# Climate Change

#### Problem to Be Solved

The climate crisis profoundly threatens the global economy, national security, global health, food security, and natural ecosystems. To avoid catastrophic damages, we must change the global emissions trajectory to limit global temperature rise to 1.5° Celsius and help hundreds of millions of people adapt to and manage the impacts of climate change.

#### What Success Looks Like

The United States, working in partnership with host country and international institutions, is a premier global provider of innovation, support, and solutions for emissions reductions and adaptation. Over the next two years, State and USAID will strategically assist partner countries to make major contributions to global efforts to mitigate climate change and adapt to and manage its impacts. This work will harness our diplomatic, development, and technical expertise and that of our partner agencies, and will drive implementation of the Paris Agreement and United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) commitments. Specifically, we focus on:

- 1. Implementing engagement strategies with clearly defined mitigation and/or adaptation objectives.
- 2. Driving countries to achieve high impact results that reflect significant new progress toward keeping a 1.5°C future within reach and/or strengthened resilience to climate impacts in line with the President's Emergency Plan for Adaptation and Resilience (PREPARE).
- 3. Supporting countries to develop and prepare to submit in 2025 updated and more ambitious nationally determined contributions (NDCs) in accordance with the Paris Agreement.
- 4. Enhancing the institutional frameworks and capacity for countries to deliver timely, high quality National Inventory Reports and Biennial Transparency Reports.



#### By September 30, 2025, State and USAID aim to combat global climate change by advancing:

- **Strategic Engagement:** The U.S. Government (USG) is actively implementing a climate engagement strategy in 60 countries with clearly defined mitigation and/or adaptation objectives. This builds on extensive work in FY 2022-2023 to increase global engagement and reflects a transition to sustained bilateral engagement with key countries.
- High Impact Results: USG diplomatic, technical, or financial support contributes to the achievement of 30 outcomes that reflect significant new progress toward keeping a 1.5°C future within reach and/or strengthened resilience to climate impacts in line with PREPARE. Building on FY 2022-2023 successes in strengthening and establishing new collaboration and implementation of USAID's Climate Strategy, this indicator reflects focus on delivering results through that work.
- Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs): USG technical, financial, or diplomatic support to 20 countries contributes to those countries developing and submitting updated and more ambitious NDCs in accordance with the Paris Agreement. As part of the Paris Agreement's five-year cycle, countries are due to submit updated NDCs in 2025.
- **Inventory and Transparency:** USG technical, financial, or diplomatic support contributes to 20 countries enhancing their institutional frameworks and capacity to deliver timely, high-quality National Inventory Reports and Biennial Transparency Reports. We initiated this work with 14 countries in FY 2022-2023 and will build on that progress during this cycle.

Bottom line up front: We are currently on track for our overall two-year targets.

#### Progress against Indicators 1, 3, and 4

- For Indicator 1 (Strategic Engagement), we are currently engaged with 63 countries, three more than
  our overall goal level. This is consistent with our expectations we established this indicator as a
  reality check to make sure we are sustaining active engagement with many countries, building on our
  engagements during the last APG cycle.
- For Indicator 3 (NDCs), we have identified six countries to which we are providing support to develop and submit more ambitious NDCs before the 2025 UNFCCC Conference of the Parties (COP30). We expect these numbers to continue to grow in Q3 and beyond as we begin to continue to ramp up engagement on this topic.
- For Indicator 4 (Inventory and Transparency), we provided support to two more countries in the first half of FY 2024, bringing our total to 16.

#### Milestones

- In Q2, we deployed a new system for tracking progress for this APG cycle and integrating into core policy processes, achieving our delayed Q1 milestone. We have developed a shared spreadsheet tool for tracking country-by-country progress and a methodology for adjudicating "what counts."
- Also, in Q2, we conducted a review of countries' current NDC status, which has already begun to inform our work on Indicator 3.


The Department of State and USAID work closely with several partner agencies to implement this APG, including the Department of Energy (DOE), Development Finance Corporation (DFC), Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Millennium Challenge Corporation (MCC), National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), National Oceanic and Atmospheric Agency (NOAA), the Department of Treasury, the Department of Agriculture (USDA), the Forest Service (USFS), and the Geological Survey (USGS). Agreements with partner agencies vary, and may include in-kind support, implementation support with funding, and other types of agreements. State and USAID leaders will guide coordinated climate engagement with priority countries that leverages the strength and expertise of each organization. State and USAID will integrate climate change considerations and objectives across foreign policy, development and humanitarian assistance.


- Strategic Engagement: State and USAID, in collaboration with other agencies, will review existing climate change engagement strategies and update their mitigation and adaptation objectives, as appropriate. Every six months, State and USAID will document and report on strategies that are being implemented with appropriate interagency coordination. State and USAID will develop and use a climate data hub to facilitate collecting data and reporting.
- High Impact Results: State and USAID will support partner countries to achieve tangible outcomes that help them reach their climate mitigation and adaptation targets and that encourage them to increase their climate ambition. After developing illustrative examples of high-impact results, State and USAID will use existing and updated communications and reporting processes (including annual Performance Plan and Reports [PPRs]) to track, document, and report on these results annually.
- NDCs: State and USAID will provide diplomatic, financial, and technical support to countries to help them develop, prepare, and submit updated, more ambitious and/or more comprehensive and transparent NDCs in accordance with the Paris Agreement and consistent with scientific recommendations to limit average global warming to no more than 1.5°C above pre-industrial mean temperatures. State and USAID will provide support through foreign assistance programs, multilateral programs, and bilateral programs.
- Inventory and Transparency: State and USAID will provide diplomatic, financial, and technical support to countries around the world to develop and improve reporting systems that will facilitate meeting the reporting requirements of the Paris Agreement Enhanced Transparency Framework. State and USAID facilitate building capacity and enhancing systems through multi-country programs like the Transparency Accelerator and tailored bilateral programs.
