6	hires and then several promotions there, if you
7	can see those.

11	No. It's just the list up there is
12	different than the one on our screen.
13	JOE SPRAGGINS:
14	And I don't think that's what those
15	BRADY SMITH:
16	There's a late addition on there.
17	RONNIE DANIELS:
18	Oh, there's one additional.
19	CAM ROBERDS:

25	JOE SPRAGGINS:

Okay. All right. Any questions on 1 2 those? 3 (No response.) 4 JOE SPRAGGINS: 5 All right. No procurement contracts. 6 And agency update: We will go to the 7 Bonnet Carré, and out of Bonnet Carré right now, 8 we have about -- had 70 -- all 72 of the charters 9 have been sent final payments, so everybody is 10 paid up in the charter boat. 11 We are emerging seafood technologies. 12 We've got about 3,694,000, and we are working on 13 that as we talk and getting the program together. 14 As far as our fisheries, as far -- let's 15 I was trying to see if I had that in front 16 Here we go. 27 of the 31 signed dealers' 17 agreements have been sent final payment, so that's 18 been done. 217 of 288 signed commercial fishermen 19 agreements sent to base payment, and 60 agreements 20 are still in process, but I think that's been 21 updated since then because I know I signed at 22 least 50 in the last two days so I think we're 23 pretty close on that. 24 Additional commercial fishermen payments 25 based on trip ticket losses and process and --

hopefully, we will get that out sometime in January.

Any questions on the Bonnet Carré? (No response.)

JOE SPRAGGINS:

All right. Legislative session starts
January 2nd. We'll have four months of this year,
so it doesn't end till May. So I don't think we
will see anything happening very important in the
very first part of it because they first have to
start picking who's going to be chairmen and what
committees they're going to be on and everything
else. And so once we get through that, we'll
hopefully have a little bit of understanding.

Our goal is to -- we're not having a legislative update this year like we normally do for the pure reason, two things: Number 1, I'm trying to get everything to the governor's office about what we want to do; and Number 2 is I need to know who the chairmen are so we can start meeting with them and talk to them about it.

So hopefully, what we'll plan on doing is, sometime mid to late January, have a meeting in Jackson and invite y'all, if you would like to come, and we'll sit down with them at either a

1 lunch or dinner or something and go over our legislative, what we want to do. 2 3 Any questions on that? 4 (No responses.) 5 JOE SPRAGGINS: All right. As far as holidays, we'll be 6 7 closed Monday and Tuesday of next week for 8 Christmas and Christmas -- the day after, and then 9 we will be closed on January 1st. 10 The next Commission meeting is scheduled 11 for Tuesday, January 16th at 9:00 a.m. Any 12 problem with that? 13 RONNIE DANIELS: 14 I don't think so. 15 JOE SPRAGGINS: 16 We're good. 17 All right. Derelict vessels, I have -a total of 129 derelict vessel cases have been 18 19 reported; 83 have been removed; 46 are pending and 20 five are in court orders at this time. 21 And also, we did receive -- we're trying 22 to just work out the details with GOMA. It was 23 about \$1.5 million in federal money to be able to 24 use for that, so hopefully, we won't have to use 25 as much state money.

Any questions on any of those? (No response.)

JOE SPRAGGINS:

All right. As far as anything else for the agency, I think we're moving along. We're in the comment period as far as the on-bottom leases, and so if anybody has comments, they need to send them in. And then we will go back and review that and then we'll decide which way to go from that point.

No contracts have been leased at this time. We're just basically looking at what people are asking for and where they're at and then we have got to go back somehow and be able to justify that they have the financial means to do this and also that they have the experience, you know, which we just questioned on the initial RFP. So we will have to go back and look at those and we'll look at it and see how we operate.

But -- so if you've got any -- anybody has any comments or anything else, please send them in because we would like to see what they have to say about it, and hopefully get something working by the first part of next year to be able to sit down and go over that.

1 Any questions? If not, that's all I have and I'll turn it over to agency update from 2 3 the prior meeting. 4 SANDY CHESNUT: 5 Okay. At the November meeting, the 6 Commission recommended and the Director approved 7 the following: For the Executive Director to 8 establish a crab trap closure in public waters for 9 the purpose of conducting a derelict crab trap cleanup for 10 days in 2024. The closure area and 10 11 dates will be based on stakeholder feedback. 12 Then there was a motion to recommend 13 notice of intent for regulatory changes to Chapter 8, Title 22, Part 9, and I know those --14 15 that went out and that will be discussed later in 16 the program. 17 And then we had a motion to recommend 18 approval of the state saltwater finfish records 19 for conventional tackle, for Florida pompano, five 20 pounds, .64 ounces for Stefanson Smith; and an 21 Irish pompano, 5.9 ounces for Cecily O'Brien. 22 And that is it. 23 RONNIE DANIELS: 24

Thank you, Ms. Sandy.

SANDY CHESNUT:

25

1 You're welcome. 2 JOE SPRAGGINS: 3 All right. And I think that's the only thing we have as far as the Director's report. 4 5 RONNIE DANIELS: 6 All right. Thank you, Joe. 7 Do any of our commissioners have 8 anything to report today? 9 (No response.) 10 RONNIE DANIELS: 11 All right. Quiet month. RONNIE DANIELS: 12 Next up, we're going to have office of 13 14 marine patrol. We've got Captain Freeman filling 15 in for Chief Wilkerson. 16 WILL FREEMAN: 17 Good morning. The month of December --18 excuse me, the month of November, you can notice 19 some of the citation numbers are up. I know there was a question perhaps about the number of overall 20 21 citations, and there has been an increase in about 22 20 percent in the total number of stops made in 23 the two fiscal years already. So I think if you have any questions 24 about why the citation numbers are up -- I'm not 25

1	saying it's going to be a proportionate increase,
2	but the number of stops are up, and you would
3	expect the number of citations to be up as well.
4	JASON OSBORNE:
5	Yeah. And just I think I was the one
6	that asked the question, and I apologize because I
7	guess I didn't hadn't really focused on it at
8	previous meetings to see the trend.
9	WILL FREEMAN:
10	Yes, sir.
11	JASON OSBORNE:
12	But when we're seeing FY23 year to
13	date so the timetables are the same, right?
14	WILL FREEMAN:
15	Yes, sir.
16	JASON OSBORNE:
17	So it's not six months versus 12 months?
18	WILL FREEMAN:
19	That's correct.
20	JASON OSBORNE:
21	Is there anything that you feel like we
22	could be doing to help you better in this or
23	educating the public or
24	WILL FREEMAN:
25	That may be a discussion that's better

1	held with Colonel Wilkerson.
2	JASON OSBORNE:
3	Okay.
4	WILL FREEMAN:
5	Yeah.
6	JASON OSBORNE:
7	Perfect. Well, if you would, let him
8	know that we're willing to talk to him and if
9	there's support that you guys need or something we
10	can be doing to help in that because that's a
11	pretty big increase. And I don't know what the
12	difference is between '23 and '24, but that seems
13	a little crazy, so but thank you.
14	WILL FREEMAN:
15	Any other questions?
16	(No response.)
17	WILL FREEMAN:
18	Thank you.
19	RONNIE DANIELS:
20	All right.
21	Next up, we're going to have Ms. Leslie
22	Brewer, Finance and Administration.
23	LESLIE BREWER:
24	Good morning, everybody. I'm presenting
25	the financials for November 30th, 2023.

1 At the end of the month, state revenue was 4.2 million. Agency revenue was 19.1 million. 2 3 State net income was 1.4 million, and 4 agency net income is 5.3 million. 5 It's a pretty normal month. After five 6 months, we have 94.6 percent of the budget 7 remaining for operations, and Tidelands is at 8 75 percent. 9 Anybody have any questions? 10 RONNIE DANIELS: 11 No, ma'am. Thank you. LESLIE BREWER: 12 13 Thanks. 14 CHARMAINE SCHMERMUND: 15 Good morning. The Mississippi 16 Department of Marine Resources had eight media 17 mentions since the November MACMR meeting. 18 News items included the dedication of 19 Gollott Island, Mississippi granting private leases for oyster reefs and the upcoming closing 20 21 of shrimp season in Mississippi waters. 22 The Office of Marine Patrol took part in 23 the Sea Santa Sail-a-bration with the City of Long Beach on December 2nd, and Alicia Carron with the 24 25 Shellfish Bureau hosted the virtual oyster

1 harvester training class on December 12th with a total of nine participants. 2 3 We just also released our latest issue of Coastal Markers. I put that in the back. And 4 5 we are expecting our delivery of calendars today, 6 so those will be out on the Coast by Friday. 7 RONNIE DANIELS: Those are hot items. 8 9 CHARMAINE SCHMERMUND: 10 Very hot item, yes. 11 RONNIE DANIELS: 12 I've been getting phone calls too. 13 CHARMAINE SCHMERMUND: Lots of phone calls, so -- but they will 14 15 We have all the teams ready to distribute be out. 16 them, so they will be out by Friday. 17 Thank you. 18 RONNIE DANIELS: 19 All right. Marine Fisheries, Trevor. 20 TREVOR MONCRIEF: Good morning, Commissioners, Director. 21 22 I think we're setting a pace on brevity today. 23 RONNIE DANIELS: 24 We're moving. 25 TREVOR MONCRIEF:

All right. So this is going to be the final adoption of the offshore landing permit that we discussed in the previous month. So as y'all are aware, November 21st, 2023, y'all recommended to the Executive Director to move forward with the notice of intent on Title 22, Part 9 changes. We processed that and were able to get it to the Secretary of State's office that day.

So just to briefly touch back over the regulation itself that we went over, the high points here, it's essentially anyone outside of those currently listed as disabled and under 16 that have to possess this fishing license that will be an annual license that will run out December 31st, so it's basically going to be a yearly offshore license.

We're trying to identify, and to a degree, have a good number on the number of offshore fishing participants in our waters and be able to ask them specific questions within an effort survey that we're piloting out this year, similar to what Louisiana has done over the last eight or so years.

The -- you will be able to obtain this license through our website solely. There will be

a call option, of course, and you'll be able to get it through us without having to pay any fee at all, so it will be zero dollars. When you call, it will be to one of our employees in Marine Fisheries, basically the same folks that take the Tails and Scales calls, so you'll always have somebody there to answer the phone and get you on the list and get you out fishing that day.

And the species that we're including here basically any species of snapper, amberjack, grouper, triggerfish and cobia included. The only exceptions being made here is for mangrove snapper for those that are harvested within a line formed by the Intercoastal Waterway, simply because of the large-scale nature of our in-shore mangrove fishery in those inner harbors and everything else, especially this year.

So like I said, we got the regulation out to the Secretary of State pretty quick. The notice of the proposed regulation was published in the *Sun Herald* on the 24th, and the notice of the proposed regulation was posted on our website that day, on the 21st, and here is copies of all three of those.

And then, checked the e-mail this

morning. I haven't got any mail or anything else like that. I did get a couple of calls from folks just asking for clarifying information, but no public comments have been received to date.

And with that, I will take any questions you may have, and then we will just need to move forward with final adoption, have a motion for it should y'all be good with it.

JONATHAN MCLENDON:

Real quick, Trevor, like, where do like young kids and the people with disabilities, even lifetime licenses come into play with this?

TREVOR MONCRIEF:

So I copied over the regulation that was -- as it was written from the previous meeting. What we did add in there was an excerpt of a state statute, basically referencing the statute that explicitly outlines disability and under 16 and who's not required to have a license, so in this case, they would -- that falls the same way.

The difference will be that those who have a lifetime license or those who have the senior exempt lifetime license will need to get this license annually.

And that will be more of an education side of the thing, right? They haven't had to deal with a situation like this, nor are we going to, you know, think that they're going to have to, you know, move on to this and adopt it pretty quickly. We understand the challenge that may be ahead with them understanding it.

And realistically, this is all for the effort survey, to try to get an answer. And we have a pretty good idea at least of the percentage of folks that fall within the under 16 category. The disability is less known, but we know it's a small percentage, so we can have that one.

The trouble is, is on the senior exempt and the lifetime, those people are likely avid fishermen to a degree. They likely go proportionally more than most of the others, and we certainly want to be able to get the information from them and have them accounted for within the overall population, so that's why we've got that where we want them to have it every year That's kind of how it falls out. too. JONATHAN MCLENDON:

Thank you.

I'm sorry. I may have missed this -- and I wasn't here last month -- what is the process again for getting this?

TREVOR MONCRIEF:

So it's going to be housed on our website to be able to access and essentially, it's going to be a -- either through Survey 123 or a PDF submission form, essentially kind of how we've done applications in the past for Bonnet Carré and anything else like that. We're working with IT on finalizing the form and everything now. But that will be the process to get it.

At that point, you will be able to get the temporary number, the proof, and then we will be able to send out a hard card or anything else to folks for them to have it. But it's going to be housed on our website and if folks don't have access to the internet or can't get it from our website, there will a number to call and that number will go straight to one of the employees in the Finfish Bureau to be able to answer in-house.

And just like with Tails and Scales, right, we expect that we're going to get a rush of calls between that April and May time period, essentially when folks are first learning about

this and learning about the requirement and snapper season is coming up. And just like we have done in the past years, I mean, we answer calls at 11:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m. when we get them. And when folks don't answer, they just leave voice mails, and we get them taken care of and get them on the water as soon as possible.

RONNIE DANIELS:

I assume there will be some type of banner or something on Tails and Scales reminding people?

TREVOR MONCRIEF:

Yeah. We'll have a banner, likely some front-end. If you'll remember logging onto the app in the last two or three years, there's updating your contact information because you want to receive text messages of your trip authorization number, all that kind of stuff, same kind of application likely will be here to remind anglers of what's going on and where they can go to get it and there will be a live link on the app itself to be able to select and get onto this to be able to get on the permit as well. So that's kind of how we're trying to go down.

And there will be likely a fair amount

of -- at least information that's going to the public on this and the effort survey itself because there's going to be a lot of folks getting contacted here in the next four or five months for effort questions and everything else, including, you know, any one of y'all on the commission who hold a recreational license. I mean, everybody is going to be -- there's going to be a lot more contact this time for the effort survey.

RONNIE DANIELS:

And just be to be clear for people, this is in the fishermen's favor because we've had such skewed numbers on that effort which has translated into problems with our snapper quota.

TREVOR MONCRIEF:

Yeah. So the intent of this is to not be burdensome to any degree to the angler. It's our best step forward to try to gather more accurate recreational measures, which not only will help us with the snapper side of things, right -- we've got Tails and Scales which provides us great information -- but what this does is allows us to have more uniformity across the Gulf when it comes to Gulf-wide assessments on the federal level, but also at the same time be able

to get better estimates for our inshore species, like spotted seatrout, red drum, sheepshead, flounder, so that we have a better idea of how those fisheries are cycling year in and year out and really get a better handle on what's going on on the fishery independent side instead of having to rely so heavily on our — the fishery independent side for most of our assessments and everything else. So we're really advancing the fishery dependent side with this one.

CAM ROBERDS:

So essentially, the folks, the fishermen that hold the reef permit will get the same type of survey call for, you know, fish, for what they have caught or if they have fished, but it will just be that group of people, so you're separated from the inshore, sort of the mass of people that hold a license. It's just for these folks?

TREVOR MONCRIEF:

Yeah. So we've been going through the design stage of the effort survey over the last two months and essentially, what we're doing is separating out regions or sections for the anglers, so you have got coastal and non-coastal, which are split by the upper -- the lower two

counties here in a row. That's going to be coastal. Non-coastal is going to be up above. We've got out of state, which for us is usually around 10 percent across the board.

And then you'll have these individuals who hold the offshore permit, and essentially their effort and everything else will be constrained to their population, rather than expanded across the entirety of the coastal, non-coastal and out-of-state folks. So it really just isolates your groups to be able to make sure you're accounting for them in a more accurate manner, rather than taking what their activity is and spreading it across everybody.

JOE SPRAGGINS:

And one thing, you know, we're going to treat this just like he said, like Tails and Scales. I mean, you know, you have got to walk a

little bit before you run with it.

We will put it out. People will -obviously, some are not going to know about it.

Some won't get the message in time. They'll go
fishing. If they're caught -- if the Marine

Patrol pulls them over, they will give them a

"hey, this is what you need to do for the future."

We'll do that for a year at least and then work it out.

But everything that they do, this is going to help the fishermen because instead of having 80,000, we might have 18,000. I don't know. I'm just throwing a number out there. But when we survey off of that 18-, compared to 80-, then that's going to skew the numbers a lot more -- closer to where they're supposed to be and not out here in the left field somewhere.

Is that right, Trevor?

TREVOR MONCRIEF:

Yes. It will probably end up being around 10,000 individuals that are within this frame. So if you think about it, instead of having one amberjack that accounts for 300,000 pounds of harvest, we'll have one amberjack that is directly reflected on the individuals within that group so it won't blow up the numbers nearly as much.

And that's kind of where this whole thing is getting to, is adopting LA Creel in its totality to try to really get down to a system that works for us in our state and it's been proven in another state as well.

And if Alabama moves alongside there, we'll basically have over half of the Gulf States operating in a similar manner, which will allow for some consistency on the federal side and our federal species.

JOE SPRAGGINS:

And this is at no cost.

RONNIE DANIELS:

Yeah. And I think that the key to this thing is education to the people that are going to have to get it and letting them know, this is beneficial to you. I know you and I have had talks about this, as well as others. A lot of times these guys can't see the forest for the trees because they think we're just being more obtrusive and we're wanting something else from them, but this is all for our benefit in the long run.

TREVOR MONCRIEF:

Yeah. Yeah. We have never been in the business of trying to create overly burdensome regulations or anything else like that. We've always been more of keeping it simple and trying to do it the right way the first time, and this is just an example of that. We're getting the

opportunity to move forward with the program on the state side and be able to direct it a little bit more, rather than, you know, having to follow federal program guidelines. And this is a step we can take, we think, that's going to relieve a little of burden on the anglers and allow us to get the information that we need without having to be overly intrusive or asking them just a ton of questions all the time or mandating any hail-in/hail-out, anything else like that. I think it is the optimal solution for the time that we're in.

CAM ROBERDS:

And the time frame of this data, is it going to be a year, two years before you think it could be implemented?

TREVOR MONCRIEF:

Generally, we try to give it at least three when it comes to this kind of stuff. Now, when it comes to calibration and timeline for assessments and everything else, you're talking about what will likely have to be an expedited one. We're trying to push for not moving forward so hastily with federal assessments and coming up with new catch advice for a lot of these federal

species because it's just not -- it's not ending well for anybody in the fishery across the board, recreational, commercial, any stakeholder whatsoever.

But in all likelihood, it's a multiyear process. There will be some side-by-side that occurs. Whether it's a year or more or anything else like that, that will have to be a discussion with all the groups that are in play. But we'll start using the estimates as soon as we possibly can on the state side to gather better information.

The federal side is where the rubber meets the road when it comes to the SEDAR process and assessments and the species that are under a lot heavier management regimes and everything else. That's kind of where the process gets a little tough. But certainly, having multiple states in the Gulf that are all conducting a similar survey is going to be very helpful to essentially where we are now with five states, five separate surveys and an overall federal survey that just can't be calibrated across in a manner that's able to be reconciled.
