State, private, and other non-Federal forests make up 92 percent of the 176 million acres of forests across the 20 states of the Northeast and Midwest. The U.S. Forest Service and state forestry agencies collaborate with other partners on shared stewardship goals, which also support each State Forest Action Plan. The State, Private, and Tribal Forestry programs promote the health, resilience, and productivity of trees and forests across all ownerships for the benefit of people and wildlife; establish and manage urban and community forests; empower private landowners with information and technical assistance to sustainably manage their forests; and protect critically important rural forests and watersheds.

Program Highlights

Cooperative Fire Protection

State Fire Assistance funding was used to treat 2,095 acres in 24 separate fuels reduction projects. New Jersey was awarded a \$300,000 Wildfire Risk Reduction Grant to build prescribed fire capacity and treat hazardous fuels within the urban interface. Training was provided to 1,090 State and local firefighters in wildland firefighting and incident management. Forty volunteer fire departments received funds to support wildland fire response. The State of New Jersey is helping communities develop Community Wildfire Assistance Grants through a \$200,000 grant to provide technical assistance.

Forest Health Protection

In 2023, the Department of Environmental Protection and Department of Forestry continued to actively monitor for new and established invasive species and found no introductions of oak wilt or thousand cankers disease. First detected in 2020, beech leaf disease continues to cause extensive leaf damage and was found in two new counties (Middlesex and Salem) for a total of 14 counties. New Jersey has established a network of permanent beech plots to assess damage caused by both beech leaf disease and beech bark disease. Forest damage observed by aerial surveys in New Jersey in 2023 was caused by spongy moth (15,902 acres), and an aerial application suppression program was conducted on 5,000 acres to suppress high spongy moth populations. In addition, individual-tree pesticide treatments were also applied to 200 ash trees at Liberty State Park to protect from emerald ash borer.

Forest Stewardship

The New Jersey Forest Service operates one forest tree nursery, located in Jackson. Through the Forest Stewardship program and National Reforestation, Nurseries, and Genetics Resource program, the State receives financial assistance to support nursery, genetics, and seed programs.

Landscape Scale Restoration

Grantee: National Association of Conservation Districts

Summary: This interagency, multi-partner collaboration advances science-based restoration of priority forest landscapes and protects water in 13 States across the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic. The project is also supported by the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians and includes focus on protecting water supplies for underserved communities and a climate markets work group. Regional collaboration will drive

alignment between the forest and water sectors and facilitate greater information sharing. Projects will result in measurable on-the-ground outcomes.

Urban and Community Forestry

New Jersey's Urban and Community Forestry program continued to provide grants to communities in 2023, with a total investment of over \$420,000 including State and local funding. The grants ranged from \$3,000 to over \$30,000 for projects including tree inventory/assessment, Community Forest Management Plan development, and tree planting. Volunteers contributed over 5,013 hours of service to urban and community forestry in the State. They gained knowledge and skills to support their local programs and services as shade tree board representatives who advise on and carry out urban and community forestry activities in their hometowns.

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
