Michael D. Katz, PharmD (R75), clinical professor and director of Residency and International Programs at the R. Ken Coit University of Arizona College of Pharmacy, has been named the 2024 recipient of the prestigious Paul F. Parker Award. This honor, which recognizes significant contributions to the advancement of pharmacy practice, education, and leadership, will be presented at the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP) Midyear Meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana.

The Paul F. Parker Award honors individuals with a University of Kentucky pharmacy residency background or a strong connection to the UK program. Awardees demonstrate exceptional dedication to the pharmacy profession through practice, research, and education. Dr. Katz's career embodies Parker's ideals of leadership, commitment to excellence, and mentorship, impacting pharmacy professionals both in the U.S. and internationally.

With a career spanning over four decades, Dr. Katz has substantially contributed to pharmacy education and clinical practice. Since joining the University of Arizona, he has built a legacy as a clinical educator and practitioner in internal medicine, particularly within underserved communities. His early experience with the Indian Health Service deeply influenced his advocacy for accessible, high-quality healthcare. Katz's dedication to training future pharmacists has earned him numerous awards, including multiple University of Arizona Teacher of the Year honors. He is also known for his international contributions to clinical pharmacy. As co-chair of the U.S.-Thai Pharmacy Consortium and a commissioner with the ACPE International Commission, he has promoted pharmacy education globally. His efforts have guided students and faculty in Thailand, Saudi Arabia, and Japan, creating transformative partnerships and training programs that align with Parker's vision of a globally inclusive pharmacy profession.

The official presentation of the Paul F. Parker Award is scheduled for Tuesday, December 10th at the ASHP Midyear Meeting. Congratulations to Dr. Katz and thank you for all that you have done and continue to do!

PGY1 COMMUNITY-BASED RESIDENCY AT SPECIALTY PHARMACY

In June 2024, the University of Kentucky launched a new PGY1 Community-Based Pharmacy Residency program specializing in Specialty Pharmacy. The goal of the program is to provide the necessary training to produce a specialty pharmacy practitioner capable of pursuing roles in a variety of specialty pharmacy practice settings.

The UK HealthCare Specialty Pharmacy offers comprehensive services tailored for patients with complex or chronic conditions that require specialized medications. The pharmacy provides personalized care, including medication counseling, coordination with healthcare providers, and assistance with insurance and financial support. The specialty pharmacy serves patients across 6 states and fosters collaboration across more than 40 clinics in over 30 therapeutic categories.

The PGY1 Community-Based Specialty Pharmacy resident completes a variety of required learning experiences in medication therapy management, pharmacy patient support services, specialty infusion, and specialty pharmacy leadership and operations. Elective rotations include both call center practice and clinic practice experience in a wide range of therapeutic areas including cardiology, gastroenterology, infectious disease, neurology, oncology, pulmonary, rheumatology, and transplant. The resident also completes longitudinal experiences in operational staffing, research, and teaching.

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NEW PROGRAM FEATURE

PGY2 INFECTIOUS DISEASES – PEDIATRICS

The University of Kentucky is announcing a new pediatric track that will complement the established and accredited ID PGY2 residency program. The goal of the program is to cultivate leading clinicians with specialized pediatric infectious disease knowledge and to develop a sustainable pediatric-focused ID PGY2 pharmacy residency program prepared to educate, challenge, and mold future leaders.

Children are one of the greatest consumers of antibiotics globally, representing a vulnerable and frequently overlooked population in need of enhanced stewardship efforts led by infectious diseases (ID) experts with specialized training. Currently, only three pediatric-focused ID pharmacy residencies exist in the country, resulting in a deficiency of trained pediatric ID pharmacy specialists.

The University of Kentucky HealthCare is ecstatic to announce the expansion of our ID PGY2 residency program to include a new dedicated Pediatric ID track, becoming the fourth program in the country to offer specialized pediatric ID training. This expansion is all thanks to funding awarded by the Society of Infectious Diseases Pharmacists (SIDP).

The pediatric-focused ID program is designed to prepare residents for advanced practice in a wide range of ID career settings with several months dedicated to pediatric infectious diseases, including specialized rotations, mentorship, and unique clinical experiences that align closely with pediatric patient care.

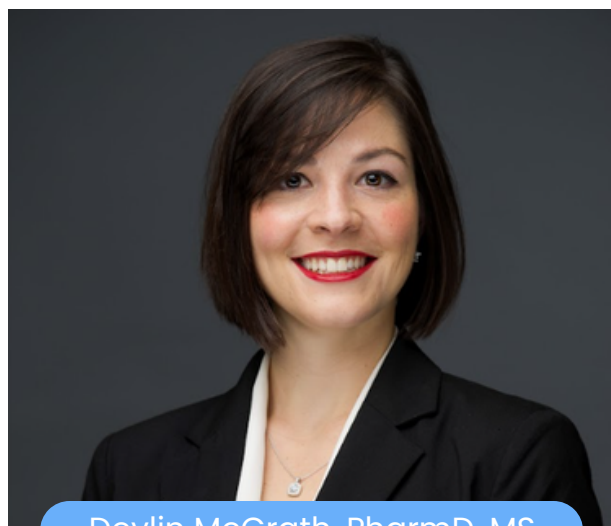
NEW SENIOR DIRECTOR OF ACUTE CARE SERVICES

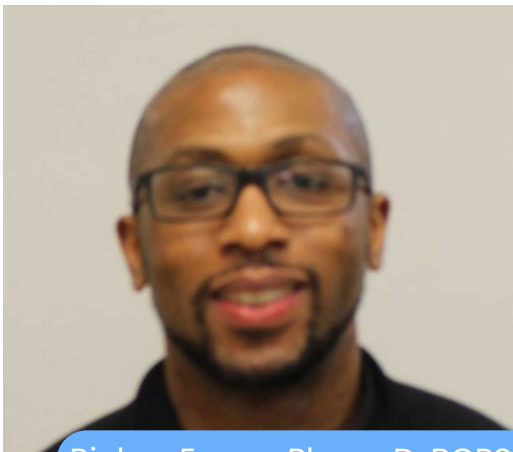
UKHC Chandler Medical Center PGY1 Acute Care Assistant Residency Program Director

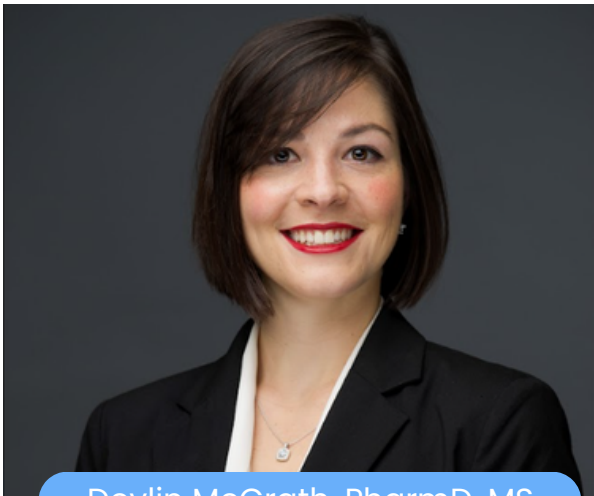

MEMPHIS, TN

In November 2024, the PGY2 residents and preceptor, Katie Ruf, PharmD, MBA (R369), traveled to Tennessee to visit the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, Regional One Health, Methodist University Hospital and Le Bonheur Children's Hospital. On the first day, pediatric and hematology/oncology residents traveled to St. Jude Children's Hospital and learned about their research process, pharmacist call program, and antimicrobial stewardship initiatives.

Other PGY2 residents visited Regional One Health and toured the city's burn unit at the largest Level 1 trauma center in the city of Memphis. The morning was spent observing pharmacists on multidisciplinary rounds in their respective specialties. Then, the group wrapped up the day by joining back together and sharing a delicious BBQ lunch with the pharmacy team at Regional One Health.



The next day, residents had the pleasure of visiting Methodist University Hospital (MUH) and rounded with clinical pharmacist specialists. MUH has an expanded scope of practice document in writing that is approved by the CMO and physicians across the healthcare system to allow pharmacists to practice at the top of their licenses. Our pediatric PGY2 residents visited Le Bonheur Children’s Hospital where they provide neurosurgery services and elevated care (e.g. ECMO) to pediatric patients. Critical care encompasses a large focus of patient care at Le Bonheur Children’s Hospital with over half of their beds dedicated to their NICU/PICU/CVIVU.



Not only did PGY2 residents have the opportunity to see a variety of practice sites, but also explore the city of Memphis, TN downtime. Residents visited the 10th wonder of the world, the Bass Pro Pyramid, and dined at a variety of local spots. The favorite restaurant experience was “Flight”, where the theme of dining was ordering everything in the form of a flight - from beverages, to entrees, to desserts, and everything in between! It was a wonderful trip full of networking and resident bonding. MELANIE LAINE, PHARMD, BCCCP (R434)

Dr. Melanie Laine is a current Critical Care Pharmacist in the Medical ICU at UK HealthCare. Originally from Sugar Land, TX, she obtained her Bachelor's degree in Biology from Texas A&M University and her PharmD from the University of Houston. She completed her post-graduate residency training at UK HealthCare, where she specialized in critical care and is currently board certified in critical care pharmacy (BCCCP). Although she never thought she would call anywhere but Texas home, Lexington quickly captured her heart, and was eager to stay on at UK HealthCare post-residency.

WHAT IS THE MOST REWARDING THING ABOUT BEING A PRECEPTOR AT THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY?

"So many things! But I would say the most rewarding is seeing residents develop and grow in their confidence. MICU is a selective rotation for PGY1s, a required rotation for CC PGY2s, and an elective for several PGY2 programs, so I have the privilege of precepting residents with different degrees of experience, confidence, and interest in critical care. The MICU can be intimidating, and seeing residents on Day 1 with emotions ranging from panic to excitement, and then finishing the month with a positive experience and a new "swagger" is the best part of my job."

"Your 80% is still better than others' 110%." I guess this is a variation of "perfect is the enemy of good," but as a crippling perfectionist, this piece of advice during PGY2 year was a stark realization that I can't give 110% to everything that I do. As a clinical pharmacist, you are constantly pulled in different directions, and the ability to use your resources and complete tasks efficiently are the keys to success and work life balance."

WHAT IS THE BEST PIECE OF ADVICE YOU HAVE EVER RECEIVED?

WHAT ADVICE DO YOU HAVE FOR RESIDENTS WHO ARE ASPIRING PRECEPTORS?

“Be patient, open, and understanding. Every learner is starting from their own baseline, and their progress is more important than your expectations of them. Be open to different styles of precepting based on learner needs, and when they begin to develop their own ideas and clinical intuition, let go of your preferences and let the plan play out (if it is safe, of course). Lastly, although residency is naturally challenging, always do a periodic mental check in with your learners and yourself. The emotional aspect of patient care, mortality, teaching, and extracurriculars inevitably takes its toll, and you cannot be your best version of a teacher, pharmacist, and human if you don't recognize when you need a break to take care of yourself.”

WHAT IS THE HARDEST PART OF PRECEPTING?

“Recognizing when learners are smarter than you and acknowledging when you are wrong! When you reach the marathon phase of your career, so much of your practice will start to run on autopilot. Although we are natural, lifelong learners, we may not realize in real-time when our knowledge is outdated, or practice-style antiquated. Having learners on rotation has conditioned me to question what I know, and if it is still applicable or accurate. More importantly, how you handle these realizations will be a life lesson to your learner. For example, if a resident asks a question that you do not know the answer to, do you act like you know and have them look it up and report back? Or do you acknowledge the knowledge gap, and plan to work through it together once you look it up individually? It's important to recognize that the example we set for learners on a daily basis will inevitably impact their growth and development as a healthcare professional and future mentor to others.”

Outside of her clinical pharmacy practice, Dr. Laine is a self-described “elder millennial homebody who spends all of my time with my handsome partner and pups!” She is a die-hard college football and Bengals fan, an avid gym-goer, and does her best to enjoy 1–2 beach vacations a year because, as she puts it, “snow is for polar bears, not people.” She is grateful for the leap of faith that brought her to Lexington and for the chance UK took on her.
