2	gentlemen. We are going to get the Tuesday, July 20 th ,
3	2021, Commission meeting underway.

3	Approval of the agenda for today.
4	I will make a motion to approve today's agenda.
5	COMMISSIONER GUESS: I'll second it.
6	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: All those in favor?
7	COMMISSIONER GUESS: Aye.
8	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: Aye.
9	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Aye.
10	Mr. Joe, it is all yours.
11	JOE SPRAGGINS: For some reason, or another, our
12	technical difficulty is happening every now and then.
13	First couple of things, we've got employment
14	contracts. If we can, we will bring them up.
15	You see on there we have Joanna Miller who is
16	our new Professional Accountant. She is taking Brandi's
17	place. Brandi has moved up into Shavay's place who
18	retired.
19	We've got Janie Bellew who is promoted to the
20	Lead Contract Analyst. She came to work with us about
21	seven, or eight, months ago as a contract analyst and,
22	now, she is the lead with that.
23	Will Freeman is promoted to Marine Patrol
24	Manager, Captain. Will has stepped up. It is good to
25	have more promotions inside.

1 Patrick Carron is promoted to Lieutenant as a 2 Marine Patrol supervisor. Alyssa Stoner is an intern and she is with 3 Coastal Preserves. 4 5 Ocean Gerhmann is also an intern with Coastal Preserves. 6 I got to talk with them this morning, as a 7 matter of fact, and they are doing a great job. 8 9 Our interns are coming to an end probably the 10 end of this month. Some of them might get to stay the 11 first week, or so, next month. I tell you that is one of the greatest things 12 that we get to do because we are allowed to have these 13 young men and women come here that are in college studying 14 some form of biology, or Coastal, or whatever, and they 15 get to look at it firsthand and they work with us and a 16 lot of times we get a lot of good ones that come back with 17 18 us. Next slide. 19 We've got a reverse auction for Marine Patrol. 20 21 we bought some new floating docks. So that is in place, 22 now. Then, Coastal Zone has a Bells Ferry Boardwalk 23 Removal and Replacement that we have awarded. 24 25 Agency update. I will just give you an update

on a couple of things that are going on.

We met with Gulf Council a couple of weeks ago and Gulf Council is looking at a lot of different things.

One of the things that we are trying to push hard, now, is the nine miles for everybody.

The nine miles for everybody, if you know what is going on there, Florida and Texas have had this forever and they have been grandfathered in, but Louisiana and Mississippi and Alabama have never been able to have control of the nine miles. The only thing we have been given that far is reef fish.

Now, what we are pushing for is to have nine miles for everything, and I think it is a great idea. Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Texas are all onboard. All the states are onboard with us. Everybody thinks it is a good thing.

NOAA is kind of like we are not pressuring it one way, or the other, but what we are going to do is we are going to sit down and Congressman Graves is working it out of Louisiana and we are working with Congressman Palazzo and some other congressmen from across the Coast and we are going to see if we can get it introduced into a bill.

This would be a great deal, if we could get it done, nine miles for everybody to be able to have this

where we can control the fisheries nine miles in the State of Mississippi. Hopefully, we can get that pushed.

If you see your congressman, tell them it is a good deal. I'm sure we won't have any opposition with him by any means.

Also, the CARES ACT I, when it came out, we did all of the distribution of the funds and after everything was said and done, we had a little over twenty thousand dollars left.

What we did is we went back to NOAA and asked NOAA and Gulf States and they allowed us to split that money equally among the recipients that got the first part of it. So we will be doing that shortly. Traci is working, now, with Gulf States to get the names to everybody so we can get a check out to them.

We are not talking about a whole lot of money, folks, but it is a little bit. It will help.

While we are at it, we will just go ahead and talk about CARES ACT II. We have sent it to Gulf States. Gulf States has sent it to NOAA. NOAA has looked at it. Everybody is fine.

I talked with Dave Donaldson yesterday and Dave said that all they are waiting on is NOAA to approve their budget. As soon as NOAA approves their budget, we can start distributing those funds.

1 It will be pretty much similar to what we had 2 the last time. Right, Traci? 3 TRACI FLOYD: That's correct. 4 5 JOE SPRAGGINS: The only thing is we've got double money this time. Maybe we can give some pretty 6 good checks out, as soon as we can get it done. 7 We are just waiting on NOAA. I know they are 8 9 saturated. When you have to look at all types of grants 10 and everything, I am sure they are saturated with not just They have the whole United States of America. 11 us. Hopefully, we will get this through shortly. 12 13 are pushing hard to do it. Traci, anything else on the CARES Act? 14 15 TRACI FLOYD: We are good. JOE SPRAGGINS: Bonnet Carre update. 16 Rick, do you have anything that you can give us? 17 18 I know we sent it to NOAA and it is, now, at the 19 Office of Management and Budget. RICK BURRIS: Yes, sir. It is similar to last 20 21 We have gone through the process. This agency has done everything we could do. It has been submitted to 22 NOAA, and it is now with the Office of Management and 23 Budget where we are waiting on their approval. 24 Once they approve it, then, we will be allocated 25

the funds, or awarded the funds, and, then, we can proceed with all the various projects that we have.

JOE SPRAGGINS: I want the fishermen and the

processors and the charter boats and all to understand we are doing everything that we can. This it takes a long process.

NOAA works pretty quick with it, but when it gets to the Office of Management and Budget, they have everything across the whole United States. They work straight for the president. They don't work for NOAA. So NOAA can't put any pressure on them. It has to go through them. As soon as it goes through them, then, they will come back and give it to us.

Normally, it takes about a year to get through that. We are trying to push them to get it quicker.

Just to give you an idea, we are about four years ahead of what we were in 2011 when this happened. At least, we are that much farther along with our Bonnet Carre.

Hopefully, we will get some money there shortly, too, to be able to distribute that and move forward.

We've got Actions Update, Sandy.

SANDY CHESNUT: At the June meeting, we had proposed changes to two regulations: Part 22, the Commission Handbook, and Part 1, the Oyster Regulations.

The Commission recommended to the Executive Director that both of those be sent to the Secretary of State's Office for Notice of Intent, and the Director approved that recommendation. we also had a motion to recommend several saltwater finfish records, and those are listed on the next page. The Director approved those, as well. We still have a couple pending items from the April meeting.

The Commission recommended a five thousand dollar violation fine to Shawn Gollott for the unauthorized placement of rip-rap.

The Executive Director approved a thousand dollar fine be issued. Mr. Gollott was notified that he could be at the meeting today to address the Commission and the Executive Director and that he would have fourteen days from the meeting date to file a petition for reconsideration.

We would just like to ask is Shawn Gollott here to address the Commission?

(No response.)

JOE SPRAGGINS: Sandy, if I could, the reason that I lowered the fine is because he did go and clean up the area. He did take the asphalt out and he did take the rebar and stuff out of it. He did do the work, but he

also did violate what he should have known as to what 1 2 should have been done. This is on top of a five hundred dollar fee that he had to pay anyway. 3 I just want everybody to know that it was 4 5 something that was looked at very hard and I wasn't trying to do anything to undercut the Commission, but it was just 6 after the fact, the things that we found. 7 SANDY CHESNUT: The other pending item is the 8 9 matter between Cleo Benward and Vivek Barclay, the owner 10 of the property in Bayou Porteaux in Ocean Springs. It has been kind of hard to get the parties 11 together, but a meeting will take place with all parties 12 13 present before a final decision will be made on that one. That's it. 14 JOE SPRAGGINS: We don't need any motion on this? 15 SANDY CHESNUT: No. We don't need a motion on 16 that. You have that final authority. 17 18 JOE SPRAGGINS: Any questions on that? 19 (No response.) JOE SPRAGGINS: If not, we will move forward to 20 21 the Advisory Commission Handbook. SANDY CHESNUT: We have Title 22, Part 22 up for 22 final adoption. 23 On June 15th, the Commission made a 24

recommendation to the Executive Director to accept the

proposed changes to Title 22, Part 22 and send it to the 1 2 Secretary of State's office for Notice of Intent. The Executive Director approved that 3 recommendation and the proposed regulation was filed with 4 5 the Secretary of State's office on June 17th. Notice of the proposed regulation was published 6 in The Sun Herald on June the 23rd and it was also posted 7 on the MDMR website on June 18th, and the next page of 8 9 proof of those. 10 Public comments on the proposed changes were due to the department by July 13th. No public comments were 11 received. 12 13 We need a motion to recommend to the Executive 14 Director that the proposed changes to Title 22, Part 22 be forwarded to the Secretary of State's office for final 15 adoption. 16 COMMISSIONER GUESS: I'll make a motion. 17 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: I'll second the motion. 18 All those in favor? 19 2.0 COMMISSIONER GUESS: Aye. 21 COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: Aye. 22 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Aye. 23 Motion passes. JOE SPRAGGINS: Anything else on that, Sandy? 24 SANDY CHESNUT: No. That's it. Thank you. 25

1	JOE SPRAGGINS: One other thing I would like to
2	ask is the October meeting, if y'all would entertain
3	changing that meeting to October 12 th at 9:00 a.m., instead
4	of the week after. I think it was scheduled for the $19^{ ext{th}}$,
5	but if we could change it to the 12^{th} , and the reason for
6	that is I need to be out with Gulf States and Gulf Council
7	the week of the $19^{ ext{th}}$ and the week after.
8	I would appreciate if y'all would entertain
9	changing the meeting.
10	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: I personally do not have a
11	problem with that.
12	Do any of our other Commissioners have a problem
13	with that?
14	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: No issues.
15	COMMISSIONER GUESS: No issues.
16	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Do we need to vote on
17	that?
18	JOE SPRAGGINS: I think it would have to be a
19	vote.
20	Right?
21	SANDY CHESNUT: Yes, you need a motion.
22	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: I'll make the motion to
23	change the October meeting from the 19^{th} to October 12^{th} .
24	Do we have a second?
25	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: I'll second that.

1	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: All those in favor say
2	aye.
3	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: Aye.
4	COMMISSIONER GUESS: Aye.
5	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Aye.
6	JOE SPRAGGINS: Thank you very much for helping
7	us with that. Obviously, we need to be at Gulf Council
8	and Gulf States so we can make sure we are represented.
9	The only other thing is I got out with Marine
10	Patrol over the 4 th of July and there was one thing about
11	it. There was not a lack of boats on the water.
12	Kyle, what was it, four or five hundred at Horn
13	Island on the afternoon of the 4 th ?
14	KYLE WILKERSON: At least.
15	JOE SPRAGGINS: Quite a few at Ship Island and
16	quite a few at other places, too, all the way through
17	there.
18	From all indications, we had a safe weekend,
19	too, didn't we?
20	KYLE WILKERSON: Yes, sir, we did.
21	JOE SPRAGGINS: Just thank the Lord for that.
22	Sir, that is my report.
23	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Thank you, Joe.
24	Commissioners report.
25	Do any of our Commissioners have anything today?

(No response.)

COMMISSIONER DANIELS: I've got one little piece that Joe and I have spoken about a little bit, but I would like to get this on record.

The State of Louisiana has increased out-ofstate charter boat licenses for captains, once again. It is now up to two thousand dollars a year.

My understanding is that is part of a way to decrease the number of out-of-state captains coming into Louisiana.

I really wish we could get some help from our legislature, or somebody, to figure out something on this.

Just like the Texas guys over on the Sabine River, we've got a lot of Mississippi charter boats on the west end of the state. There should be some way that we could grandfather those in. They are not going to Louisiana taking anything away from them, but we are water locked. Seven miles out we cross over in Louisiana waters. We are fishing areas that are very rarely patrolled by Louisiana. It is just almost forgotten by Louisiana, yet they keep increasing these rates and going up on us and, at some point, it is getting out of control.

Whatever we can do to look into that and try to come up with a solution.

JOE SPRAGGINS: We will definitely look into it,

1 sir, but, once again, I have talked to the head of 2 Fisheries for Louisiana, Patrick Banks, about it and their idea is, well, you can go up here to 2002. We don't have 3 a problem with that and we obviously know why because 4 5 there are not as many of them coming over here and we go over there, but I am trying to work something out. 6 I am going to talk with Jack Montoucet, 7 Commissioner there over natural resources and see if I can 8 9 get him to look at it with me some way. 10 It will probably not be something that we can do 11 until next year when they go to legislative session, but we can try to ask. We will definitely ask for it and see 12 13 what we can do. 14 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: I appreciate that, Joe. 15 Thank you for everything. Chief, are you ready? 16 KYLE WILKERSON: It is always a pleasure to see 17 18 you guys every month. 19 Captain Strickland has requested to do the citation report, due to the fact that he has a 20 21 presentation afterwards, and I always aim to please. Without further ado, Captain Strickland. 22 MICHAEL STRICKLAND: Good morning. 23 The Department of Marine Resources Marine Patrol 24 report was uploaded. I am sure y'all have had a chance to 25

1 look it over and any questions that may arise out of that. 2 The things we would like to highlight, in the month of June, the Office of Marine Patrol had one 3 thousand four hundred and ninety-eight contacts with the 4 5 public out on the waterways. You will notice that our total citations for the 6 year are down a little bit from last year and we would 7 like to think that is because of our presence on the water 8 9 and the general public and the education that we are 10 providing to them. Compliance is our ultimate goal and, 11 obviously, those factors are starting to come into play. Are there any questions y'all have on the report 12 13 itself? COMMISSIONER DANIELS: It looks good. Y'all keep 14 15 up the good work. Every time I see y'all interacting with somebody, it always is a pretty good interaction. 16 Everybody is professional and taking care of business. 17 18 MICHAEL STRICKLAND: Thank you, sir. 19 The next part is the changes to Title 22, Part 10, our Marine Litter Act. 20 21 The changes that are noticeable to Title 10, we have removed wording that was already covered in 22 Mississippi Code by State Statute. 23 we have also referenced the applicable 24

statutory, or regulatory, authorities to grant those

permissions and updated the chapter structure and the format to the Rules and the Sources, and that is to conform with the format that is prescribed to us by the Secretary of State's office.

No substantive changes in chapters 1, 2, 3, 5 and 8. Those are going to be left as is.

The substantive changes come in chapter 4 pertaining to unlawful discharge. We added the citations for unlawful discharge into marine waters of the State of Mississippi will be pursuant to Mississippi Code Annotated State Statutes 51-2-1, 51-2-5, 51-2-3 and 51-2-7.

We also updated the chapter structure and format for that, as well.

Substantive changes in chapter 6 pertain to emergency and accidental release of substances. We removed wording "all hazardous substance shall be kept in closed containers". That was deleted because these requirements are already stated in Mississippi Code Annotated 51-2-3.

We also added exceptions for emergency situations such as accidents, or release, due to acts of nature. We have also referenced the applicable statutory and regulatory authorities for that and updated the chapter structure and format, as well.

The substantive changes for Chapter 7 on

1 penalties, all violations of this part will be charged in 2 accordance with Mississippi Code Annotated State Statute 51-2-1 and 51-2-3, and we have, of course, referenced the 3 applicable statutory and regulatory authorities that grant 4 5 that and updated the chapter structure and format, as well. 6 Notice of Intent here is a recommendation to the 7 Executive Director that the new format and changes to 8 9 Title 22, Part 10 be sent to the Secretary of State's 10 office for Notice of Intent. COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Do we have a motion to 11 approve the changes? 12 13 COMMISSIONER GUESS: I'll make a motion. COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: I'll second that motion. 14 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: All those in favor? 15 16 COMMISSIONER GUESS: Aye. 17 COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: Aye. 18 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Aye. 19 Motion passes. 20 MICHAEL STRICKLAND: The next one is going to be 21 the changes to Title 22, Part 11, pertaining to equipment and/or nets seized by the Mississippi Department of Marine 22 23 Resources. Changes to Part 11 are going to be remove 24

wording that is already covered in Mississippi Code.

we have also added reference to applicable 1 2 statutory and regulatory authorities for that. We updated chapter structure and format to Rules 3 and Sources to conform with the format prescribed by the 4 5 Secretary of State's office. No substantive changes in Chapter 1, the 6 introduction. 7 Chapter 2 substantive changes regarding sale and 8 9 disposition of seized equipment and/or nets. 10 We added Rule 2.1, Forfeiture Proceedings for property seized will be accordance with Mississippi Code 11 Annotated State Statute 49-15-205, or 49-15-207. 12 13 Also, the addition of Rule 2.2, all property subject to forfeiture shall be sold at public auction in 14 accordance with Mississippi Code Annotated State Stature 15 49-15-205 Subsection 4, or destroyed upon approval of the 16 Mississippi Department of Marine Resources Executive 17 18 Director. Chapter 3, there were no substantive changes. 19 Our Notice of Intent is a recommendation to the 20 21 Executive Director that the new format and changes to Title 22, Part 11, be sent to the Secretary of State's 22 office for Notice of Intent. 23 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Do we have a motion to 24

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approve those changes?

8	Motion passes.
9	MICHAEL STRICKLAND: Thank you for your time.
10	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Thank you.
11	Office of Coastal Resources. Looks like we've
12	got Ms. Willa up first.
13	WILLA BRANTLEY: Good morning.
14	I have a short presentation on our numbers for
15	the first half of 2021, just numbers of our actions.
16	You can see where we have completed four hundred
17	and seventy-two actions total, during this six months.
18	Four hundred and thirty-six of those were either regulated
19	activities that required a permit from the State, or
20	activities that required a Coastal Zone Consistency
21	determination. A lot of those overlap. Some don't.
22	We also had thirty reviews, or pre-application
23	meetings. Those are where people either send information
24	to us, or come meet with us, to see if their project needs

a permit, or to get help with what to turn in on their

application.

We had six violations that were brought to a resolution either by not being a violation in the first place, once we made it out to site, or by the property owner bringing it into compliance voluntarily.

Just to give a little bit of a comparison over the years, I wanted to be sure you understood that we didn't drop down a significant amount in 2020. We did drop down a bit on the number of total actions possibly due to COVID in 2020. We had seven hundred and thirty-five in 2019. That is for the whole year, and six hundred and seventy-two in the whole year of 2020.

In the first half of 2020, we had two hundred and seventy-six which is significantly lower than what we have had the first half of this year, but in 2019 before COVID, we had a total of three hundred and ninety-six in that first six months.

We have come up significantly this six months. We think it is due to people repairing storm damage from last year, but we also were down two in our permitting staff for a little over two months of that six months. So they have really been getting actions out the door and permits issued quickly.

I did some numbers on how quickly they were getting things issued on average. For all of those four

1 hundred and thirty-six actions, they were issued within 2 twenty-eight days of receipt of a complete application, and some of those were given six months to issue. So that 3 is a pretty quick turnaround. 4 5 For general permits that we try to get out within thirty days of receipt of the complete application, 6 we got fifty-four percent of those out within fifteen days 7 and over eighty percent out within the thirty days. I 8 9 think that was a pretty quick turnaround on most of those.

If you have any questions about what we do with any of these files, or any of the numbers, I will be happy to answer those.

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COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Looks like y'all have got a lot of paperwork to deal with.

WILLA BRANTLEY: Actually, thanks to our electronic system which some of the permitters who have been here a longer amount of time are not completely happy with yet, but we have a lot less paperwork actually, and I think that is one of the reasons they are able to get things turned around is the system doing so much of that paperwork for them.

COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Thank you, Willa.

WILLA BRANTLEY: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Next up is Chris Pickering.

CHRIS PICKERING: Good morning Commissioners, Director, Ms. Chesnut.

This is going to be a modification request by the Hancock County Port and Harbor Commission to a Coastal Zone Consistency.

This original project was presented back in January of 2020 to the Commission and they are just requesting a modification to their mitigation proposal.

It is located at Port Bienville on the Industrial Canal in Pearlington. It is in the Industrial Use District, and the agent is Compton Engineering.

The previous Consistency authorized zero point one four acre of submerged aquatic vegetation impacts. These impacts were to be mitigated by transplanting the SAV to another location that was directly adjacent and constructing a wood wave attenuation device to help protect the transplanted area.

Inspection of the area by the applicant and agent prior to construction activities revealed that the SAV was no longer within the project footprint. A new SAV Survey was conducted on June 11th of this year and revealed no SAV within the project area. Therefore, the applicant is requesting that the mitigation for the zero point one four acre of SAV impacts be removed from their Coastal Zone Consistency Determination and the Mitigation

Proposal.

It is common for SAV to be present sporadically, since it is sensitive to turbidity, temperature and salinity. The loss of SAV within the project area could be caused by these parameters.

This is an aerial just south of Highway 90 and the Industrial Canal. Right along the shoreline here is where they are dredging and that is where the SAV was originally (indicating slide).

This is the entire mitigation proposal plan, but right here is where the SAV was going to be transplanted and the wave attenuation device right in front of that.

That was a plan profile of the SAV transplant area (indicating slide).

This is the new proposal for the mitigation area and, as you can see, they have taken out the SAV transplant area (indicating slide).

The staff did conduct a site visit and concurs with the recently submitted SAV Survey which indicates that there is no longer SAV within the project area.

Based on the results, it has been determined that the project no longer has SAV impacts. Therefore, staff recommends approval of the requested Modification to the Coastal Zone Consistency Determination and to the Mitigation Proposal.

1	What that, do y'all have any questions?
2	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Seems like it is pretty
3	straight forward.
4	Do y'all have any questions?
5	(No response.)
6	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: If the staff visited the
7	site and determined there wasn't any SAV, then, I will go
8	ahead and make a motion to move forward.
9	CHRIS PICKERING: I did look at some old aerial
10	imagery. We have some daily imagery we can look at. I
11	looked all the way back until we issued the permit, and I
12	couldn't see where mechanically they had gone in and
13	impacted it in any way.
14	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: I will second the motion.
15	All those in favor?
16	COMMISSIONER GUESS: Aye.
17	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: Aye.
18	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Aye.
19	Motion passes.
20	CHRIS PICKERING: Thank you.
21	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Thank you.
22	I'm just going with Greg. I feel like I'm going
23	to butcher that last name every time.
24	GREG CHRISTODOULOU: No problem.
25	Today for the last presentation for Coastal, I

will be presenting a modification, also.

This is a modification to a project that was authorized by the Commission at the same time Chris' was in January of 2020.

The project location is just east of the Highway 63 bridge in Moss Point, Jackson County. General Use District. Compton Engineering is the agent.

The purpose and need for the project is for the more efficient rail transport of goods and abandonment of existing railroad crossings in Pascagoula and Moss Point.

When we come before you with modifications, a lot of times it is usually because they are wanting to add something to the project and maybe increase the impacts.

This is a little bit different. This is something that we really don't get to see too often. This is actually a significant reduction in what was previously authorized by the Commission last year.

The previously authorized project consisted of almost five acres of fill total of wetlands, almost four acres of tidal and tidally-influenced wetlands, and, then, a little over an acre of forested wetlands.

The mitigation for those impacts were the creation of almost four acres of tidal and tidally-influenced wetlands, and, then, purchasing mitigation credits for the non-tidal wetlands impacts.

The new currently proposed modification of the project has reduced the total amount of fill to just under an acre of wetland impacts, and the mitigation will be the creation of approximately an acre of tidal and tidally-influenced marsh and it will be right adjacent to the project area. It is not off somewhere else away from where the impacts are taking place.

The variance requests are the same as previous. They are just in a much minor amount. They have reduced the impacts pretty greatly, but they still have to justify the variance for both the Coastal Program and Title 22, Part 23.

Wetland fill areas. If you look on your monitor, the red areas are where they are currently proposing the wetland fill (indicating slide).

They have tried to limit these areas mainly to where the abutments of the bridge are and the elevated sections of tracks. It will be the transitional areas for the most part.

On your monitor and on the screen, you can see the previously authorized route versus the currently proposed route. The previously authorized in blue and the current in yellow (indicating slide).

what they were able to do is they were able to move everything to the south to some upland areas. They

are privately owned. They will have to purchase them, but in the long run the cost differential was much less to do it this way, to go with this less environmentally impactful situation. The mitigation area is roughly the same area, except it is a little bit reduced in size. It will be adjacent to this tidal, tidally-influenced creek ditch right here (indicating slide).

what they are going to do is they are going to grade down the upland area until it is the same elevation as the adjacent marsh area. They will plant the appropriate species and over time it should transition to a very similar habitat to what is being impacted.

The red dots are the abandoned rail crossings that will be removed, once the project is complete in the cities of Moss Point and Pascagoula (indicating slide).

what you have is you have these crossings that will be removed that will reduce and amount of traffic and, also, reduced the amount of possible vehicular-train interactions.

The project was put on public notice again, the reduced project impacts in both The Sun Herald and Mississippi Press.

We received no public comments.

We, also, had to have a public hearing for the

1	justification of the variances, and we had no comments at
2	the public hearing.
3	DEQ is reviewing the project.
4	Archives has no objections to the project.
5	Secretary of State has stated that a rent exempt
6	lease would be required.
7	Our recommendation is that since the impacts
8	have been significantly reduced from the previously
9	authorized project, we recommend approval of the variance
10	request and the modification request, contingent on DEQ's
11	Water Quality Certification.
12	Any questions?
13	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Have y'all got anything?
14	(No response.)
15	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Anytime we can reduce the
16	impacts of a project, I think that is a good thing.
17	I will make the motion for the recommendation.
18	Do we have a second?
19	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: I'll second that motion.
20	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: All those in favor?
21	COMMISSIONER GUESS: Aye.
22	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: Aye.
23	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Aye.
24	Thank you.
25	GREG CHRISTODOULOU: Thank y'all.

1 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Next up is Office of 2 Finance and Administration. We are going to have Brandi 3 Busby today. BRANDI BUSBY: Good morning Director, 4 5 Commissioners and legal counsel. My name is Brandi Busby. I'm Director of 6 Finance and Accounting filling in for Leslie Brewer today. 7 I will be presenting the Agency's financials for the month 8 ending June 30th, 2021. 9 10 At the end of June, our State Revenue was five point one million. Total Agency Revenue was forty-seven 11 million. 12 13 Our State Net Income was negative one point two 14 million, and our Total Agency Net Income was twenty-three point five million. 15 JOE SPRAGGINS: Once again, that one point two 16 million is just waiting on the State to give us our 17 allocation. 18 BRANDI BUSBY: Yes, sir. They still owe us one 19 million forty-one thousand six zero nine in 20 21 appropriations. After twelve months of Fiscal Year 2021, the 22 Agency has sixty-eight point one percent of the Operating 23 Budget remaining, while the Tidelands Budget has twenty-24 25 seven point seven percent remaining.

1	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Looks like we are on
2	track.
3	BRANDI BUSBY: Yes, sir.
4	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Thank you, Brandi.
5	BRANDI BUSBY: Thank you.
6	Ms. Charmaine.
7	CHARMAINE SCHMERMUND: Good morning
8	Commissioners, Director Spraggins, Ms. Chesnut.
9	The Mississippi Department of Marine Resources
10	was mentioned fifteen times in local, state and national
11	media since the June MACMR meeting.
12	News items included the dates for the reopening
13	of snapper season, 4 th of July boating safety and the
14	appointment of our Chief Operating Officer and Chief
15	Scientific Officer.
16	Marine Patrol held a Boat and Water Safety class
17	June $19^{ ext{th}}$ at the Bolton Building. They also participated
18	in Career Days held at the Gruich Center in Biloxi and the
19	Biloxi Police Department, as well as a Water Safety
20	presentation for Care-a-lot School in Biloxi.
21	National Heritage Area, as well as Marine Patrol
22	took part in Paddle the Bay at Henderson Point in Pass
23	Christian on July 10 th .
24	The MDMR IT team hosted the Mississippi
25	Association for Spacial Technologies in June for their bi-

monthly meeting.

The Mississippi Deep Sea Fishing Rodeo was held July 1st through the 4th. The Agency was on hand each day at the fishing rodeo distributing our rules and regulations publication, fish ruler stickers, fish posters and other informational pieces to the public.

The Gulf States Marine Fisheries Commission recognized two Mississippi MRIP statistic superstars for near perfect submissions in their recreational fishing surveys to measure how many fish anglers catch and how many trips they take. The data collected helps scientists and managers assess and maintain sustainable fish stocks.

MDMR Finfish Bureau's Chris Graham and Josh Waters are on the top ten list for the lowest edit rate which means they submit assignments with little to no mistakes. Josh Waters made number seven and Chris Graham made number two out of all the active interviewers in the Gulf States who had at least fifty interviews completed.

COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Thank you, Charmaine.

CHARMAINE SCHMERMUND: Thank you.

JOE SPRAGGINS: If I could real quick, they did a fantastic job, Charmaine and her group and several other people from the Agency during the 4th of July rodeo, and they were there every day working hard for us, and we appreciate that.

1 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: That's a big deal. It has 2 been going on for a long time. Office of Marine Fisheries. We are going to 3 have Erik Broussard up first. 4 5 ERIK BROUSSARD: Good morning Commissioners, Director Spraggins, Ms. Chesnut. 6 This morning we have up for final adoption Parts 7 1. 13 and 17. 8 9 Just a quick recap. Part 1 deals with harvest 10 and handling. Part 13 is marine aquaculture. Part 17 is shellfish landing. 11 With this final adoption, what we will 12 13 accomplish is combining all of these parts into one, so all of your oyster regulations will be found in one spot 14 to make it more user friendly. 15 There is also some updated language to provide 16 clarity and it is all put into the new format for the 17 18 Secretary of State. On June 15th, the Commission recommended to the 19 Executive Director that the new format and changes to 20 21 Title 22, Part 1, 13 and 17 be sent to the Secretary of State's Office for Notice of Intent. 22 The Executive Director approved the 23 recommendation and it was filed with the Secretary of 24 State's Office June 16th. 25

1	The notice of the proposed regulation was
2	published in The Sun Herald on June 23 rd , and the proposed
3	regulation was also posted on the MDMR website on June
4	18 th .
5	Then, we have verification of the Secretary of
6	State's Notice of Intent, the posting to the MDMR website
7	and the notice at The Sun Herald (indicating slide).
8	Public comments were due to the MDMR by July
9	13 th . No public comments were received.
10	Finally, what will be needed is a motion to
11	recommend to the Executive Director that the proposed
12	changes to Title 22, Part 1, 13 and 17 be forwarded to the
13	Secretary of State's office for final adoption.
14	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Do we have any questions?
15	(No response.)
16	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Do we have a motion for
17	the recommendation?
18	COMMISSIONER GUESS: I'll make a motion.
19	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Do I have a second?
20	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: I'll second that motion.
21	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: All those in favor?
22	COMMISSIONER GUESS: Aye.
23	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: Aye.
24	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Aye.
25	Motion passes.

1	Thank you, Erik. We appreciate it.
2	ERIK BROUSSARD: Thank you.
3	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: State records, Josh
4	Waters.
5	JOSH WATERS: Good morning General Spraggins,
6	Commissioners, Ms. Chesnut.
7	My name is Josh Waters. I'm filling in for
8	Jonathan Barr today.
9	First off, for conventional state record we have
10	the Keeltail Pomfret, Taractes rubescens. The old record
11	was fourteen pounds three point eight two ounces and the
12	new record is sixteen pounds eight point zero ounces. The
13	angler was Jimmy Boleware.
14	Here is a picture of the fish and here is Mr.
15	Jimmy holding the fish (indicating photographs).
16	Our second conventional state record this past
17	month was Bull Shark, Carcharhinus leucas. The old record
18	was three hundred fifty-four pounds and four ounces. The
19	new record was three hundred seventy-seven pounds and four
20	ounces. The angler was Mr. David Rogers.
21	Here is a picture of the fish and here is Mr.
22	Rogers beside the fish (indicating photographs).
23	We have two Fly State records as well. The
24	first one is Shark Sucker, Echeneis naucrates. The old
l l	

record was one pound four point six four ounces. The new

1	record is three pounds four point eight ounces. The
2	angler is Mr. Doug Borries.
3	Here is a picture of the fish and here is Mr.
4	Doug holding the fish (indicating photographs).
5	Mr. Borries also got the Little Tunny record,
6	Euthynnus alletteratus. The old record was twelve pounds
7	fifteen point zero four ounces. The new record is
8	fourteen pounds two point four ounces.
9	Here is a picture of the fish. Here is Mr. Doug
10	holding the fish (indicating photographs).
11	Our final State Record is the Youth Conventional
12	State Record for Red Snapper, Lutjanus campechanus. We
13	didn't have a record. The new record now is nineteen
14	pounds one ounce. The angler was Mason Watts.
15	Here is a picture of the fish and here he is
16	holding the fish (indicating photographs).
17	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: That is great. I love
18	seeing these kids holding the fish and getting records,
19	all the new records.
20	Do we have a motion to approve them?
21	COMMISSIONER GUESS: I'll make a motion.
22	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: I'll second it.
23	All those in favor?
24	COMMISSIONER GUESS: Aye.
25	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: Aye.

1	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Aye.
2	Motion passes.
3	Thank you, Josh.
4	JOSH WATERS: Thank you.
5	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Matt, they get those fish
6	back.
7	Correct?
8	MATT HILL: Which fish?
9	Commissioner DANIELS: The State records.
10	COMMISSIONER GUESS: The ones they catch, the
11	State records.
12	Do they keep the fish, or DMR gets them??
13	MATT HILL: We keep them sometimes, some of the
14	ones that we want to pickle and put in jars.
15	The ones at the tournament, obviously, the
16	tournament kept those fish. The Bull Shark and the Red
17	Snapper, they were weighed at their 4 th of July tournament.
18	So the tournament had those fish.
19	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Good deal.
20	Do we have any other business today?
21	JOE SPRAGGINS: I do, sir, real quick, a couple
22	of things.
23	Matt, would you give us a real quick update on
24	the Red Snapper season?
25	MATT HILL: I thought you were going to let me

get out of it today.

Just a real quick update. We did shut the season down Monday, July 5th. That was predetermined with the Agency through several meetings before the season even started.

We tracked it. Our estimated current harvest right now is approximately eighty-four thousand pounds. We have made the decision to reopen the season August the 13th with our projections.

what we have done is taken the last five years and when we have had some closures and basically try to put together the catch rate based upon what we call the supplementary, or second, season and it should, or we believe it should get us through the Labor Day weekend fishing seven days a week. That is our goal.

If we do get past that, then, we will reevaluate and possibly continue, or maybe restructure just a little bit, but that is why that date was chosen.

Are there any questions on that?

JOE SPRAGGINS: Matt, also, this will allow us to be able to fish other seasons at the same time.

Right?

MATT HILL: That is correct. We try to take into account openings. We have Amber Jack opening up the first of August. We do try to take into account opening these

1 seasons up and giving our anglers the opportunity to catch 2 other species other than Red Snapper. All the seasons are for everyone, but, in this 3 second season, we do try to pair it with other species and 4 5 give people the opportunity. COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: We appreciate that because 6 that sixty mile run for one, or two, fish is tough. 7 8 thank you. 9 MATT HILL: Yes, sir. 10 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Thank you, Matt. 11 JOE SPRAGGINS: One other thing real quick, too. Traci, could you give us an update on the TEDs? 12 13 TRACI FLOYD: Yes, sir. we have received a total of forty-four 14 15 applications for the TED Reimbursement Program and we have completed thirty-six of those. Those fishermen have been 16 paid, and we have eight that are in process. 17 18 We have requested from our funding source -- it is a NFWF Program -- that we extend another month and 19 probably through the life of the grant which will be 2022. 20 21 Everybody will have an opportunity to be a part of that 22 program. JOE SPRAGGINS: That is for the forty and under? 23 TRACI FLOYD: Right now the program, it is 24 required for forty foot and over skimmer trawlers, but 25

NOAA is considering the smaller boats as well. This way,
we will be open should that law go into place and we can
help all of them get ready.
COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Currently, the only ones
that they are requiring them on are forty foot and over,
but we are considering doing smaller nets?
TRACI FLOYD: Yes. That will go into place for
forty foot and over August 1^{st} . So we were kind of trying
to push them through earlier, but we will be open longer
to help all boats, if needed.
JOE SPRAGGINS: Prior to that, it was what?
It was larger boats only?
TRACI FLOYD: It was for the otter trawlers.
Skimmer trawlers had a tow time restriction.
JOE SPRAGGINS: Once again, this is a
reimbursement up to what, seven hundred dollars?
TRACI FLOYD: Up to seven hundred.
JOE SPRAGGINS: We reimburse the fishermen, if
they go get it so they are not out of pocket.
TRACI FLOYD: Yes, sir.
JOE SPRAGGINS: That's it, sir.
COMMISSIONER GUESS: I was going to ask for an
update on the oyster plan. I didn't see it on the
website. I was looking.
ERIK BROUSSARD: The public comment period ended

1	and we took it down. We are in the process of
2	incorporating comments. Once that is completed, the plan
3	will go back out for a second round of public comments and
4	that will be coming in the near future.
5	COMMISSIONER GUESS: Thank you.
6	ERIK BROUSSARD: Thank you.
7	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Joe, do we have any other
8	public comments, other than this one?
9	JOE SPRAGGINS: No, sir.
10	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Mr. Gilbert Ramsey asked
11	for a comment to be put into the record pertaining to
12	DeSoto Forest and accessibility. So we are going to enter
13	this into the record for him.
14	If we have no other comments, do we have a
15	motion to adjourn?
16	COMMISSIONER GUESS: I'll make a motion.
17	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: I'll second that motion.
18	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: All those in favor?
19	COMMISSIONER GUESS: Aye.
20	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS: Aye.
21	COMMISSIONER DANIELS: Aye.
22	Thank you. Everybody have a great day.
