In recognition of his long and outstanding record, Congressman William Carney presented the Edward H. Stoll Award to Richard G. Hendrickson, Cooperative Observer at Bridgehampton, NY on Saturday July 20, 1985.

This award was named for the Elwood, NB farmer who was a cooperative observer for more than 70 years.

This award is given to any cooperative observer who has completed 50 years of continuous service.

In 1975, Mr. Hendrickson received the Thomas Jefferson Award. Each year this award is presented to approximately five of the most outstanding Cooperative Weather Observers in the United States.

Those so honored are selected from the more than 21,000 observers who devote so much time and effort to recording the climate of this country.

This NWS award for "unusual and outstanding" achievements in recording weather observations was named for President Jefferson who began taking weather observations in 1766 and maintained a virtually unbroken record through 1816.

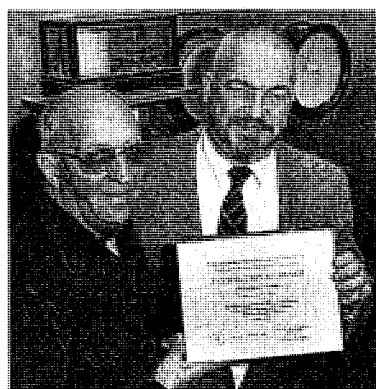

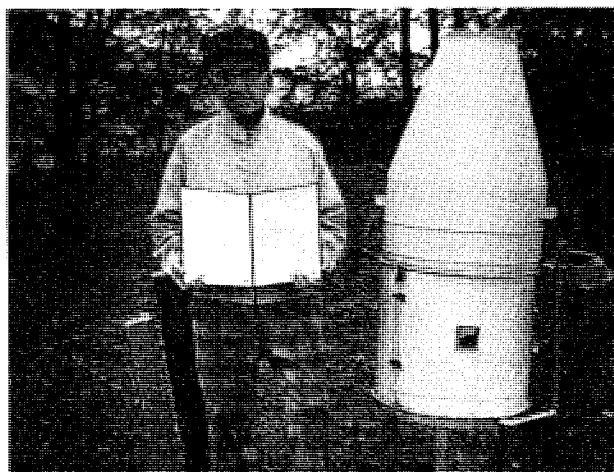


A. Ralph Taylor, observer, Montrose, PA was presented the John Campanius Holm award.

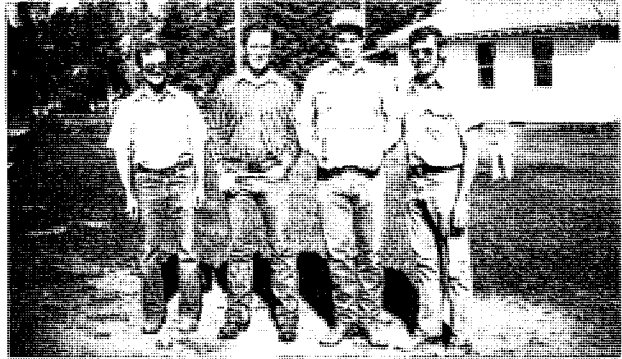

Pat LaFlamme, observer, Broadus, MT was presented a 20-year length-of-service award. Pat also takes aviation observations as part of the SAWRS program.

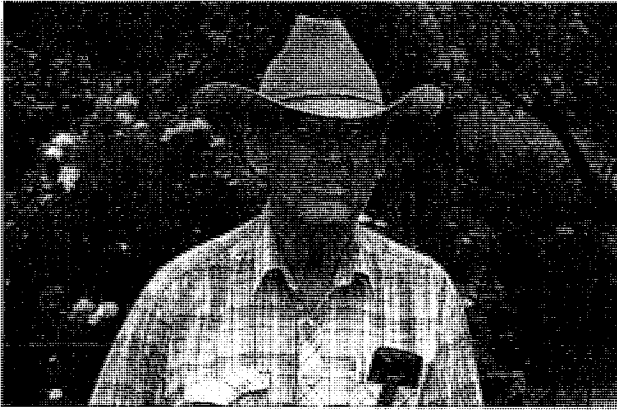

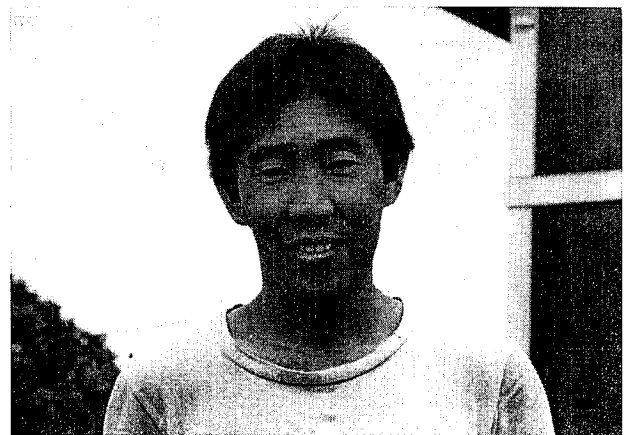

Since the last copy of the newsletter a new aviation and climate station was opened at Savoonga on St. Lawrence Island in the Bering Sea. Additional climate stations were opened at Mirrow Lake Scout Camp northeast of Anchorage, Shageluk in southwest Alaska, Old Harbor on the southeast coast of Kodiak Island, and Larsen Bay on the southwest coast of Kodiak Island. The station at Kake in southeast Alaska should be reactivated by the end of February.

We are still receiving some of the climate forms too late for publication. The forms should be mailed after the 1st of the month. At many locations it will be impossible to keep this schedule because of the weather and remote areas.

Another reminder that the time of observation should be entered at the top of the climate form along with the time zone.

Last fall at the beginning of the snow season, funnels on the recording rain gages were removed as well as the collectors and measuring tubes on the non-recording rain gages. These items were removed for the winter. When the snow season is over and there is no chance for freezing temperatures to occur, the funnel should be attached to the top part of the recording rain gage and the collector and measuring tube should be assembled with the 8-inch overflow can.

I hope to visit many of the climate stations this summer, unless travel restrictions are imposed.

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
