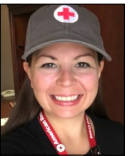

I enjoy situational awareness because it helps paint a picture of what we are currently facing or may be facing in the near term.

It's hard to make effective decisions without understanding the big picture, whatever that may be. I produce a weekly report during flood and wildfire seasons based on forecast weather. A good week produces a boring report.

FUN FACT: I am a huge tax nerd. I actually enjoy reading tax code. Last winter I became an Enrolled Agent, which authorizes me to practice before the IRS with CPAs and tax attorneys.

Once donor, now a driver

For 35 years, Vic Paul was a loyal blood donor. Now the amazing 90-year-old delivers blood to Boise-area hospitals

After decades of donating blood to the Red Cross, Vic Paul now spends his time in a different chair, the driver's seat, as he delivers these lifesaving products to those who need it most. As a Red Cross volunteer transportation specialist, Vic drives blood from the donation center in Boise to Idaho hospitals. He's made these deliveries for 28 years — an amazing accomplishment made even more impressive by the fact Vic recently turned 90.

"I just grab onto every day I can now," he said.

At his doctor's suggestion, Vic stopped donat-

ing blood when he was in his late 70s after more than three decades — "I quit counting at 35 years" — and found another way to give back. He started by intermittently hauling donated blood products in Red Cross refrigerated vans, and those short runs eventually evolved into regular long-haul deliveries to and from places like La Grande, Ore.

Now his main routes are what he considers quick trips around Boise, Nampa and Caldwell.

Even before the Red Cross, Vic had lots of experience making important shipments. While with the U.S. Army, his duties included delivering tanks.

"I wasn't shipped overseas. ... But I did see time in the Mojave training soldiers to be tank drivers, and some of them had never even driven a car," Vic said.

In his professional life, he examined commer-

cial insurance policies and graded insurance policies for municipalities. He retired at 62.

Vic is also a Red Cross Service to the Armed Forces volunteer and the Red Cross veterans affairs voluntary services representative at the VA hospital in Boise.

Vic said though he drives alone, his Red Cross work has connected him with a great group of volunteers, a group he hopes will continue to grow.

"We are always looking for office help or drivers," Vic said. "I try to speak with all the able and interested and tell them that the best

part of Red Cross volunteering is being part of the camaraderie. It's a great crew."

Transportation specialists needed

The Red Cross needs more people like Vic to deliver lifesaving blood. Though these positions are currently filled in Idaho, there are opportunities in Montana. Once blood drives have ended in Kalispell, Missoula, Helena and Bozeman, volunteers drive blood products to Great Falls for processing and distribution. Each week the Red Cross of Idaho and Montana compiles a situational awareness report with information about potential disasters.

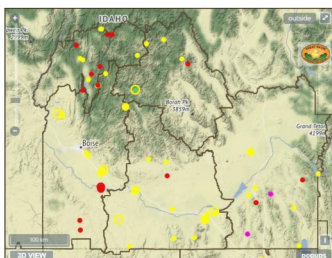
Information includes a look at the weekly regional fire risk, current fire activity in Montana and Idaho and a summer fire outlook for the whole country.
