?
- 2. How would my children be affected in a new community? Would the schools be better in the new location?
- 3. Do I have friends or relatives in the new location who could assist me in finding housing and getting a job?
- What social services are available in the new community? Would I still get Medicaid and Food Stamps? How much does a welfare family receive while they are in training or looking for a job in th new location?

- 5. What is the unemployment rate in the new community? Is there an active job development program for welfare recipients?
- Does the new community have a good transportation system that could help me get to work and back home?
- 7. Are there libraries and parks nearby?

# WHAT KIND OF HELP CAN I EXPECT IN MY NEW LOCATION?

Housing- Housing assistance is available in South Carolina and in other states.

DSS can help with rental deposits and your first month's rent, as well as transportation to your new home and even additional money to get you started.

Money To help you get started, all states offer Food Stamps and other financial assistance as well as Medicaid and child care, if you qualify.

Education- All states have basic education and literacy programs at little or no cost. Technical schools and colleges can help you apply for financial aid.

Employment Opportunities- Better employment opportunities in other communities may suit your interest and abilities.

My name is Sylvia

Yarborough. I am a single mom

with three children. When I was growing up in Winnsboro, I saw my mother beaten down trying to work two jobs and raise six children while receiving welfare. At 19, I found myself a single mom with two children and pretty much in the same situation.

Today my life is changed, thanks to a new DSS program called **Family Independence Relocation Assistance**. It all began when my caseworker told me about how the Bright Futures program trains welfare recipients to become correctional officers.

Due to Winnsboro's high jobless rate, I knew my best chance for job training and employment was outside my hometown. When I learned Perry Correctional Institution in Pelzer, South Carolina paid 12 percent more because of a shortage of workers, I immediately volunteered.
