1 RONNIE DANIELS: 2 Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. 3 Welcome to the Tuesday, April 18th Commission 4 meeting. At this time we'll call the meeting to 5 order. 6 I would like to ask Jonathan to lead us 7 in the pledge of allegiance. 8 (Pledge of allegiance was recited.) 9 RONNIE DANIELS: 10 Thank you, Commissioner. 11 Mr. Joe, would you like to lead us in a 12 prayer? 13 JOE SPRAGGINS: Before I do that, I would like to 14 Yeah. 15 ask us all to remember my old hometown in Alabama. 16 Had a bad tragedy this last week. It was in 17 Dadeville, Alabama where the shooting happened, 18 and there was four young kids killed and there was 19 about five or six that are serious injuries and 20 there was 38 total injured. 21 And it was over -- we don't know the 22 answer as to why it happened. 19	Just to get started here, we'll let's see what
20	we have.
21	We got any employment updates? We have
22	Elizabeth Moore who was promoted to ENR Specialist
23	III at the Grand Bay NERR.
24	And then we had a certification.
25	Christina Broussard is now certified as shellfish

1 standardized -- standardization officer, and 2 that's a big thing for the State of Mississippi to 3 be able to have -- we have two now that, I think, 4 are certified and this is huge because it helps 5 us. 6 And Christina, thank you so much. 7 appreciate it. You're in the back, aren't you? Yeah, there she is. There's Christina. 8 9 We appreciate it. you. 10 CHRISTINA BROUSSARD: 11 Thank you. 12 JOE SPRAGGINS: 13 Let's see. I have to look at this 14 calendar, make sure I'm doing things by this. 15 There is no procurement updates, I don't think. 16 Is there anything on procurement? Is that 17 correct? 18 CRYSTAL MATTA: 19 No. 20 JOE SPRAGGINS: 21 All right. Let's see. The agency, 22 legislative session, well, man, we lived. We're 23 still here. I tell you what, that was a tough 24 90 days. But just to give you an idea, we had the 25 commercial crab law that was -- bill that was

passed, and that's where you only have to have a license for the boat and not everybody on it. And so that's great. That was passed and signed by the governor.

Our marine patrol bill was signed by the governor to allow the marine patrol officers to work and do the things that they can in federal waters and do that. And that was signed by the governor.

We had — the Secretary of State, Eric Clark, there's an area that we have named after him over in the Hancock County area. And then we have a new island called Gollott Island, and that's what — the big island out here in the middle of the Bay is now — is named after Senator Tommy Gollott. It's the Gollott Island.

And we also have a new park and it's called Godfather. And that's on the Point Cadet out there, so — area. So we have got — those things are named after a senator that had 50 — I think 52 years, the longest-standing senator in the State of Mississippi ever, so we're proud to have that.

So off-bottom -- our on-bottom bill, Senate Bill 2544, that's still with the governor. We're working out some details on it. And it's where they're — how we're going to lease the bottoms. And so we're meeting and trying to work that out, and we will get something put together in the next day or two. And the governor has till Thursday to sign it, and I think it will be okay and we'll get things signed.

But it will be how we can lease the bottoms. And what we've done in that with the bill, that basically states the State of Mississippi is keeping about 20 percent of it and we're going to lease 80 percent of the permitted bottoms. And now, I don't think we'll lease 80 percent. I think we'll lease a portion of that 80 percent because there's a lot of land out there that costs a lot of money to do an on-bottom fishery. And we'll just be -- we'll find out.

We're going to have to go through a process and once we go through that process, we'll decide what we're going to do and how things are going to work. And hopefully, we can get something done in a short period of time. We're trying as quick as possible, but, you know, we just want to do it right. That's the Number 1 thing. We're going to make sure that everything

is done legal and we don't have any issues about it. Any questions on that?

Internships, we're expecting 10 Okav. this summer, so that's a great deal. You know, we're going to be able to have some interns come in and work with us. We have them in almost every area.

And I tell you, we have been very lucky with interns. We will bring them in for a year or two years or something. They work with us. Next thing you know when they graduate from college, they come back and get a job here. And that's fantastic, and that's what we need. And it works out the way it's supposed to work, so that's just fantastic.

We had the Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council meeting and reception with IMMS last week. Great turnout. IMMS, Moby and them did a great job for us, and we had -- we were able to have a cookout and cooked at IMMS. And we had oysters, shrimp and flounder and all the trimmings. And Charmaine and them did a good job. Marine Patrol did a great job, too, you know,

cooking and all.

But it was beautiful. And once again, they told me -- you know, we had this in October here and we had the one in Downtown Biloxi. And they said, we did not believe you could top it, but you did. And that -- so now we set the bar so high I don't know what the heck we're going to do next. We're going to have to go -- I don't know what we're going to do. We're going to have to come up with something.

But Moby and them even had a dolphin show for us and everything else. The people were just ecstatic. And, you know, I don't think that any of us could have ordered the weather God gave us that day; it was so wonderful. So it was just a beautiful time and everybody worked hard. And Crystal and Charmaine worked hard trying to get the stuff put together, too, and — with setting it up and all the teams.

So great deal. If you want to know what come out of the Council, about the same it's always been, you know. We got a little bit here and a little bit there, but we are working on some stuff. And they did — basically, we're going to put some working group together and be able to

look at the snapper because they are agreeing that we do have some issues and they're looking at that. And so we've got — we'll talk some more about that in just a minute.

But basically, just a standard council and all the minutes will be out shortly on it.

DMR will be closed on Monday, the 24th for Confederate Memorial Day.

Give you an update on our derelict vessels, we have a total of 83 vessel cases that have been reported since July 1st of last year. We have removed 62 of them. We have 20 of them that are pending removal and one that is received in court for a court order to remove.

So great job by that team. They're doing a great job. They've been doing the job through our legal and all that and doing a great job with us. Roy Lipscomb is heading everything up with it and they're doing a great job to get that stuff moved. And Glenn is working with them too.

All right. Let's get to what I wanted to talk about a little bit. Endorsement, some type of endorsement for a federal license or something, a fee. And what we're talking about --

when we was talking to the Council and talking to NOAA and talking to some other states at the Gulf Council, one of the things that some of the states are doing is putting some type of endorsement and — to be able to go out and federally fish. And what I'm talking about is our recreational fishermen.

And what happens is Mississippi sells about 80,000 saltwater licenses a year, and out of that 80,000 NOAA just basically said everybody fishes. I mean, if you wanted to look at it that way, but they sample 80,000. If we could do some type of endorsement to where we said if you're going to federally fish — and mainly reef fish is what we're looking at. But if you're going to federally fish, if we did some type of endorsement or some type of fee for that and we could put it on the license, then we could be able to cut that down to probably 8,000 people. I'm just throwing a number, but that's, you know, 10 percent.

And so now NOAA would agree with that and say we'll sample that. Well, that could help us a tremendous amount because that's why we took such a big cut in the amount of snapper, but we're — allocation that we have, is because MRIP

and the MRIP works, it was done off of calibration. And if we can cause this, we can still fall in our calibration, but it will help bring us up to where we need to be.

And you know, Trevor, you and Rick and Matt, any of y'all come up here, but I'm sure the Commissioners have something. But I'd like to discuss the possibility of what y'all think about that.

RONNIE DANIELS:

One question off of what you just said that I want to clarify. You said to federally fish. This would still include people that are planning on snapper fishing, even if they're not leaving state waters, correct?

JOE SPRAGGINS:

I think it's just federal, is all we have got to worry about on it, isn't it?

RICK BURRIS:

So the premise behind it is fishing in the EEZ. The Council can't manage fisheries within state waters, but I think you could potentially include fishing for federal species as well. I mean — but the intent was federal waters, yes.

RONNIE DANIELS:

2 Okay.

CAM ROBERDS:

I believe that if it gives us an opportunity to, you know, give some real hard evidence of the actual quantity of people that are snapper fishing, it's a — I mean, I believe it's a good opportunity for us to, you know, show how many people are actually going out there and catching snapper compared to the 80,000.

RICK BURRIS:

And we agree with that and — in hopes that if the states can work together with the Council and with NOAA and with Gulf States Marine Fisheries Commission that we could come up with a plan to be able to utilize, you know, the effort that's going to be collected. Because if it's not utilized, then there is really no point in doing it.

But if we could take it and hone it in and start targeting that effort, targeting those individuals for the offshore effort for those federally-managed species, then we should be able to get somewhere in a much better place, but it's all -- we've all got it -- that's why we're all

1	coordinating together and we're not just
2	because right now, Louisiana does it. Alabama
3	does it.
4	And so to come up with a collaborative
5	effort where everybody is being consistent and
6	collecting the same information and implementing
7	it if NOAA will implement it the way it needs
8	to be implemented, then it could be very
9	beneficial.
10	JOE SPRAGGINS:
11	Rick, as I do you know what
12	Alabama and Louisiana, are they charging a fee?
13	RICK BURRIS:
14	I want to say it's a very, very low fee.
15	\$10, maybe, something like that, 10, \$15.
16	JOE SPRAGGINS:
17	Yeah. But, I mean, they are charging a
18	fee of some sort and
19	RICK BURRIS:
20	Uh-huh.
21	JOE SPRAGGINS:
22	which helps offset their program too.
23	RICK BURRIS:
24	Correct. And what it does and you
25	alluded to it instead of just clicking a box

1 when you buy a license -- well, you could still 2 have 80,000 people if it's free. But if it's -- a 3 small fee associated with it, then you're going to 4 think about it before you buy it, and -- all 5 right, well, I will wait till I actually go 6 snapper fishing before I purchase this. 7 And so having a fee with it has a lot of 8 validity, and if we can put it at the right 9 amount, it shouldn't be too much of an injustice 10 to the angler and still achieve what we're trying 11 to. 12 RONNIE DANIELS: 13 So is this endorsement specific to 14 snapper or any type of reef fish? 15 RICK BURRIS: 16 Well, it's going to be reef fish. 17 saying snapper because our -- you know, that's 18 95 percent what we're landing here in Mississippi. 19 JOE SPRAGGINS: 20 And the way -- you know, basically, what 21 it does, it just -- it takes that sample size --22 and Trevor, talk to me. You're in SSE. The 23 sample size -- if I lower that sample size to 24 8,000 from 80,000, what does that do to us?

TREVOR MONCRIEF:

Well, what it kind of gives you is a targeted universe to be able to send out your effort survey to. The way MRIP does it right now, it's a random address send-out across the board. It's not from the license data frame. It's a random address across the entire State of Mississippi, which is then matched to a license database.

2.

The success that Louisiana had with their program is utilizing their license database directly to be able to get effort estimates and then using noncompliance to increase those effort estimates for folks who are fishing without a license. That's the most logical way to go about this and what will get you consistent numbers.

The process we're seeing with MRIP right now is that it doesn't provide that consistency because it's saying that 80 percent of our effort is coming from an unlicensed or unmatched strata which makes no sense at all, right? That's assuming we have a large scale of non-compliance with fishing licenses, and that's just not what we observe. So this would — it would be a fundamental change in how it's operated.

It would shrink the universe down that

would allow us to focus to it and basically say, this is the best way for us to approach reef fish landings. It needs to be tailored.

JOE SPRAGGINS:

And if somebody goes to the effort of buying a license to do this — they're kind of like a duck stamp, you know, a federal duck stamp that you buy or whatever. Number 1, they're going to hunt in a duck stamp, and Number 2, they're going fish in this on — the majority of the people if you charge a fee for it.

And then on top of that, most of them that — when — I've talked to, people pretty much are accurate about what they do because they know what it means. They know what it means to the fisheries, and they know what it means to the state and what it means to the resource. And so they want to maintain the resource just like we do and everything else, and so they're more accurate about doing it.

Where, if you just sample someone around out here that is not even a — going fishing or anything, they don't really pay that much attention about it. If you're not a duck hunter, you don't really care, but yet, you have got a

duck stamp.
TREVOR MONCRIEF:

Yeah.

JOE SPRAGGINS:

But if you pay \$25 and get a federal duck stamp, then you're going to probably care and that's what we're looking at.

TREVOR MONCRIEF:

Yeah. That's the discussion that's being had and needs to be had amongst the states because it's a state-specific priority.

But if you bring it back to, like, the hunting realm, you're almost comparing something like the HIP permit — which is just a simple add—on, tack—on, which likely has oversubscription, right? You probably have more people getting that HIP permit that never touch any migratory birds at all versus the duck stamp where it's — you know, costs a little bit of money and you have to spend it. That helps you rid that oversubscription problem, and then it allows you to bring in those funds like what the duck stamp does to be able to put toward habitat or programs to monitor harvest, all that kind of stuff. It will kind of give us that same ability.

19 1 RONNIE DANIELS: 2. I fill out the HIP every year whether or 3 not I end up hunting or not. 4 TREVOR MONCRIEF: 5 That's right. 6 RONNIE DANIELS: 7 But I don't buy that duck stamp till the 8 night before. 9 RICK BURRIS: 10 That's right. That's a perfect example. 11 And the alternative and what -- the way this was 12 proposed is that they wanted -- the people that proposed it wanted a federal license. 13 The South Atlantic Regional -- South Atlantic Council is 14 15 going down this route of federal licensing. And I 16 think NOAA and the states both agree that the 17 states are better off to handle it as we already 18 have the infrastructure in place and we will 19 utilize it the way it -- we will implement it the 20 way it needs to be implemented in fairness for the 21 anglers. So that's why we're pushing for the

Yeah. And I do think that if we do it

individual states to be doing it collaboratively

rather than NOAA implementing the license.

as a state, it will be a lot more reasonable price and we will be able to do that. And as Rick said, each state has their own process now.

Now, we have — what I would like for y'all to do is basically — if you don't mind doing it, is direct the agency to move forward and to try to come up with a plan of how to do this either as an endorsement or either a permit or an extra license fee, you know, whatever it would be. Would y'all be willing to do something like that? RONNIE DANIELS:

I'm absolutely in favor of it. I would like to — for us to make every effort to explain to the public the benefit of this because I can see a lot of naysayers saying, oh, they're just adding something to us, and that's not it at all. We're working towards increasing what they're able to do.

JONATHAN McLENDON:

Well, and, Rick, do we have any data from Alabama and Louisiana about the percentage of participation that they receive on this endorsement?

RICK BURRIS:

I know like Trevor said, Louisiana,

1	their compliance rate is pretty high. I think
2	Alabama is pretty close, too, right?
3	TREVOR MONCRIEF:
4	They just started.
5	RICK BURRIS:
6	They just started, but it's in the upper
7	80 to 90 percent compliance rate.
8	JONATHAN McLENDON:
9	No. I'm talking about like so if you
10	get the saltwater license and you want the federal
11	endorsement, what
12	RICK BURRIS:
13	What percentage?
14	JONATHAN McLENDON:
15	percentage of the saltwater license
16	man gets the federal endorsement?
17	RICK BURRIS:
18	We can go get those specific numbers for
19	you, no problem.
20	JOE SPRAGGINS:
21	It's got to be considerably less.
22	RICK BURRIS:
23	Oh, yeah.
24	JOE SPRAGGINS:
25	I'm sure it is. And I know in

1 Mississippi, it's considerably less. And, I mean, 2 you know, some of the people in Mississippi when 3 they buy a sportsmen license and it had, "do you 4 want saltwater, "they didn't buy it. You know, 5 they just like to support -- people -- a lot of 6 people just like to support Wildlife and 7 Fisheries. 8 RICK BURRIS: 9 And it takes -- when you -- yeah, that 10 type of mindset, you're just making it hassle 11 free, so if you want to go saltwater fishing, you 12 already have it. 13 JOE SPRAGGINS: 14 Yeah. 15 RICK BURRIS: 16 But just to give you -- we've got about 17 3- to 5,000 Tails and Scales users, and that's 18 going to be the majority of the universe. We're 19 thinking about 8,000, 10,000 is the most, but 20 about 3- to 5,000 is what you're going to see 21 here. 22 JONATHAN McLENDON: 23 Now, what would this do to Mississippi 24 if we didn't participate in something like this 25

and the other states are? How would this affect

our data and our share allocation?
RICK BURRIS:

I don't think it would be very beneficial to us to not participate.

JOE SPRAGGINS:

Well, and we do want — as Ronnie said, we want the people to understand. And this is something that we won't just come and ask you to do. We will put together a process and maybe by next meeting, if it's okay with y'all, that — we'll put together some information and we'll bring it out.

And then we'd have public notice on it, and then we'll go out and have a public meeting on it. But, you know, just something for people to understand. And I agree with you 100 percent, we want everybody to be 100 percent understanding what we can as much as possible.

But this is a benefit to the fishermen, even though it's costing them a little bit of money. And, you know, what the fee is, I don't know. We'd have to look at that if there is a fee, what we want to do. We would have to look at it and make sure that this is okay.

But if it's all right with y'all, we'll

6	JOE SPRAGGINS:
7	I don't think we have to have a motion
8	or something, Sandy, do we? We can just do this?
9	SANDY CHESNUT:
10	No.
11	CAM ROBERDS:
12	I think the sooner we can move forward
13	the better because Memorial Day is right around
14	the corner.
15	JOE SPRAGGINS:
16	Yeah. I don't know that we're going to
17	get anything done between now and this season, but
18	at least we'll have something for the next one.
19	CAM ROBERDS:
20	So that will be for the 2024 season?
21	JOE SPRAGGINS:
22	Yeah. At least we will have something
23	to put in there.
24	RICK BURRIS:
25	And the Council at the last the

1 Council charged the states to come together and 2 start working on it. Like the Director said, 3 there is a working group that's going to start 4 doing this and try to get all the -- so we can 5 implement the avenue to do it, but the data 6 collection part, the states are working on it 7 They're not concerned with what the collectively. 8 mechanism is as long as the mechanism is there, 9 and that's what we can do here. 10 JOE SPRAGGINS: 11 And, you know, if we had something today 12 to bring forward, it would still have to go out on 13 public comment, and that's 30 days and then we 14 would still have to do the other, so this is a 15 situation we're going to probably be into 2024, 16 but at least it gives us something to work with to 17 get headed in the right direction. 18 CAM ROBERDS: 19 I think it's a great idea. 20 JOE SPRAGGINS: 21 Anybody else got any questions? 22 other questions, Commissioners? 23 RONNIE DANIELS: 24 No, sir. Sounds good to me. 25 JOE SPRAGGINS:

1	All right. I think right now that's all
2	I have unless something pops up in my head before
3	the meeting is over.
4	RONNIE DANIELS:
5	All right.
6	RICK BURRIS:
7	Director, you want me to talk about
8	Marine Discovery Day?
9	JOE SPRAGGINS:
10	About what?
11	RICK BURRIS:
12	Marine Discovery Day.
13	JOE SPRAGGINS:
14	Yeah, if you want to. Yeah, go ahead.
15	RICK BURRIS:
16	Yeah. So we just want to let y'all know
17	on May 6th, we're going to be taking a lot of
18	we're going to take the agency and some other
19	entities, USM and Mississippi State and IMMS and
20	some others up to the Museum of Natural Science
21	for some marine education. It's called Marine
22	Discovery Day, but it's essentially marine
23	education outreach day.
24	The whole premise behind this is, I
25	think, everybody down on the Coast does a great

1 job of educating the public on the coastal 2 resources we have down here, but there's 3 70-something other counties that don't get to 4 enjoy our resources like we do. 5 And so we want to go somewhere 6 centralized. We're going to the Museum of Natural 7 Science and going to bring our natural resources 8 down here up there to share with all of them. 9 It's easier to do that than go to different 10 schools when they call you. If they can, we can 11 get everybody to come to one centralized location 12 and talk about our natural resources down here, then that's what -- that's the plan. 13 14 We're going to do that May 6th at the 15 Museum of Natural Science from 10:00 to 3:00, and 16 I feel fairly certain this will be the first of 17 many of these to come. 18 RONNIE DANIELS: 19 That's a great idea. 20 JOE SPRAGGINS: 21 I do have one other thing. You caught 22 me. 23 The legislature did give us the funds 24 available -- they gave us the availability to get 25 the funds if we want to come out from under MRIP,

under NOAA. They did put the funds in there this year to be able to use that. That would -- it would cost the state about \$750,000 a year to do it.

What we're trying to do — and NOAA knows this and Janet Coit knows it, who is the head of NOAA Marine Fisheries, and they're very hard trying to keep us from doing that. They don't want us to come out from under them. They want us to stay there, and we'd love for them to pay the 750,000 a year and not the State of Mississippi.

But if -- we're not going to do it unless we can make it work. And if we see we can't work out something to be able to do it, then we have the funds to do that and we will move forward and we will come out. And that would mean that from now on, we will do our own MRIP, and that's what the money would be for and we would pay for it. And then we would do our own study and it wouldn't be a NOAA study as to how we did it.

And that could — that's exactly what Louisiana did. And you have to do it for one year side by side and NOAA would pay their part and

1 we'd pay our part. And then after that, it's all 2 up to us and -- but they went from -- they went up 3 100-something thousand pounds this year because 4 that great -- you know, their study. Because they 5 did get it certified and we could get ours 6 certified. 7 RONNIE DANIELS: 8 So --9 CAM ROBERDS: 10 So is that -- go ahead, Ronnie. I'm 11 sorry. 12 RONNIE DANIELS: 13 Go ahead, Cam. 14 CAM ROBERDS: 15 I was just going to ask if that was a 16 third party or if they actually performed the 17 study in-house, Louisiana? 18 JOE SPRAGGINS: 19 They do it in-house, I think, is how 20 they do it, and they basically have people hired 21 to be able to do it. The same that we would do, 22 if we -- you know, we have people that do MRIP 23 that gets paid by NOAA right now. We would just 24 turn those people over to being paid by the state, 25 you know, through us, through our funds.

1 RONNIE DANIELS: 2 So what are we trying before we 3 implement that? 4 JOE SPRAGGINS: 5 Trying to get NOAA to understand, and 6 they're looking -- what they're doing is they're 7 looking at a possibility of adjusting the 8 allocation. And if they can adjust the 9 allocation -- we've got a proposal in right now to 10 raise ours to like 82-, 83,000. 11 And then they're also looking at a 12 couple of states, a possibility of them donating X 13 amount of -- to us until we can get this new study 14 done and get everything completed. And if they 15 can do that, then, you know, at least they're 16 working with us and at least we're getting 17 somewhere. 18 And -- but if we don't see that it's 19 working the way that we feel like it, we'll just 20 pull the plug and go forward the way we can. And 21 we do have -- thanks to the legislature, we do 22 have -- and the governor, we have the capability 23 of doing it. 24 RONNIE DANIELS:

All right.

1	JOE SPRAGGINS:
2	All right.
3	RONNIE DANIELS:
4	All right. That's all. Do the
5	commissioners have anything to report today?
6	SANDY CHESNUT:
7	We have the actions update.
8	JOE SPRAGGINS:
9	Oh, yeah. See, y'all told me. Actions
10	update.
11	SANDY CHESNUT:
12	At the March meeting, the Commission
13	recommended the approval of the requested
14	variances, proposed mitigation plan and requested
15	permit with the conditions that the traffic
16	control plan be reviewed and approved prior to
17	construction for the Jackson County Board of
18	Supervisors to construct a boat ramp associated
19	with associated piers, dredge canal and parking
20	area at the interaction of Beach Bayou Avenue and
21	Racetrack Road in Biloxi. That traffic control
22	plan has been submitted. It shows that the road
23	is going to be rerouted to the north, which will
24	increase pedestrian safety in that area.
25	And then we had approval of state

1	saltwater finfish records, all tackle blueline
2	tilefish for Joshua Taylor, and conventional
3	tackle, Gulf smoothhound, Cooper Seibert.
4	And then in other business, let's see,
5	Chairman Daniels requested that the agency take a
6	look at kayak guides and speak to the agency's
7	statement on same. I think Trevor is going to do
8	an update on that later on today.
9	RONNIE DANIELS:
10	Yep.
11	SANDY CHESNUT:
12	Okay. And that's it.
13	RONNIE DANIELS:
14	Thank you, Ms. Sandy.
15	SANDY CHESNUT:
16	You're welcome.
17	JOE SPRAGGINS:
18	All right. Maybe I'm through now.
19	RONNIE DANIELS:
20	You done? You sure?
21	All right. Commissioners, anything from
22	y'all?
23	CAM ROBERDS:
24	No.
25	JONATHAN McLENDON:

1 No, sir. 2 RONNIE DANIELS: 3 All right. We're going to move on to 4 Marine Patrol. It is Chief this week -- this 5 month. 6 KYLE WILKERSON: 7 Yes, sir. How y'all doing today? RONNIE DANIELS: 8 9 How are you? Good. 10 KYLE WILKERSON: 11 I'm well. Glad to see y'all all well. 12 I would just like to start to say all these 13 shootings we've been having in the last weeks have 14 really strained us to an end as a country and a 15 community, but I do think that our tenaciousness 16 as a country and a community, that we will get 17 through it and we will stay strong while we do that. 18 19 All right. Enough of that, the 20 commission report itself -- or the Marine Patrol 21 Citation Report, all your officers have been doing 22 a phenomenal job staying on top of things and 23 staying safe out there and with the general 24 public, keeping them safe. There were several citations written 25

1 this month. Checked over 1,500 folks this month, 2 which is pretty common. I think it's -- it's 3 going to double when the boating season really 4 kicks off, so the officers are prepared and they 5 are looking forward to the task itself. 6 Any questions on any of the citations? 7 I will field any questions. 8 RONNIE DANIELS: 9 Looks pretty straightforward to me. 10 Nothing. 11 KYLE WILKERSON: 12 Okay. Well, what we're going to have --13 I think we also have a wake zone proposal. Deputy 14 Chief Gex will proceed over that. Thank you. 15 RONNIE DANIELS: 16 Thank you, Chief. 17 BRYAN GEX: 18 Good morning. This is a request for 19 reconsideration from Jackson County I received 20 right after our last commission meeting last 21 month. As y'all know, we tabled in June or July 22 of '22 -- there was four parts to a no wake zone in Fort Bayou. And they are asking for 23 24 reconsideration for what was Leg Number 4, and 25 it's just an extension of the already-existing

state-required no wake zone.

There is a boat ramp that's underneath the bridge at Fort Bayou, and the state-required no wake zone exists east and west 100 feet from the boat ramp adjacent to it, which just allows for the wake zone to extend to what we call the dolphins, which are the pilings that are gathered together as you enter the channel going under the bridge. That's the only thing that's covered under that 100 foot.

So what they're requesting in Jackson County is an extension east and west. It's a total of 1,600 -- one second. It's 1,620 feet, I believe.

And there is a view of the proposed no wake zone, Leg Number 4, of the original proposed no wake zone, which is what we're considering today.

The effects to boaters are vessels will be traveling from the coordinates at idle speed for three minutes and 22 seconds. That also includes the existing no wake zone, which isn't an awful long time to be under no wake.

Special considerations in the area,
Leg 4 will only be an extension of the

state-required no wake zone, as I said. And southwest of Fort Bayou Bridge is marina. It's open to the effects of wakes and there is several large vessels that are moored there.

So with the extension -- I mean, with the existing no wake zone, as vessels start to come down and plow, they are causing a bigger wake in that area of that marina if we don't consider it.

So the Office of Marine Patrol endorses the establishment of a no wake for Leg Number 4 due to public access areas in which people fish, boat and socialize.

RONNIE DANIELS:

Why does it go so much further to the southwest than it does to the northeast?

BRYAN GEX:

I believe that -- I've already gone past. Sorry, Cam. Right there.

I believe the reason why is, as you can see to the east, there is a very little area for the public to gather. You can see — I don't know where the pointer is on this thing, but you can see the open marina just to the west of the bridge right there. That's a large area where people

1 gather. There's also some piers behind Aunt 2 Jenny's restaurant and there is another large 3 structure that's just at the end of the west side 4 of there, and I think they want to cover all of 5 that. 6 CAM ROBERDS: 7 Not only that, but there is --8 the way -- when you go into the boat launch, you 9 have to enter from the west side. There's a pier, 10 so you can't get to the east from the boat launch. 11 BRYAN GEX: 12 Correct. 13 CAM ROBERDS: 14 You actually have to come out under the 15 bridge and go west. So I know this area well and 16 I believe it's -- it will be beneficial to be able 17 to extend it. It bottlenecks. There's a lot of 18 boats coming in there and coming out at the same 19 time, so --20 RONNIE DANIELS: 21 Yeah. I was about to say that's your 22 backyard. 23 CAM ROBERDS: 24 It is. It is, yeah. It's a -- it would 25 definitely help. And there's more development

1 coming in. I think Gulf Hills is looking at a --2 you know, at some point doing a marina, so it's 3 just going to add traffic and -- you know, and all 4 those boats that are -- that's a pretty busy spot 5 in the summertime. 6 BRYAN GEX: 7 It's very busy. 8 CAM ROBERDS: 9 They are all coming to the west. 10 BRYAN GEX: 11 We were there -- we were there covering 12 a call recently and there was a lot of activity 13 and it does bottleneck right there under the 14 bridge. So I can imagine as vessels start to come 15 down to meet the no wake zone -- those are like 16 40- to 50-foot vessels that are moored at that 17 marina and they're probably taking the brunt of 18 all that wake. 19 RONNIE DANIELS: 20 Anybody got anything else? 21 CAM ROBERDS: 22 Nope. 23 RONNIE DANIELS: 24 All right. 25 JOE SPRAGGINS:

1 revenue was \$5.1 million, and total agency revenue 2 was 22.3 million. 3 Our state net income was a negative 4 746,000 and agency net income was negative 5 3.7 million. 6 After nine months of Fiscal Year 2023, 7 the agency has 84.5 percent of the budget 8 remaining, while Tidelands budget has 45.4 percent 9 of the budget remaining. 10 Do y'all have any questions? 11 RONNIE DANIELS: 12 No, ma'am. Thank you. 13 All right. Public affairs. 14 CHARMAINE SCHMERMUND: 15 Good morning, Director Spraggins, 16 Commissioners, a legal Counsel. 17 The Mississippi Department of Marine Resources had 11 media mentions since the March 18 19 MACMR meeting. News items included a boating 20 accident in Ocean Springs, oysters in Mississippi 21 and the list of Tidelands and GOMESA projects on 22 the Coast. 23 Marine Patrol participated in a boater 24 safety presentation at D'Iberville Library on 25 March 30th, the Hancock Middle School Share Fair

on April 6th and the St. Mark's Open House and Community Fair on April 15th. Marine Patrol, along with the Office of Marine Fisheries, participated in North Bay Elementary Night Out on March 28th.

The Finfish Bureau's Jon Barr and Megan Fleming worked with approximately 75 fifth grade students from Ocean Springs Upper Elementary School on March 31st where the students observed seining and reviewed through the collected samples on East Beach in Ocean Springs.

The Oyster Harvester Training Class on April 4th had seven participants with five of the participants attending virtually and two in person.

The NERR, the Office of Marine
Fisheries, Coastal Resources Management, National
Heritage Area, Marine Patrol and Public Affairs
did a great job at this year's Celebrate the Gulf
Marine Education Festival on April 1st.

Hundreds of attendees took part in

Festival held at Memorial Park in Pass Christian.

Participants learned all about Our Mississippi

Gulf Coast through fun and educational activities

from a variety or agencies and organizations who

1 helped us put on this wonderful event. 2 RONNIE DANIELS: 3 That was another one we lucked up on the 4 It was supposed to rain from daylight weather. 5 till dark, and we ended up having some really 6 decent weather or that one. 7 Thank you, Charmaine. All right. Trevor, kayak. 8 9 TREVOR MONCRIEF: 10 Good morning again, Commissioners. 11 Karen, do you mind pulling up the 12 request paragraph that was up there? The request. 13 All right. So our office and Marine 14 Patrol have worked together to get some background 15 information, not only for, you know, what we have on the books for our state, but also what's going 16 17 on across the Gulf on the subject. 18 Essentially, what it comes down to is 19 that nearly all states, except for one, which I'll 20 discuss here in a minute, consider charter fishing 21 directly applicable to a vessel. 22 Now, there is a reason for that, right? 23 The vessel then ties in an OUPV license. Well, 24 then -- which then brings in safety and first aid, 25 insurance, you know, the captain's license,

requirements for knowing how to boat properly, all that kind of stuff. So that's typically why all this stuff is tied into a vessel.

There is one state, Texas, who has what is called an all-water paddle craft fishing license and that deals specifically with kayaks. Now, what they do, right, in order to ensure that there are other requirements associated with that license are put in safety and first aid training, a paddle craft course and associated like TPWD boater safety courses and stuff like that.

All right. So there is a couple of options to consider here. So status quo right now is that if those individuals are participating in that kind of activity everyone has to have a fishing license across the board, right? There is no specific charter endorsement for a kayak.

Since they can't meet the current statute rules that are applied to the charter boat license, technically it's -- you know, they can't -- they don't have to provide the captain's license associated with the vessel registration, right, because it's a kayak.

So if we keep status quo, everyone would have to have a license. That activity would keep

undergoing, you know, essentially not being licensed by the state.

If you want us to develop language and look further into it, then the direction we'd go is probably write up some draft language with whatever requirements that the Commission sees fit, if that's what y'all wish to pursue.

And those requirements might include things like the necessary certifications or courses that are associated with it and also maybe something like insurance because that's a requirement on the current charter captain side.

As far as the in-state and out-of-state thing, how Texas handles it currently is that a resident gets a certain fee, and then the non-resident fee for it is five times higher than the resident.

But we would have the options to do how the Commission would like to proceed on it. If they want to do the same thing as Texas and charge a higher fee and all that since there are licenses available in other states and reciprocity doesn't fall in, we would essentially, you know, have the ability to set what we feel would be the correct price for it.

1 RONNIE DANIELS: 2 And so did we find out anything? I know 3 Marine Patrol Chief said they were going to look 4 into trying to -- do we know what the realm of 5 this thing is because right now, I'm just working 6 off of hearsay? 7 TREVOR MONCRIEF: 8 To my knowledge, I think Kyle and them 9 looked in. I'll say me and Matt went, pore back 10 through our memories and probably have less than a 11 half dozen times where we've gotten calls about 12 this specific subject and folks asking what the 13 requirements are. 14 KYLE WILKERSON: 15 We found one incident, out of Mobile for 16 that matter. Nothing towards the west or 17 anything, so it's pretty -- I'm not saying it 18 doesn't happen, but as of within the last six 19 months, no. 20 RONNIE DANIELS: 21 Okay. So y'all didn't find anybody 22 advertising this type service? 23 KYLE WILKERSON: 24 Not a one. 25 RONNIE DANIELS:

1 I think it's something definitely worth 2 keeping an eye on. I mean, the kayak fishery is a 3 really cool thing for a lot of people, and it has 4 really exploded. My fear is, that if we do have 5 people doing this is just making sure that level of safety is there. 6 7 KYLE WILKERSON: Of course. 8 9 RONNIE DANIELS: 10 You know, especially people coming from 11 other places and it's -- that's a situation that 12 you can get in trouble real quick. 13 KYLE WILKERSON: 14 I agree. 15 RONNIE DANIELS: I've seen a lot of videos of people 16 17 flipping over in those things fighting a fish, and firsthand knowledge of some people that accidently 18 19 ended up on Cat Island from Long Beach, so --20 KYLE WILKERSON: 21 That's right. And we've got to go get 22 them. 23 RONNIE DANIELS: 24 Yeah. 25 KYLE WILKERSON:

1	That's right.
2	RONNIE DANIELS:
3	Exactly. Exactly. All right. Well
4	JOE SPRAGGINS:
5	Real quick on that, I know Wildlife just
6	passed a bill for charter fishing in, you know,
7	state waters as far as freshwater. Is there
8	anything in their bill about that; do you know?
9	TREVOR MONCRIEF:
10	I think Matt has got a pretty good
11	knowledge about it, but from what I remember
12	reading, it still ties it into a vessel-based
13	activity, which then brings in, you know, all
14	those requirements.
15	JOE SPRAGGINS:
16	Okay. All right.
17	RONNIE DANIELS:
18	All right. Thank you, Chief.
19	KYLE WILKERSON:
20	Yes, sir.
21	RONNIE DANIELS:
22	All righty. Nothing on Grand Bay NERR.
23	Do we have any other business today?
24	JOE SPRAGGINS:
25	Just one thing, I would ask, if the

1	
1	Commission would, to close in honor today of two
2	people, Mr. Robert McClellan who is Micki's son.
3	He worked with us, and he fought a battle of
4	cancer for a long time and passed away at 34, 35
5	years old. So if we could close in his memory,

8	appreciate it.
9	RONNIE DANIELS:
10	Absolutely. And we have no public
11	comments, so we're going to move forward with
