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JOE SPRAGGINS:

All right. First off, we'll start out with employment contracts. See what we have here. Dylan Kessen was promoted to master sergeant. And we've got a new hire, Katherine Wright, and she's an ENRS II in the Office of Marine Fisheries.

No contracts, I don't think we have -- all right.

As far as agency update, first off, if you have public comment, TJ is in the back.

Please, you know, get something to him and we will be glad to put it in the right spot here.

Update on -- we'll be closed on -- what? I don't know why she's got May 22nd on here, but she's got we'll be closed on May 22nd, but this is last year's -- last time's agenda, I think. I don't know what's going on.

Anyway, tidelands applications started on 31 May and will end in -- July 1st. GOMESA, the same way, so make sure you get those applications out. And let's make sure that if you get them in, then we can put them in. We're trying to get a portal made for the GOMESA so that you'll be able to go out and see what's in the GOMESA and see what's been funded and what hasn't

been funded, and then that way, it will be out there in the open to everyone.

Our billfish tournament, boy, it was great. I tell you what. 670 pounds, great fish, a lot of fish. I think somewhere in the neighborhood of 40, 50 billfish were caught, which is quite a bit.

RONNIE DANIELS:

Wow.

JOE SPRAGGINS:

And we had a lot -- we had 92 boats that went out that morning, and even the governor of Louisiana was there. And the governor even fished and he caught a billfish and it's on video if you want to see it. It's out there on his website somewhere or on somebody's website, but he was very gracious to us.

The team did a fantastic job cooking for them that night, and I'll tell you what, I've heard nothing but, you know, people just praising about the food. I was talking to -- I can't remember the guy's name. He owns the boat, Relentless, that little, small 160-footer, you know, but --

RONNIE DANIELS:

Uh-huh.

JOE SPRAGGINS:

And the governor was staying on it, and I was talking to him. He said, I come to three tournaments a year in the Gulf of Mexico and one of them is Biloxi. He said, I'm going to make sure that we come to the Gulf Coast because he said, it's one of the best tournaments we've ever been to. And he fishes the rest of the time — you know, he does a couple of others — two others and then he goes out in the Atlantic and fishes there. But he was talking to — about it and the others.

And I walked around the tables and -when people were sitting down that night and
not -- and everywhere I went, they said, this is
the best fishing tournament in the Gulf and we
love it and we want to be here and we're going to
come.

And they all loved the food, so hats off to all our team that cooked and everything else, and thank y'all for the ones that worked there.

We gave out, what, Charmaine, and them? We had some --

CHARMAINE SCHMERMUND:

1 Visors. 2 JOE SPRAGGINS: 3 Yeah. Have we got any of those left? 4 CHARMAINE SCHMERMUND: 5 [Jh-huh. 6 JOE SPRAGGINS: 7 Maybe get the commissioners one, you 8 know, give them a visor. 9 Any questions on the billfish? We will 10 sponsor it again next year. I think it's a great 11 deal because it's Gulf seafood, and that's exactly 12 what we did and people really enjoyed it. 13 Gulf Council will be next week, and me 14 and Rick will be headed over there, so it's in 15 Houston. We'll see what happens over in Houston 16 next week. I don't know. Right now, I don't -it's nothing really big, pressing going on, but we 17 18 will see how it turns out. 19 We'll be closed Independence Day and the 20 day after. The governor gave us the 5th of July 21 off also, and so we'll be closed both days, except 22 our Marine Patrol. They won't ever be closed. 23 KYLE WILKERSON: 24 Nuh-uh. 25 JOE SPRAGGINS:

No. They'll be out there in the middle
of it, and I'm sure some fisheries people will be
working, too, the same way.

JOE SPRAGGINS:

Okay. We'll plan on doing that.

All right. License at 65, you know, I have been talking to Rick and Patrick about this. Wildlife doesn't charge or doesn't require you to have a license at age 65 or above, but we do. It seems that this is a very good -- good thing talking to Rick and them this morning, even if we -- you know, it gives us a number of the people that are work -- that are actually fishing saltwater, and it's something different than what happens.

The numbers -- we don't have to have a number of how many people are catching bass. We don't have to have a number of how many people are

catching crappie. We have to have a number of how many people are catching certain foods in the Gulf of Mexico, so, I -- you know, I was very hard over -- you know, being an old guy myself. You know, I'm thinking, you know, why are we being -- why? But I think after listening to them, it might be something we need to keep going with.

I don't know the -- you know, the price is minimal. It's \$8 for a lifetime, so I'm not sure that that hurts anybody. If it is, I think we can work it out and, you know, help them if that's the case.

especially with the offshore landing permit, our fishing permit for that. If you don't have that and you're not required to have a license to fish or hunt inside the, you know, state waters there as far as the fresh water, then you have no number to put on — to be able to get that permit. And so that's another issue that we need to look at. So I think right now, you know, I just — I was going to bring it up. It was on my calendar, and I've been asked by several people why do we have to have it at 65 in saltwater over the — you know, the regular.

Now, I did find out that -- Rick was showing me this morning that wildlife has an option that you can buy one, but you don't have to. But I think we need to -- unless y'all have got some other issues on it, I think we need to stay the way we are. If it's hurting somebody for the \$8, then, you know, we can work that out. I think that's not the issue. It's more for the reporting, is what we need it for. We need it for the reporting more than anything.

Any questions on that? It's just been brought up to me a couple times.

All right. There's a thing called hurricane season. It's here, but, you know, we'll just see what happens. There's already been a couple of little disturbances out there. We'll just see what happens with it. It's in the Lord's hands, not ours. What's going to happen is going to happen. Just be prepared.

And if you're a boat owner and you have a big boat, especially, please find yourself a plan. Have yourself a plan to be able to move that boat to be able to take care of it and secure it. We've got -- we'll talk about derelict vessels in a minute, but we get quite a few of

those. But if -- you know, don't make yours be a derelict vessel. Take care of your boat, you know. Do like you would with your camper or anything else.

Shrimp season update, Jason, do you have anything on that? Jason, is that part of your brief? If it is, we'll hold off. I don't know. Is it part of your brief?

JASON SAUCIER:

Good morning, Commissioners. Just a quick update. Through May, we had about 1.5 million pounds landed in Mississippi for the calendar year so far, at a dockside value of about 1.8 million.

That's typically low for the first part of the year because we do have -- a lot of our waters are closed until we open the season, and then we usually see most of our landings occur in June, July and August, then sometimes on into September, depending on how much white shrimp is being landed.

But we're seeing a lot of good white shrimp being sold at the dock right now. They're selling some small brownies, too, but 10-15s is what we're seeing. We go down to the docks once

or twice a week just to check. Selling them for about \$4 or \$5 a pound. And the small browns are going for \$1 to \$2 a pound depending on the count.

But there's plenty of shrimp out there. We certainly encourage folks to get out there and buy local shrimp. And, you know, they're at Ocean Springs Harbor, Biloxi Harbor and Pass Harbor.

So I will take any questions, if y'all have any, but -JOE SPRAGGINS:

Thank you.

All right. Well, it looks like there is plenty of shrimp, so, you know, go get them while you can. And I tell you what, they're very fresh and they're very good.

Snapper season, we are at about 39,000, almost 40,000 pounds of about 64,000 and that's kind of understanding. We -- it depends on the weather. We had one bad weekend, the second weekend, that we didn't really see that many boats go out, you know, but most of the time -- this last weekend, they was full of them. I tell you what, there was quite a bit of boats out there and the week before. So we'll look at it as soon as -- we're trying to get it past -- through the

1 July 7th time frame. Hopefully, we will get there. If not, then we'll let people know if we 2 3 have to close it before then. And we are working -- in case you've got 4 5 any questions, we are working on MS Creel, and MS 6 Creel is going wide open with this, so hopefully, 7 we'll get the data to be able to alleviate this 8 problem in the future. 9 Bonnet Carré, you want to give us one, 10 Traci, on the Bonnet Carré update? 11 TRACI FLOYD: 12 Good morning. I have no change in the 13 numbers for the reporting periods since last 14 month, so we're waiting for that ruling from NOAA 15 on how far back we can go to start the processor's 16 grant portion. 17 JOE SPRAGGINS: 18 And we did file for the 2020? 19 TRACI FLOYD: 20 We did. Within the last week, we 21 submitted that proposal to NOAA. 22 JOE SPRAGGINS: 23 And that would be for commercial? Is it 24 shrimp and oysters only? 25 TRACI FLOYD:

14 1 Shrimp and oysters, on-bottom oysters 2 and it will be -- our plan is a direct payout for 3 that 2.9 million, but a lesser amount going to 4 cultch plants. 5 JOE SPRAGGINS: 6 Okay. So that's -- and that's 7 for the year 2020, now, not 2019, you know. 8 that -- as we tried to explain that. This --9 Bonnet Carré, was for 2019 only, and we can only 10 pay for that year. We can't pay for your losses 11 the year after that or the year before that. We 12 can only pay for your losses in the year 2019 up 13 to a certain point, and this will be for 2020. We 14 were able to get 3 million more for 2020, and so 15 we'll be able to pay for the losses in 2020 that 16 carried over. Isn't that right, Traci? 17 TRACI FLOYD: 18 19 That's correct. And that's only for those two fisheries, but we will certainly try to 20 21 help those folks. 22 JOE SPRAGGINS:

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24

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Okay. But once again, we're the only state that pays the fishermen, so at least we are getting something to them.

15 1 Any questions? 2 (No response.) 3 JOE SPRAGGINS: Thank you, Traci. 4 5 TRACI FLOYD: 6 Thank you. 7 JOE SPRAGGINS: 8 All right. The last thing I've got here 9 before we get -- we've got a couple of other 10 little things, but the derelict vessels, 157 of 11 them have been reported, 116 removed; 41 of them 12 are pending removal, and out of those 41, four of 13 them have already received court orders, so we're 14 doing a good job of that. And Roy and Steven are 15 doing a fantastic job working that out. 16 We -- out of the Gulf of Mexico, we are 17 probably 50 percent better than anybody because 18 when you talk to Texas and you talk to Louisiana 19 and you talk to Florida and you talk to Alabama, 20 they're nowhere near the numbers being removed 21 that we've got. So we've got a great team doing 22 it. It's fantastic. We love to -- we thank the 23 federal government for giving us the grant and --

it's 1.6 million so that helps us do that, but

we're doing great with it. We thank y'all.

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1 Any questions on that? If not, we'll go 2 to the actions updates. 3 STEVEN ECKERT: 4 Morning, Commissioners, Director. 5 Regarding our actions updates, discussed at the May 2024 meeting, the Commission 6 7 recommended and the Director approved the 8 following motions: Motion to recommend the 9 proposed changes to Title 22, Part 1 to conform 10 with the requirements of Senate Bill 2648 and 11 House Bill 1007 be sent to the Secretary of 12 State's office for notice of intent. 13 There was also a motion to recommend the 14 final adoption of the changes to Title 22, Part 3, 15 Chapter 7 of the recreational bag, possession and 16 size limit for the red snapper. 17 And then finally, there was a motion to 18 recommend the following state water -- state 19 saltwater finfish record for all tackle, the red grouper, being 27 pounds, 32 ounces -- .32 ounces 20 21 for Darin Grant. 22 And that is the actions update from the 23 prior meeting. 24 JOE SPRAGGINS: 25 Do we need a motion for that?                 All right. So getting to the report
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1 itself, we checked 2,488 vessels during the month of May. I would say probably three-quarters of 2 3 those are going to be Memorial Day weekend, as it is extremely busy. It was a little windy that 4 5 weekend. 6 We checked -- I would say our compliance 7 rate on checking snapper vessels was 8 14.25 percent. We were -- we wrote warning 9 citations for the recreational off -- offshore 10 landing permit. That's the new permit that we're 11 not going to write citations till next February. 12 I told the guys, let's ease up on them. We only 13 came across nine of them out of the ones we 14 checked. As of date -- as of to date, right now, 15 we're at 8.5 percent compliance rate on the snapper checks. 16 17 Other than that, the report is pretty 18 self-explanatory, but I will field any questions. 19 JOE SPRAGGINS: Now, you're only giving them a courtesy 20 21 warning for that? 22 KYLE WILKERSON: 23 Yes, sir. We only do a courtesy warning

due to the fact we can document it and keep

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1 Thank you, sir. 2 RONNIE DANIELS: 3 Moving on down. Next, we have 4 Ms. Charmaine, public affairs. 5 CHARMAINE SCHMERMUND: 6 Good morning. The Mississippi 7 Department of Marine Resources had 36 media 8 mentions since the May MACMR meeting. News items 9 included MDMR accepting proposals for GOMESA 10 projects, red snapper and shrimp season openings 11 and derelict vessels being removed along the 12 Mississippi Gulf Coast. 13 The Office of Marine Patrol took part in 14 Career Day at Beach Elementary in Pascagoula on 15 May 22nd, the summer reading program at Woolmarket 16 library on June 13th and a visit to Rainbow 17 Daycare on June 17th. The agency's cooking team, the 18 19 Mississippi Seafood program and agency volunteers 20 participated in the Billfish Classic's captains' 21 reception on June 5th at the Golden Nugget where boiled shrimp and fried fish filets were cooked 22 23 and served to over 500 quests in attendance. 24 We also provided a promotional booth

where we talked with attendees about -- and

25

1 distributed informational pieces and promotional 2 materials. That's it. 3 RONNIE DANIELS: Thank you, Charmaine. 4 5 All right. So next up, we're going to have Jason Rider, Marine Fisheries. 6 7 JASON RIDER: Good morning, Commissioners. Jason 8 9 Rider. 10 Today we're going to discuss the final 11 adoption for Title 22, Part 1, rules and 12 regulations for molluscan shellfish related 13 activities to conform with the requirements of 14 Senate Bill 2648 and House Bill 1007. 15 A lot of this information is the same 16 information as last month, so I will summarize it. 17 If y'all have any questions, let me know, but it will be summarized. 18 19 So the background, at the May 21st, 2024 Commission meeting, the Advisory Commission 20 21 recommended to the Executive Director that the 22 changes to Title 22, Part 1 be sent to the 23 Secretary of State's office for notice of intent. 24 The changes -- the summary of the 25 changes, we amended the requirements for the

tagging of shellfish in accordance to House Bill 1007, added and adjusted language to Chapter 10 according to Senate Bill 2648, added definitions pertaining to Senate Bill 2648 and amended the requirements for on-bottom molluscan shellfish leases according to Senate Bill 2648.

In Chapter 2, we updated some definitions. We added "adverse pollution conditions" and "certification" or "certify."

Additionally, we updated some language. We removed some language in our permits, and then added some language that states: "Renewal of these permits is required on an annual basis with the expiration occurring on April 30th of each year." Again, this complies with our standard licensing timeline, so we just wanted to get everything standardized.

Continuing with definitions, we added "container, cultivation" and "most probable number."

"Propagation" was added. "Relay" was added and "trip ticket" was added to the definitions in Chapter 2.

In Chapter 3, we did update some language in there. We added "if applicable" to

check stations. And the oyster hotline, we stated "or other means of notifications." This just allows us to notify people through social media and text messages or other variety of ways.

In Chapter 4, we removed some language and added some language regarding how the vessels will be checked out at the landing locations.

Chapter 5, we did update this substantially to comply with private leaseholders being able to print and produce their own tags. It has to be in accordance with the agency -- with the agency's guidelines, but in here, we did designate how they should be printed, the size and the standardization of all those tags.

Again, in Chapter 5, we just indicated some information that includes the harvester's identification number assigned by authority, the harvest date, harvest area, type of shellfish, quantity of shellfish and then the statement that the model ordinance requires.

Additionally, we put that the tags should be -- should -- "must be landed at an approved dock with the tags attached prior to shipment and tags shall be filled out."

And then the last one on this -- in this

chapter was we said that the fasteners could be on the outside of the sack.

In Chapter 8, we added some language regarding approved cultch material and then we deleted "generally accepted cultch materials" and added "approved cultch material" in there.

And Chapter 10, this is regarding the molluscan shellfish leases. We did make some adjustments to this. We removed the four corners statement and then added "if the lease configuration does not have definitive corners, the boundaries must be marked in a manner that clearly identifies the lease area." We did delete "D."

Continuing with Chapter 10, we added some language regarding private aids to navigation for off-bottom molluscan shellfish. It just requires them to notify the Army Corps of Engineers.

For the lease application in Chapter 10, again, we deleted some language from the previous years, "applications are available at the DMR office." And then we updated it. "Applications will be available at the MDMR office and on its website." And then the applicants must be a firm,

corporation or shall be organized under the laws and the state of Mississippi, registered with the Secretary of State's office and owned by a resident of Mississippi -- of the State of Mississippi, excuse me.

Number 6, we deleted some language just to clean up and standardize things.

Continuing with Number 7, this is where we deleted language to comply with the new Senate Bill for -- in 2024. We eliminated some things. And then, again, with the lease application review process, we eliminated some language that was outdated at this time, and we wanted to -- we added the "qualifications established in Mississippi Code 49-15-27," which was updated in 2024.

And continuing with edits to Chapter 10, we have those there. Lease conditions, again, updated some language, deleted some language. We did remove "before or after July 1st of each year." The leases are for 15 years. Each application is a minimum for one acre, but must not exceed 2,500 acres. And then deleted Number 9 and 10. And Number 11, we changed from 100 feet to 50 yards, and that's the area between the

1 leases. 2 Chapter 10, we deleted Number 5 and 3 Number 7 regarding event of default and reporting Again, continuing with deletions and 4 activities. 5 update. So at this point, the notice of the 6 7 proposed regulation was published in the Sun Herald on May 26th, 2024. The notice of the 8 9 proposed regulation was also posted on the MDMR 10 website on May 23rd, 2024. No public comments 11 were received to date. 12 And at this time, the staff's 13 recommendation is for the Executive --14 recommendation to the Executive Director that the 15 proposed changes to Title 22, Part 1 be sent to 16 the Secretary of State's office for final 17 adoption. 18 Does anyone have any questions? 19 (No questions.) 20 RONNIE DANIELS: 21 Doesn't sound like it. That's a lot of 22 cleaning up. 23 JASON RIDER: 24 Yes, we did. We had some work to do, 25 so...
