## **Meet the New Chair of the HPRC Community Advisory Board**



# Adapted Training Expands Access to Depression Care for Older Adults



**The Program to Encourage Active, Rewarding Lives (PEARLS)** educates older adults about what depression is (and is not) and helps them develop the skills they need for self-sufficiency and more active lives. In order to better support accessibility and expand access to the program, the PEARLS team launched a new version of the PEARLS Coach Training that is fully remote and online. PEARLS coaches are the staff at community-based organizations who meet one-on-one with older adults to help them build the skills they need to live happier, healthier, and more independent lives.
