1	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
2	Good morning, everyone. Thank y'all for
3	joining us today for the September 20th MCMR
4	meeting this morning. We're going to go ahead and
5	call the meeting to order now. I'm going to ask
6	Commissioner Roberds to lead us in the pledge of
7	allegiance.
8	(Pledge of allegiance was recited.)
9	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
10	Thank you, Cam.
11	All right. So Director Spraggins is
12	with us today remotely. He's listening in and he
13	has the ability to talk.
14	Joe, are you there?
15	JOE SPRAGGINS:
16	I'm here listening. Thank you.
17	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
18	All right. Good. We've got you all
19	logged in.
20	We're going to have Patrick Levine
21	sitting in his spot today. Patrick, would you
22	mind leading us in a prayer this morning?
23	(Moment of prayer.)
24	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
25	All right. So a little bit of

1	housekeeping first thing do we need to make a
2	motion to table this, Ms. Sandy?
3	SANDY CHESNUT:
4	Yes, we do.
5	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
6	All right. So the minutes from
7	August 18th are not ready. They will be ready by
8	the next meeting.
9	I'm going to ask for a motion to table
10	the approval of the minutes until the October
11	meeting.
12	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS:
13	I will make a motion to table the
14	minutes.
15	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
16	I will second that.
17	All in favor?
18	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS:
19	Aye.
20	COMMISSIONER McCLENDON:
21	Aye.
22	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
23	Aye.
24	Next up is the Approval of the Agenda.
25	We're going to ask to make a change to the agenda

1	today. We're going to have to move the October
2	meeting, and we're going to put that in under M,
3	Other Business. We will deal with that whenever
4	we get there.

8	I will make that motion.

10	I'll second.
11	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
12	All in favor?
13	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS:
14	Aye.
15	COMMISSIONER McCLENDON:
16	Aye.
17	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
18	Aye.
19	Do we still need to approve the agenda
20	now?
21	SANDY CHESNUT:
22	Yes, approve it as amended.
23	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
24	Okay. Can I get a motion to approve the
25	agenda as amended?

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1	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS:
2	I will make that motion.
3	COMMISSIONER McCLENDON:
4	I will second it.
5	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
6	All in favor?
7	COMMISSIONER ROBERDS:
8	Aye.
9	COMMISSIONER McCLENDON:
10	Aye.
11	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
12	Aye.
13	We got all that out of the way. That
14	was painless.
15	You're going to handle Joe's part. I'm
16	going to turn it over to Patrick.
17	PATRICK LEVINE:
18	Well, good morning. Thank you for the
19	opportunity to fill in today. As always, it's
20	been a busy month at the Department of Marine
21	Resources, and we will be able to share a few
22	things that are going on and some of things that
23	are coming up.
24	And before we get started, as you
25	mentioned, Director Spraggins is online, and he

wants to share with everybody remotely. So Director Spraggins, you take the floor.

JOE SPRAGGINS:

Yeah. Thank you, Patrick. And first, you know, what I'd like to do, I would like to ask that — you know, for a special thing to happen at the end of the service today. September 3rd, we lost a great icon in the State of Mississippi and a great person that was part of the fisheries for South Mississippi, Mr. Victor Mavar.

And Mr. Victor was not just a processer, not just a person in the fishery world. He was also a great person that worked and served our country, and he last worked and served the State of Mississippi and the Gulf Coast. He was an icon here, and he, you know, had a lot of things that — in fact, we can read forever and talk about him forever for what he's done. But I can tell you right now, that I learned oyster 101 from him because the man was amazing at what he could tell me about what was going on and how we got to the situation we're in and what we can do to change it, and he was extremely graceful to tell me that.

Also, you know, he was also a head of

1	the American Shrimp Processors Association and he
2	served two terms as the president. And, you know,
3	he went to the Merchant Marine Academy, served our
4	country there and then went to the Korean War.
5	And I just wanted to ask if we could possibly at
6	the end of this meeting close our meeting in honor
7	of Mr. Victor Mavar.
8	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
9	I think that sounds like a great idea,
10	Joe.
11	JOE SPRAGGINS:
12	Okay. Patrick, I will turn it back over
13	to you.
14	PATRICK LEVINE:
15	Well, thank you for sharing that. And,
16	you know, when you think about Mr. Victor and his
17	guidance that he has given us, just an amazing
18	amount of knowledge and wealth of knowledge in
19	resources and we're thankful for that.
20	You know, we've had a few things go on.
21	And we mentioned last month about the derelict
22	vessel program, and we wanted to update on that
23	again today. Since we started tracking derelict
24	vessels, we've had a total of 55 that have been

Total of 55 that have been

reported to us.

reported to us. The good news is most of them, the owner is taking care of it; 32 of them have been removed. And so just making phone calls, making contacts, knocking on doors, working with our derelict vessel folks, our legal team, writing letters and notifying the public, it's amazing that 32 of them have been moved.

Twenty-three of them are still pending, and of those 23, 10 of them already have court dates set up, ready to go. And so maybe we can encourage folks. Not that we want to penalize or fine anybody. We don't want anybody to have a lot of stress, but what we want to do is clean up the Mississippi Gulf Coast. And we don't want to hurt anybody in the process or hinder anybody. We just want to encourage them to get those vessels picked up, get them moved. And if we sit down and have conversations, that goes a long way. We want to help out. And so really good things that are happening there.

And you know, huge kudos to our legal staff and to some of our team. There is a vessel in Ocean Springs off of Washington Avenue. If you look over there, the Captain Ben, the first one that went to court and we received a court order

to remove that vessel. So it's our very first one that we're walking out the process of — using the funding that was provided by the legislature to get that vessel moving, so we're excited about that, that we're paving a way to clean up the Gulf Coast.

And it's a team effort. When you think about these derelict vessels, it's one thing to, you know, have the legislation, to have the funding, to have the resources, to have the court order. Well, then it's going to take the team of folks that are out there to say, I'm willing to get out there and move that boat.

And so if you're interested in being on a list to bid on removing some of these derelict vessels, contact our procurement office, talk to them, get on the list, and then that way, whenever we need help getting them out, you can be on that contact list because we want that to happen.

So super thankful for everybody that's working on the derelict vessels and look forward to cleaning up the Coast.

You know, snapper season, we're going to talk about snapper season in K just a little bit. It looks like Matt is ready.

MATT HILL:

No.

PATRICK LEVINE:

We'll do it in K. Okay. We're going to do it in K. We're going to talk about snapper season, but it's been a great year. And I know a lot of folks have been reaching out to us and saying when is snapper season, when is it going to close, when is it going to end. Well, we're going to hear about that in K here in just a little bit.

Last month, we mentioned the surplus auction that we had. Good news is, not only did we put a lot of things out on bid, a lot of those things have been paid for and a lot of that stuff has been picked up. And so we have a few more items that need to be picked up, but for the most part all of our surplus assets have been picked up and taken care of, and, you know, just a fantastic opportunity to be able to clean up and also put some funding back here at the agency.

I had the opportunity the other day to go to the Biloxi Seafood Festival. And I know that it's going to be mentioned later on, but walking around the festival, the most popular booth that they had there was the DMR booth and

lots of people asking questions. And so many of our staff members here at the DMR volunteered to work that booth, and they did a fantastic job. I mean, they looked professional. They represented the agency well.

I know that there was a need and a lot of our staff stepped up and said, you know what, I'll go over there and hang out. And they did a phenomenal job, so thank you to everybody at DMR that stepped up and helped out with that because that was a huge, huge thing to be able to promote the agency, promote the resources we have on the Coast.

September 24th, just around the corner here in a couple of days, it's going be National Estuaries Day, and the NERR is going to be having a fun day out there from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. People have the opportunity to see the facility, to look at the estuary that's out there. There are some boat rides that are available on the Miss NERR and you have to RSVP to do that. So if you're interested in being a part of National Estuaries Day, be sure to a contact the NERR, especially if you want to sign up to go on a boat ride that day. It's coming up.

And, you know, the marine patrol guys, they are back in the back, Chief and his team. The boating season, you know, historically, it's always said that it runs from, you know, Memorial Day to Labor Day, and from Memorial Day to Labor Day, those marine patrol officers, I'm telling you, when you throw in boating safety, when you throw in snapper season, when you throw in shrimp season, when you throw in all the things that are going on at once, it's a lot of work and a little bit of play.

And, you know, I just want to say thank you to them for the hard work that they've been putting in, because there's been a lot of sleepless nights, a lot of hard days. And, you know, Labor Day marks what we traditionally call the end of the boating season. They've done a phenomenal job. I know Chief will share in just a little bit.

And as a reminder, if anybody has a comment, public comment that they would like to share, TJ is back in the back. And so if anybody has a public comment that they would like to put in, be sure to see TJ and he will get it turned in and so that's what I have so far on the director's

reports.

You know, our team, it's growing and I'm thankful that our team grows. We have some new employees that have come on board. We have Anna Gamblin. She is an environmental/natural resources specialist I, a permitter with the Coastal Resources. Chaz Newman, he's going to be an environmental/natural resources specialist I in Coastal Resources. Roy Carrell is GIS specialist I. I know Roy is over there on the side helping us out today and thankful that Roy is here.

Jarred Perry, a compliance officer with Marine Fisheries.

And then we have a few promotions, you know, and so many people here deserve promotions. We have had a few of them. Sandra Bilbo was promoted to environmental/natural resource specialist team lead out at the NERR. Brett James was promoted to an environmental/natural resource specialist II, and Daniel Koushel was promoted to a natural resources specialist II in Coastal Resources.

So not only are we adding to our team, but we're able to promote some of our team and we are excited about that. So quite a few things

1	that are going on.
2	And Traci, will you happen to have an
3	update for us on the USDA Processors Grant?
4	TRACI FLOYD:
5	Good morning, Mr. Chairman,
6	Commissioners, Patrick and legal team.
7	So we are preparing the final payout of
8	agreements that will be signed by the eligible
9	applicants and issuing approvals. Just to recap:
10	The process was open for applications July 1st
11	through August 16th. We had only four people
12	found ineligible. We had 11 eligible. Three of
13	those were catfish Processors. So hopefully,
14	within the next month or so we'll see some
15	results, some payouts.
16	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
17	Good job. Y'all got that one quick.
18	Three years
19	TRACI FLOYD:
20	Yeah.
21	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
22	And that one seems like it was in
23	overdrive. That's great.
24	TRACI FLOYD:
25	Thank you.

1	PATRICK LEVINE:
2	Thank you, Traci.
3	Rick, can you give us an update on the
4	Bonnet Carre?
5	RICK BURRIS:
6	Well, Commissioner Daniels, you did a
7	pretty good job, but, yeah, I think I mentioned to
8	y'all last month that we did receive some comments
9	from OMB through NOAA. We've addressed those
10	comments and sent them back. They were relatively
11	mild, really easy, just kind of minor things. We
12	fixed those up, sent them back, so, I mean, I
13	couldn't tell you what's going to happen, but
14	hopefully that's the end of it. That's the update
15	I have right now.
16	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
17	Thank you. Y'all keep up the good work.
18	PATRICK LEVINE:
19	Thank you, Rick.
20	Now we have Action Updates from the last
21	meeting.
22	SANDY CHESNUT:
23	At the last meeting, the commission
24	recommended and the director approved the
25	following motions: The requested variance and

1 wetlands permit contingent upon clearance from 2 MDEQ for the City of Biloxi to reconstruct the 3 Lighthouse Pier and install a jetty in the 4 Mississippi Sound south of the intersection of 5 U.S. 90 and Porter Avenue in Biloxi. 6 And the approval of the following: 7 State saltwater youth finfish records, 8 conventional tackle is leatherjack and fly fishing 9 record for ladyfish, and both of those by Rodie 10 Armes. And that's it. 11 PATRICK LEVINE: 12 Well, thank you. Thank you for those 13 updates. 14 And I know I was in the hallway the 15 other day and I think I saw Mr. Armes maybe even 16 bringing another one that we will be seeing 17 possibly next month. That little guy, I'll tell 18 you, he's doing a lot of fishing and breaking a 19 lot of records, so that's super exciting to pass 20 that heritage on. 21 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: 22 It looks like he's got two here today. 23 PATRICK LEVINE: 24 And I think he'll have some more next 25 month.

COMMISSIONER DANIELS:

That's awesome. You know, Patrick, I just want to touch on — I don't know if everybody understands how great that legislation was on the derelict vessels. And, you know, thank you to everyone in the department that worked on getting that through. And thank you to our legislators in Jackson for making that happen. That's a big, big win for the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

PATRICK LEVINE:

Absolutely, it is. It is huge. And it's really neat whenever you see those vessels, that process occurs and just to make things look a lot better out there.

COMMISSIONER DANIELS:

Well, you know, I mean, we had one in my neighborhood. And I'm on the board for the neighborhood and I was always getting the calls, why isn't DMR doing something about this. And it was nice to finally be able to say, hang on, it's coming, let's see what happens. And that thing was out of the water like that as soon as the owners were getting phone calls from the department.

PATRICK LEVINE:

1	That's right.
2	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
3	And it was cool to see that unfold.
4	PATRICK LEVINE:
5	Well, you know, if you're listening
6	online or you're in the meeting and somebody has a
7	derelict vessel, you can to go our website,
8	dmr.ms.gov, go to programs, derelict vessel, and
9	there is a vessel of concern report. We encourage
10	the public, keep putting those vessels in there,
11	and we get to it as we can. We can't do them all
12	overnight, but we are listening and looking at
13	every case and we want to continue to do that.
14	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
15	Making progress is what it's all about.
16	All right. Thank you. Joe, do you have
17	anything else on that before we move on?
18	JOE SPRAGGINS:
19	No, I don't. Thank y'all very much.
20	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
21	Commissioners' Reports, do any of our
22	commissioners have anything that they
23	COMMISSIONER McCLENDON:
24	Yeah. So special thanks to Traci and
25	Rick and the team for being able to get those

processors grants turned around.

Just a quick idea of what's going on in the domestic shrimp business. You know, in my 20 years, it's been about the worst that I've seen it. So you've got the vessels who are out there paying twice as much for diesel as they were last year, and the shrimp prices actually fell. You know, depending on the size, some were in the neighborhood of 50 to 75 percent. So, you know, every little bit we can get out for this season certainly helps alleviate some inventory pressure and allows us to go back to buying some product.

There are processors all over the Coast, large, small, who are essentially ceasing operations for a period of a week or two. And there is, you know, just a limited availability for people who are actually buying and processing shrimp right now. So a big struggle along the Gulf Coast. I think Louisiana is having a meeting today and they are trying to double down on their import labeling and marketing efforts. So, you know, it takes everybody, and what you guys did was extremely important and we thank you.

COMMISSIONER DANIELS:

Cam?

MR. ROBERDS:

(Shaking head negatively.)

COMMISSIONER DANIELS:

Office of Marine Patrol, Chief.

I want to go ahead and tell you before you get started, I got stopped myself on the way in to the harbor the other day. And very pleasant stop, checked everything out, everything was good. He was courteous and professional and got everything done and moved on. It was nice to see them out there.

KYLE WILKERSON:

Well, very good. That's what we strive for, Commissioner, being respectful to the public. We want to — we treat people like we want to be treated. And, you know, we're citizens just like everybody else, and we have to live with these people, you and all the commissioners and me. And we have to strive to be treated like we wanted to be treated — treat people like we want to be treated.

And I would like to say — start this in saying that — thank you for the kind words, especially with the stop, and Patrick, giving kind words to marine patrol. We don't do it for that,

but it goes a long way when people see that and we like that.

Now, in saying that, I want to -- I want to talk a little bit about marine patrol before I get into the citation report. And as you may not know, we work in operation with a national operation called Dry Water, Operation Dry Water. It normally -- it culminates around, I would say, Fourth of July weekend, and it's strictly -- we mainly look for boating under the influence citations.

We had a very active year this year.

Actually, in saying that, we were actually nominated to be the middle-sized agency of the year. They nominated us for that. Matter of fact, we're going to receive that award in New Hampshire at the end of the month. And that means a lot because we're looking at multiple hundreds of agencies that participate in this, and we were able to bring forth our best effort in doing this and helping, you know, the boating public.

Also Corporal Dylan Kessen, he was nominated for officer of the year for NASBLA. I'm sorry. I didn't tell you what it was for. NASBLA is the National Association of State Boating and

1 Law Enforcement Administrators. They're the one 2 that presents these awards, and it's a big deal. 3 It's a big deal. 4 I would like to read the award we 5 received. It's says: Operation Dry Water, 6 Mississippi Department of Marine Resources, 7 Officer of the Year. This certifies the award to 8 Corporal Dylan Kessen for exemplary dedication and 9 professionalism during the preparation and 10 execution of 2022 Operation Dry Water Campaign. 11 Thanks to your efforts, you are making a 12 difference in recently -- recreational boating safety by rising awareness -- excuse me, by 13 14 raising awareness about the dangers of boating 15 under the influence and by removing impaired 16 operators from the nation's waterways, protecting 17 the community you serve. 18 That means a lot. Dylan, would you 19 please come up here? 20 DYLAN KESSEN: 21 Thanks, Chief. 22 KYLE WILKERSON: 23 Dylan, he is a hard charger. He is 24 going to go far. I see him being the chief about 25 20 years from now. But he's going to be -- thank

1	you, Dylan.
2	DYLAN KESSEN:
3	Thank you, Chief. I appreciate you.
4	KYLE WILKERSON:
5	All right. Enough of that. I'm very
6	proud of our people. As they say, the men make
7	the man and that is the truth. They make my
8	job I love coming to work every day because
9	I've got a bunch of great personnel. This agency
10	is awesome, and I have been here a long time.
11	In saying that, we had a relatively mild
12	August. Nothing just jumps out at us. I mean, it
13	was pretty self-explanatory.
14	Let me see how many stops we had. I
15	think I want to say we had roughly 1,900 stops
16	that month. These people are really pushing
17	forward and they're striving to be best in doing
18	their job.
19	We had a couple of accidents that a
20	few injuries, nothing major. No one passed away,
21	which is awesome. We strive for that. We try to
22	keep everybody in check with that. But other than
23	that, everything looks in line.
24	If you have any questions, please feel
25	free.

1 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: 2 I don't know why this just popped up to 3 me, but whenever I was looking at the crab stuff, 4 it got me to thinking. I know there has been a 5 lot of -- you know, we've come out this month 6 where there's a lot of crabs around the islands. 7 Do they have to have a crabbing license to catch 8 them with dip nets or pick them up and have them 9 in their possession or is that just if you're 10 running traps? 11 KYLE WILKERSON: 12 That's just if you're trapping them. 13 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: 14 That's what I thought. 15 KYLE WILKERSON: 16 But you have to go by the limits and all 17 that stuff also. You can't just be picking them 18 You have to go by the size limit and creel 19 and all that. 20 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: 21 Okay. 22 KYLE WILKERSON: 23 Anyone? Anyone? 24 COMMISSIONER DANIELS: 25 All right. That's it. Thank you.

1	KYLE WILKERSON:
2	Thank you, sir. And once again, thank
3	you for the kind words.
4	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
5	All right. We're going to move on down
6	to I, Ms. Leslie, for Finance and Administration.
7	LESLIE BREWER:
8	Good morning, everyone. I'm Leslie
9	Brewer, CFO. I'll be presenting the financials
10	for the month ending August 31st.
11	At the end of August, our state revenue
12	was 3.2 million. Our agency revenue was 3.3
13	million. Our state net income, 2.4 and our agency
14	net income was 1 million.
15	At the end of August, we had
16	98.3 percent of our budget remaining for the
17	agency and 98.2 for Tidelands.
18	Does anybody have any questions?
19	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
20	I don't think so. Thank you.
21	All right. Ms. Charmaine.
22	CHARMAINE SCHMERMUND:
23	Good morning.
24	The Mississippi Department of Marine
25	Resources was mentioned 18 times in local, state

and national media since the August MACMR meeting.

News items included how to find boat launches on
the Mississippi Gulf Coast using our website,

marine patrol keeping boaters safe during the

Labor Day weekend and, in this month's issue of

Mississippi Living Magazine, Senior Master

Sergeant Daphne Moore and Senior Master Sergeant

Jada Whittington were featured in the article

"Women on Patrol," which highlighted the officers
and the great job they do for our agency.

Marine Patrol participated in the City of Gulfport's Children's Health and Wellness Fair at the Lyman Community Center on August 27th and the St. Patrick High School Career and College Fair on September 14th.

The final 2022 Off-Bottom Oyster
Aquaculture Training Program class was held on
Saturday, September 10, at the Biloxi Small Craft
Harbor. Before the class traveled to the
aquaculture training park, a seed counting
tutorial was held to show them how to properly
count and weigh their seed oysters. All eight
members of the training program were present at
the class and each member was allotted
approximately 9,000 seed oysters each. The class

then traveled to the training park where they deployed their seed oysters into their first aquaculture cage.

The Lyman Aquaculture Hatchery at MDMR took part in the Sawyer Brooks Memorial Fishing Tournament on August 20th by assisting in holding and releasing over 100 live bass back to the Jourdan River waters after weigh-in.

The Grand Bay NERR had an active summer of community outreach and programming. Over the summer, they hosted USM's Barrier Island Ecology class for a field trip and debris cleanup, where students collected 350 pounds of debris. NERR education staff hosted two teacher workshops for local teachers. The NERR's Coastal Training Program also led an invasive species workshop for local natural resources and land managers. Several kayaking trips also occurred with "Paddle the Gulf" and Dauphin Island Sea Lab's marine biology classes. The NERR hosted two boater safety classes Led by Lieutenant Jeff Payne.

The NERR was also invited to speak for several summer library programs, themed "Oceans of Possibilities," where they taught groups about the estuary. They went to the Margaret Sherry Library

in Biloxi, the Kiln Public Library and eight libraries in the Jackson-George County library system.

The agency sponsored the Biloxi Seafood
Festival and featured a booth at the festival,
which was held September 10th and 11th. We had
hundreds of visitors at our booth where MDMR staff
handed out our publications, fish ruler stickers,
fish posters and various items promoting
Mississippi seafood.

And we launched our annual photo contest where the winning photos will be used in the agency's 2023 calendar. We ask that submitted photos depict an aspect of the marine resources available on the Mississippi Gulf Coast, including recreational and commercial fishing, Coastal reserves, marine plant and animal life, marsh areas, boating and Mississippi seafood. The deadline to submit entries is Friday, October 28th, and they can e-mailed to publicaffairs@dmr.ms.gov.

COMMISSIONER DANIELS:

A lot going on this month.

CHARMAINE SCHMERMUND:

Yeah, been busy.

1	COMMISSIONER DANIELS:
2	That's great.
3	Marine Fisheries, the Rodie Armes' show.
4	You want to go first or are we going to do that
5	first?
6	MATT HILL:
7	No. I'm going to go. Trevor is on baby
8	duty, so y'all get me. He just had a newborn.
9	We have two records. Both of them will
10	be the youth records. You know this young man,
11	Mr. Rodie Armes. The first one is a redfin
12	needlefish. It's a new record at 2.9 ounces.
13	Here's a picture of the needlefish and here's a
14	picture of Rodie with the needlefish.
15	The second is a youth fly fishing
16	record, the hardhead catfish. It's also a new
17	record of one pound, 3.5 ounces. And again, Rodie
18	Armes. There's the catfish. And he's learning
19	how to pose well, so there he is.
20	So currently, the staff gives a motion
21	to recommend adoption of the new state records
22	or we need a motion.

I'm hoping by the end of this 22 month, we will have the reviews taken into 23 consideration and any corrections made that we

feel like need to be made and be well on our way to bring that to the Commission.

have this for us out of a BP contract, Project 1273, Enhancement Recreation. The money is available. They have been waiting on me to partner up. We're collaborating with the university and VA and y'all, with the Mississippi Development Authority to assist with tourism.

I have this because the tourism, the market — because it's fixing to eliminate because of Labor Day, we want to initiate more economic development work for development opportunities with Mississippi Development Rehabilitation

Service and with other venues.

So here we go, Ladies and Gentlemen, I'm here for y'all's direction. Mr. Joe knows about me. Mr. Aspen knows about me. Governor Barbour remembers me. They all know me. And I'm going to Washington with another idea with the Red Cross. Have patience, I'm with y'all. I'm purchasing 80 acres north of Ocean Springs, organic garden to feed the homeless. We have a veteran bottled water company we're launching, donating houses to use as dormitories. We're coming out of the woods. I'm honored to do this for our hospitality state and represent it appropriately. Thank you very much.
