# ALASKA REGION

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Blizzard of 1983

At 12:45 P.M. on Friday, February 11, 1983, it began to snow in the New York area. It continued overnight until 9:40 A.M. on the 12th dumping 17.6 inches of snow in the New York Central Park area. The blizzard was accompanied by a thunderstorm during the snowfall. The wind was gusting over 40 MPH causing high drifts with temperatures below freezing with the result that the wind-chill factor felt about 20 degrees below zero. Vehicles were stranded on highways and side roads. All local airports were closed. In the New York Kennedy Airport area, it began snowing at 1:03 PM on the 11th and stopped at 9:11 AM on the 12th after 21.7 inches had fallen.

Request for Information

Your assistance is requested to help NOAA develop a comprehensive listing of all sources of climate data available throughout the nation. This listing will become part of the National Environmental Data Referral Service (NEDRES), which is designed so that anyone needing climate information will be able to find out very easily who has the type of data he or she needs.

The information you send, as official observers, to the National Climatic Data Center (NCDC) has already been placed in NEDRES and will be available through NCDC, so no action is needed concerning your own observations.

However, you are in a unique position, and probably know of people or institutions in your own area who take observations which are not "official" in the sense that yours are. Often it is very difficult for us to find out about these people, and they may have just the information that someone is looking for. I would appreciate it if you could take a few moments to jot down names and addresses of such observers (check with them first if necessary) and send a note or postcard to me:

John was presented the Holm Award for more than 14 years of continuous and exceptional public service.

John, a U.S. Customs official and postmaster, is also the official river and ice observer. In addition, John maintains a Fischer-Porter Recording Rain Gage for the FC-1 program and provides unofficial aviation observations for the aircraft flying into Eagle.

The presentation committee, comprised of Stuart Bigler (Director), Edward Misiewicz (Cooperative Program Section), and David MacFarlane (Hydro Tech and Pilot), were forced to divert to the Gulkana Airport on the return trip to Anchorage because of low clouds, snow and fog. After spending the night in Glennallen, the trio was able to complete the trip later the next day.

A new climate station was established at Palmer 12 NNW, at the Killybegs Mountain Lodge near Independence Mine/Hatcher Pass State Park. We have added the climate program to the aviation contract station at the Nenana Airport with Delyle Rice O'Neil as the principal observer. The aviation contract station and FC-1 station at McCarthy was relocated across the river and reopened. The new observers are the Rick Kenyon family. A new aviation contract station and climate program was established at Cantwell on the Parks Highway. The observer is Patricia Goble, a former Weather Service employee.

With winter on its way and the year coming to an end, the holiday season will soon be here. The National Weather Service Headquarters staff wishes to thank each of our observers for their contribution in collecting and recording climate data in our state. We wish all our friends and members of the cooperative weather networks a very Merry Christmas and prosperous New Year. We are looking forward to many more years of joint participation in the cooperative weather program.

### John Campanius Holm Awards

Lydia Wisner, Campbells Ferry, ID, was presented the John Campanius Holm Award for more than 25 years of service.

Mrs. Wisner has rarely missed taking an observation in a quarter of a century. She lives alone in a log cabin in the remote Salmon River Canyon which can only be reached by plane or boat.

In addition to her official duties with the NWS, Mrs. Wisner supplies the Forest Service with observations during dry, fire-weather season.

Margaret S. Plummer, Martinez, CA, was presented the John Campanius Holm Award for more than 31 years of continuous and exceptional public service.

Mrs. Plummer, a retired fruit rancher, also supplies the local media with her observations and acts as the local authority on Martinez's weather and climate.

She is a member of the American Association of University Women and belongs to the Historical Society.

Leslie F. Bushby of Richfield, ID, was presented the John Campanius Holm Award for 33 years of service.

Mr. Bushby, despite severe arthritis, has never missed taking an observation in more than a third of a century. Even under severe weather conditions, with temperatures dipping well below zero, Mr. Bushby has been able to maintain highly accurate and consistent reports.

In addition to his official duties with the NWS, Mr. Bushby daily reports his weather observations to the local media, farmers and ranchers.

### Thomas Jefferson Award

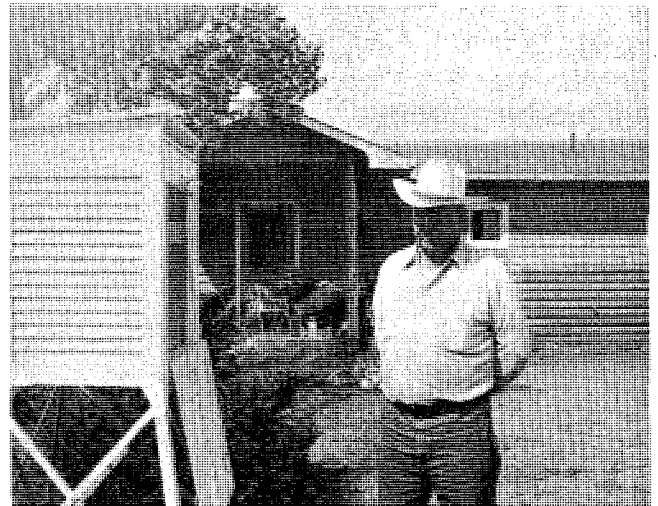
Ella L. Albrecht of Buston, OR, received the Thomas Jefferson Award for more than 39 years of service.

Mrs. Albrecht's valuable observations are vital to NOAA's river and flood forecast and warnings program. Her reports of the Tualatin River basin help warn her community of flooding.

In addition to her official duties as a volunteer observer, Mrs. Albrecht, a homemaker, provides daily and weekly precipitation reports to local newspapers in Hillsboro and Forest Grove, OR.

Roland Getchell of Fontana, CA, was awarded a 30-year pin by Art Lessard, MIC, WSFO Los Angeles. Mr. Getchell is 88 years old and he indicated that he would like to keep taking observations until he is 100.

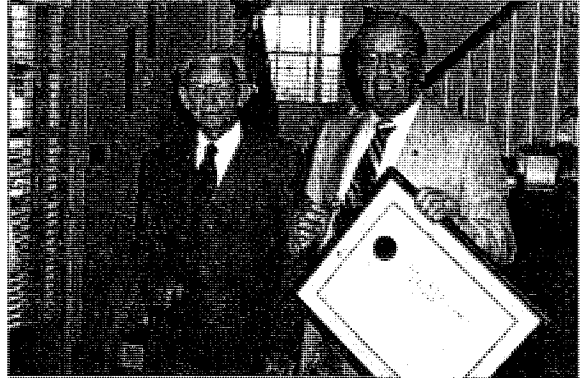

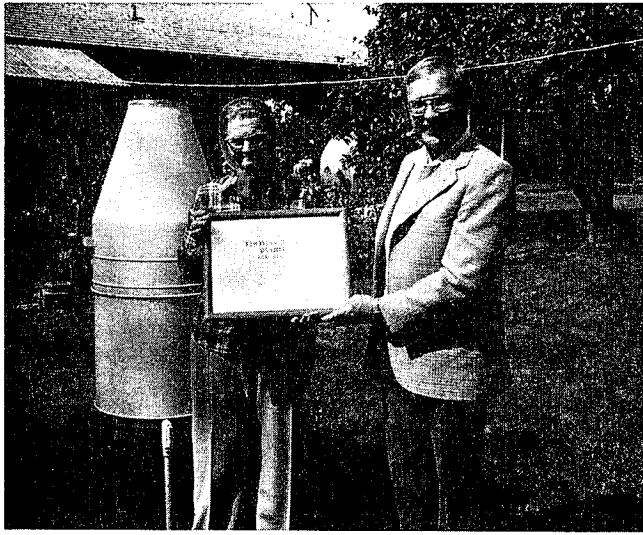

Ella Albrecht of Buxton, OR, was awarded a 40-year pin and the Thomas Jefferson Award by George Miller, AM, Portland, OR.

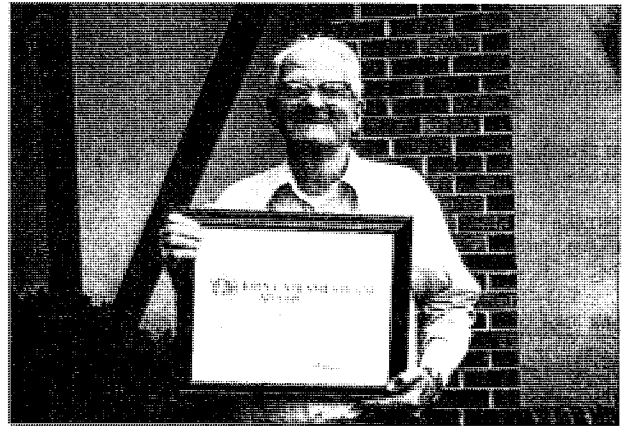

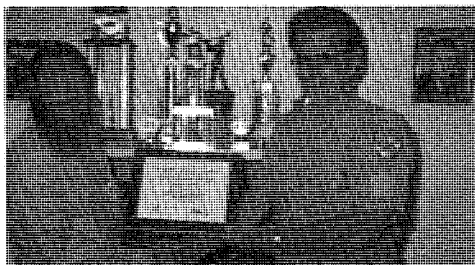

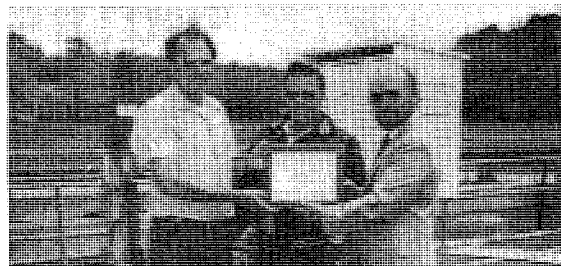
