Where is Crescent City?**

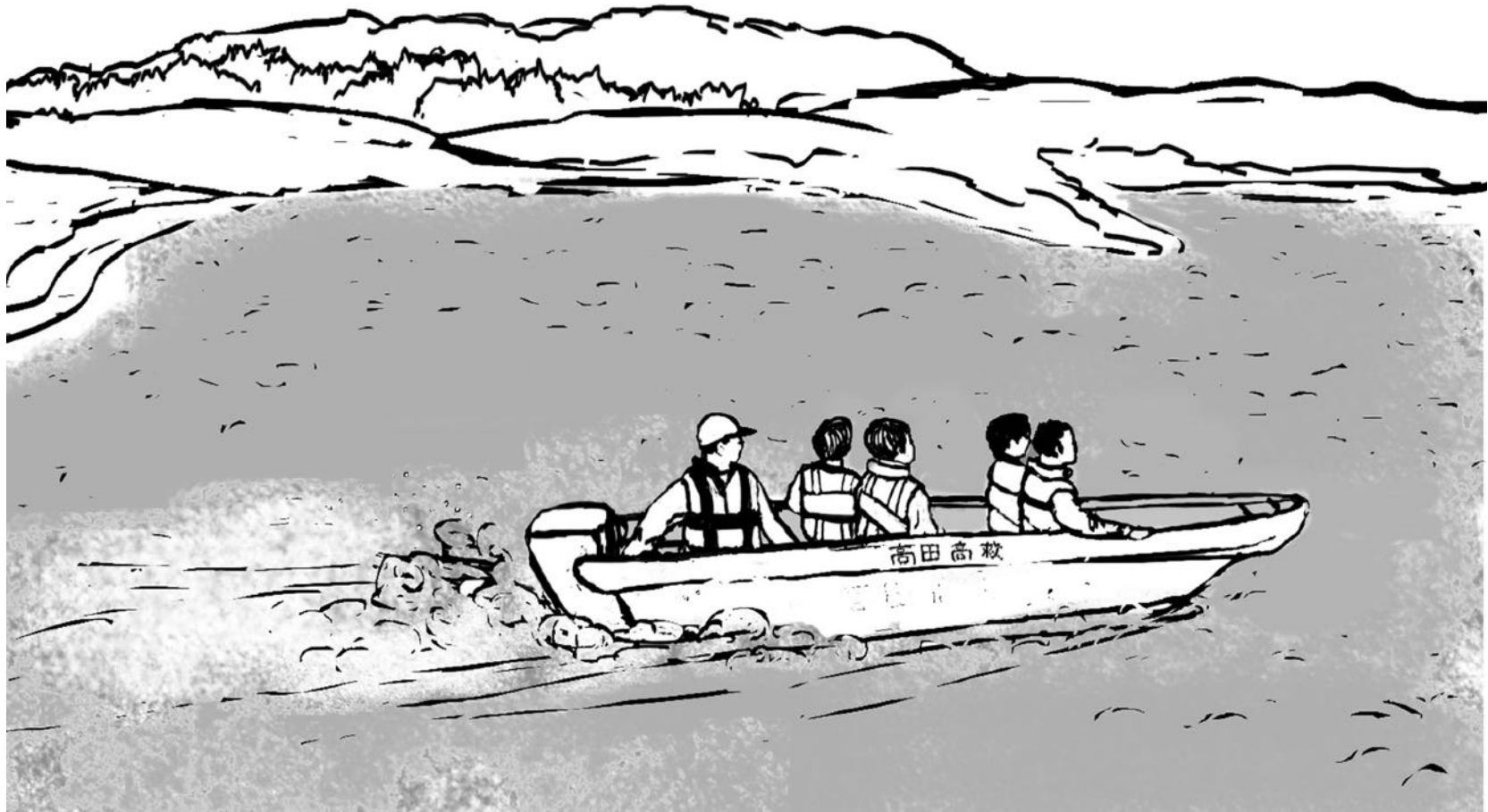
Draw a line showing how Kamome got to California.

Here are some of the people who live in Crescent City. What do you think they do? Draw yourself into the picture.



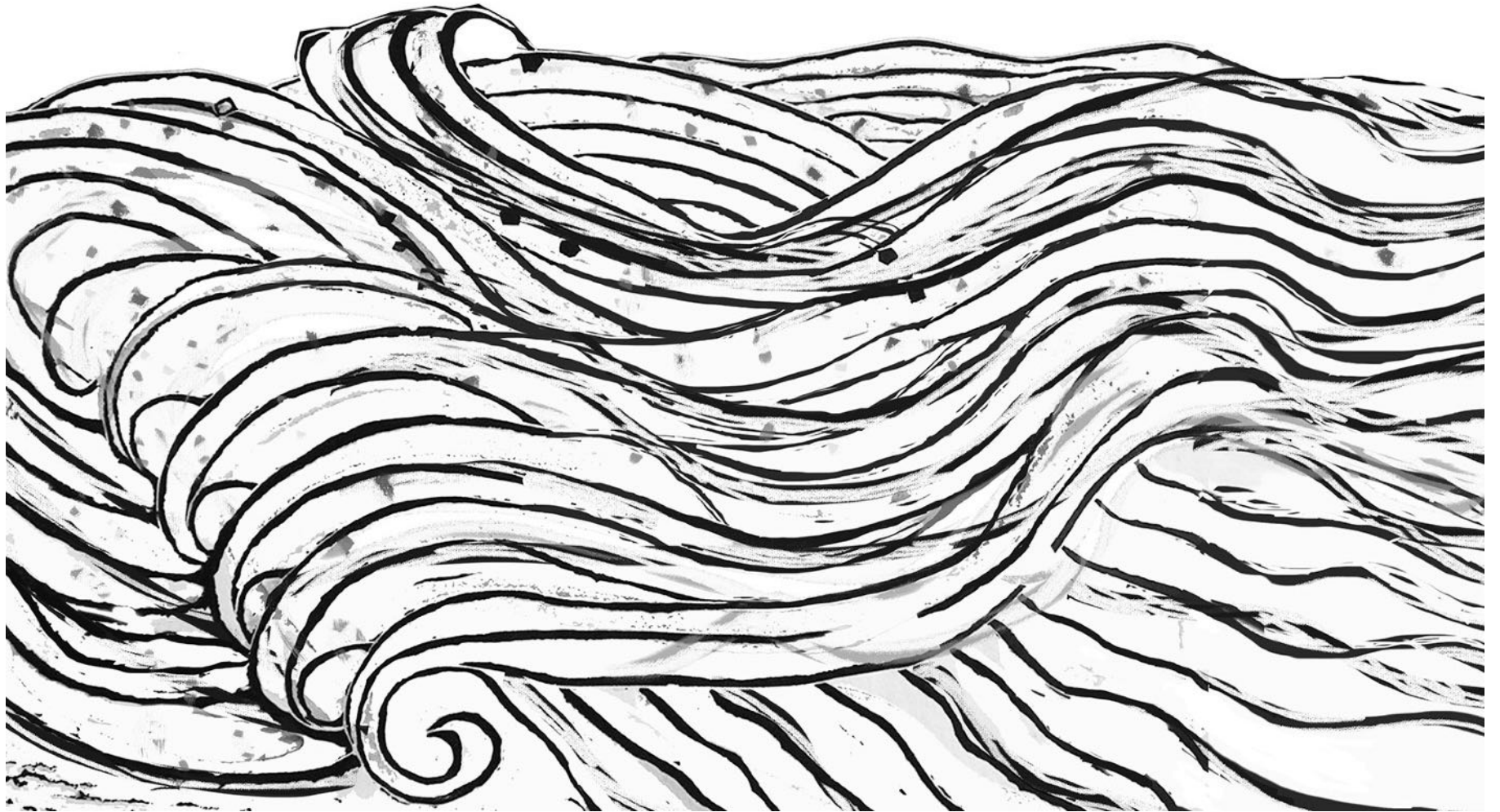
Kamome helped Takata High School students learn to work in harbors. Would you like to join them? Draw yourself in the boat. Be sure to wear a life jacket!

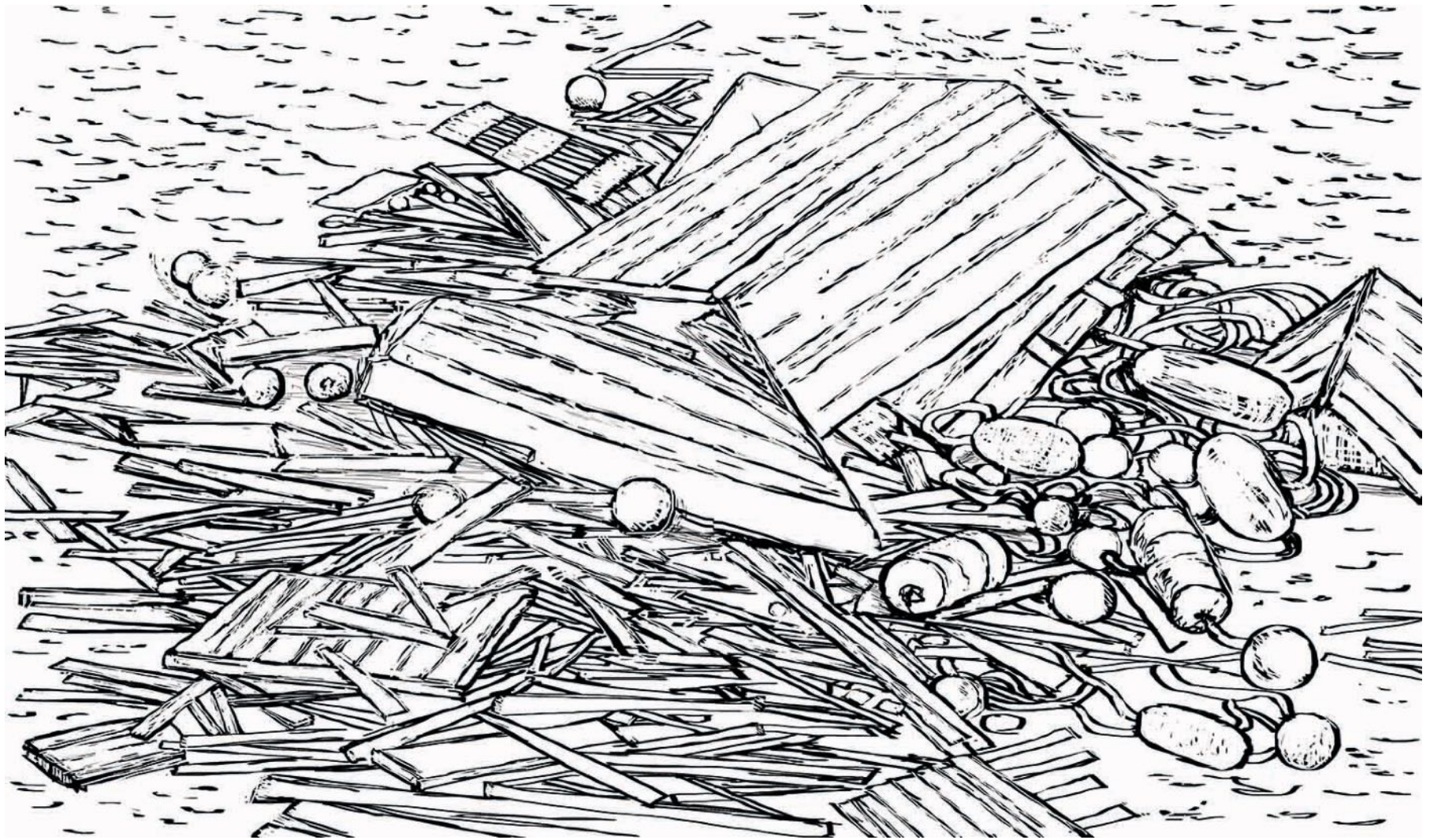

One day there was a very big earthquake in Japan. The people in Rikuzentakata felt the ground shake and shake and shake. The earthquake caused a tsunami.



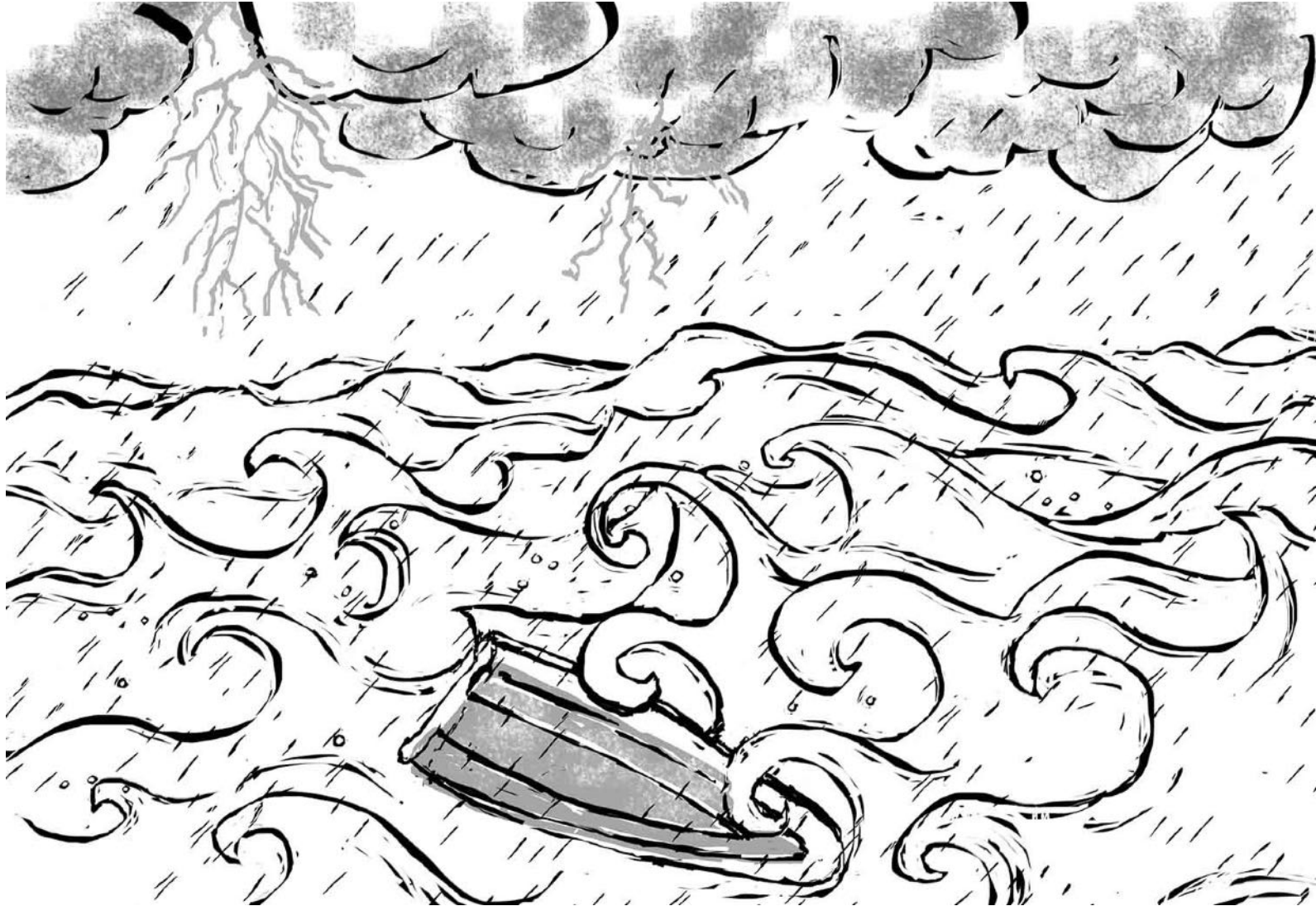
Earthquake shaking is a warning that a tsunami may be on its way. Tsunami hazard zone signs help to show you the way to safe areas.



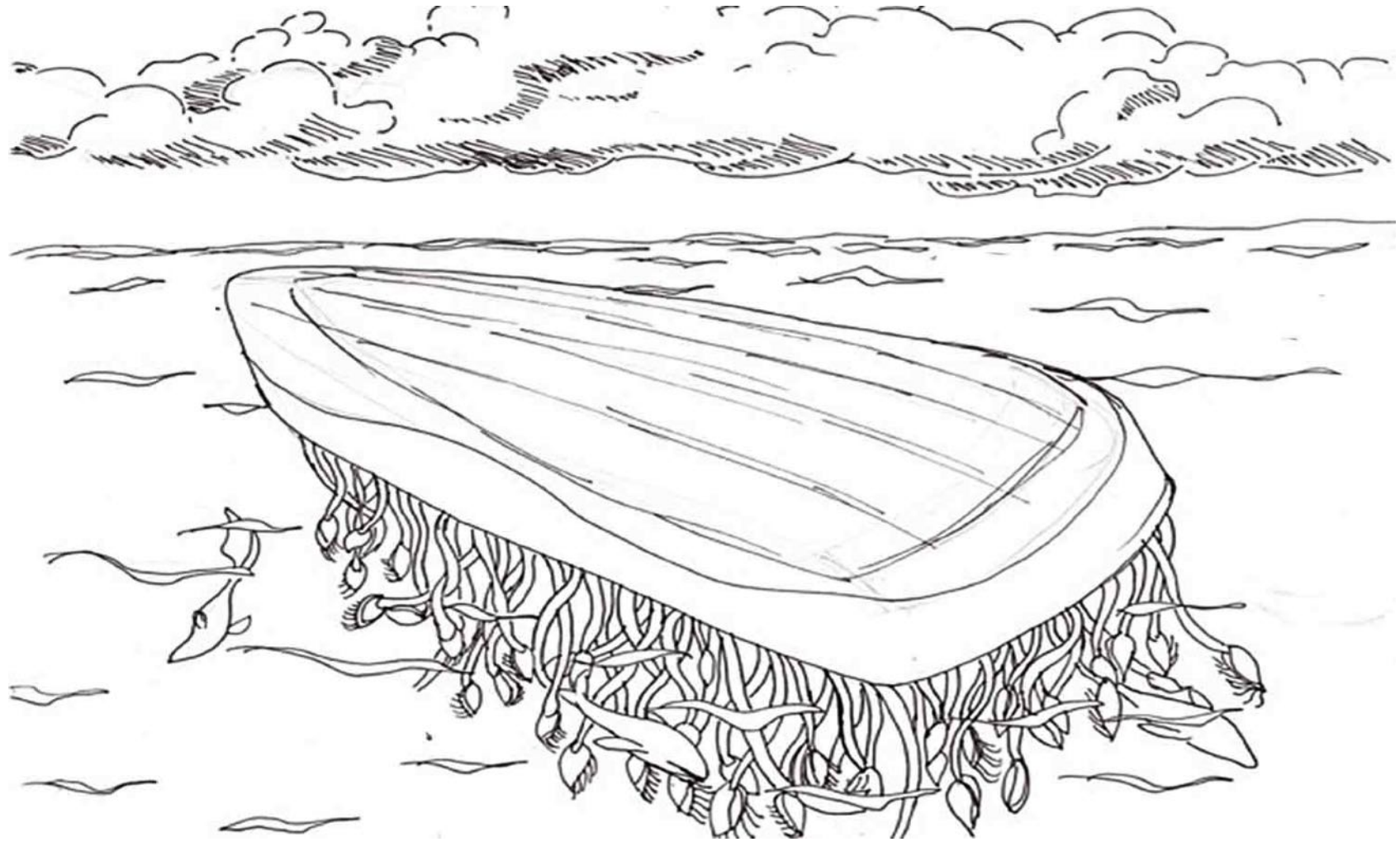
The tsunami in Japan swept Kamome and pieces of docks and buildings out to sea. The waves flipped Kamome upside down. Color the bottom of the boat blue.



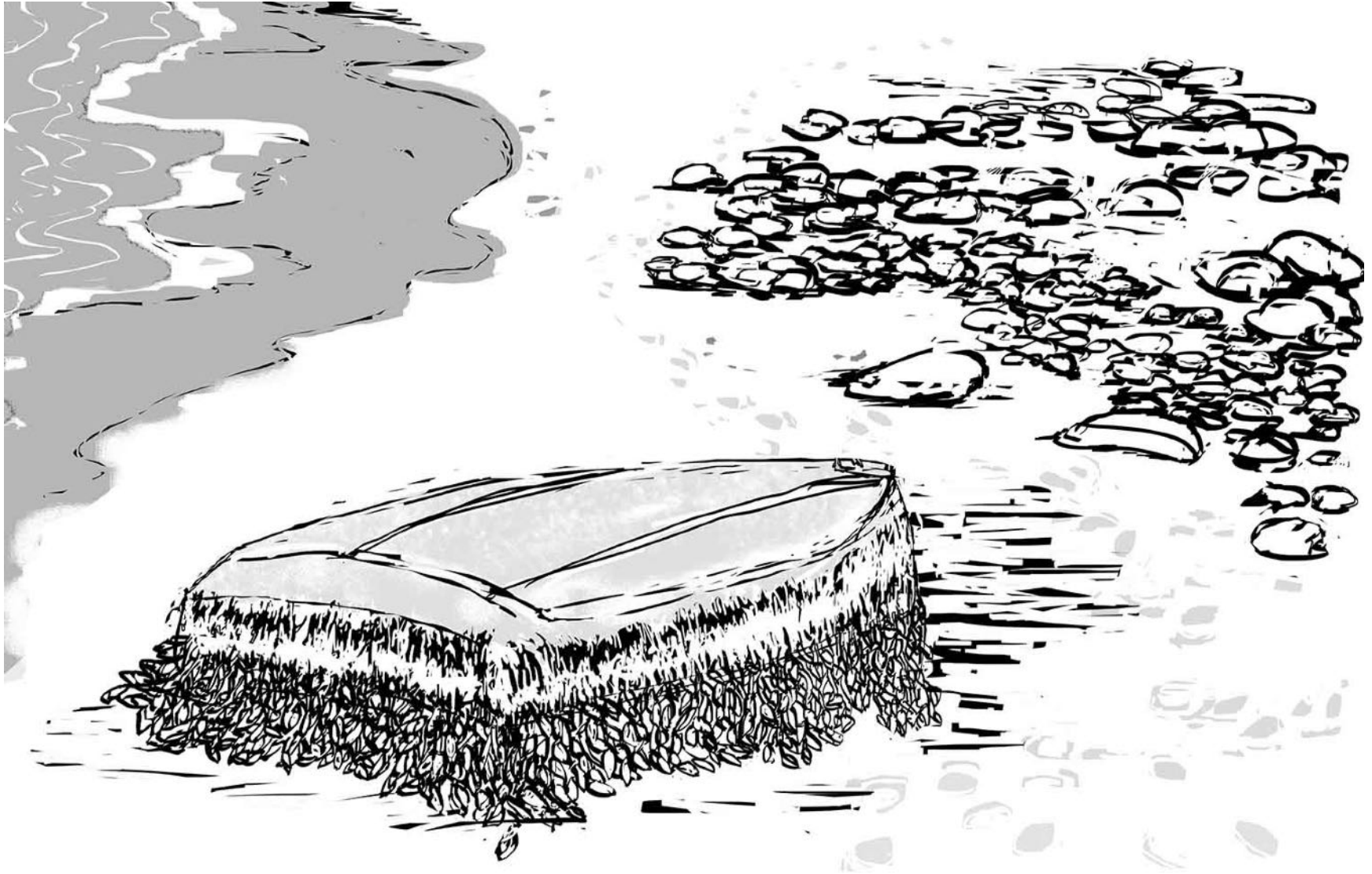
Kamome was alone in the ocean.



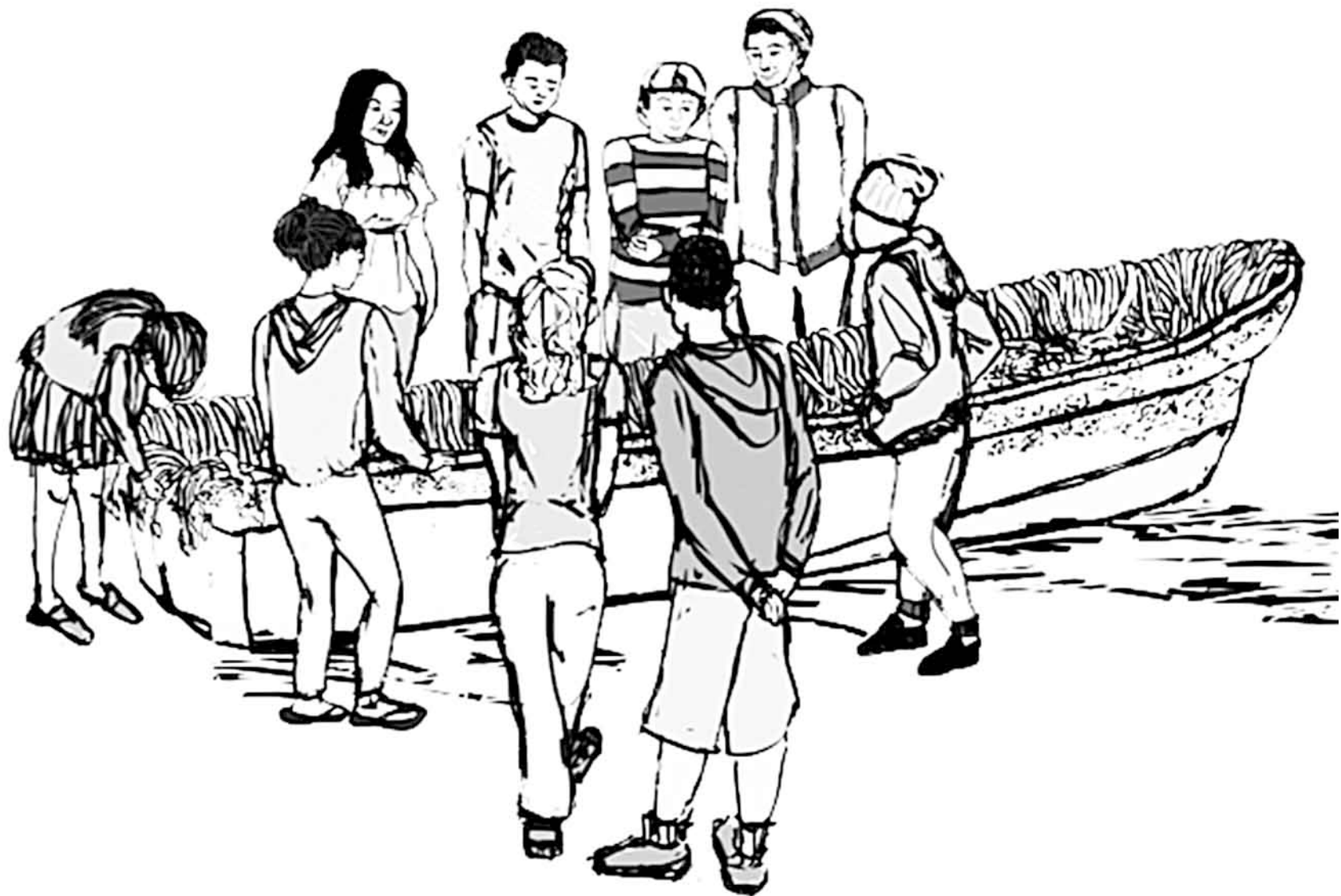
Sometimes there were big storms. Can you make the waves look really big?

After 757 days at sea, Kamome had traveled all across the ocean and landed on the beach in Crescent City, California.



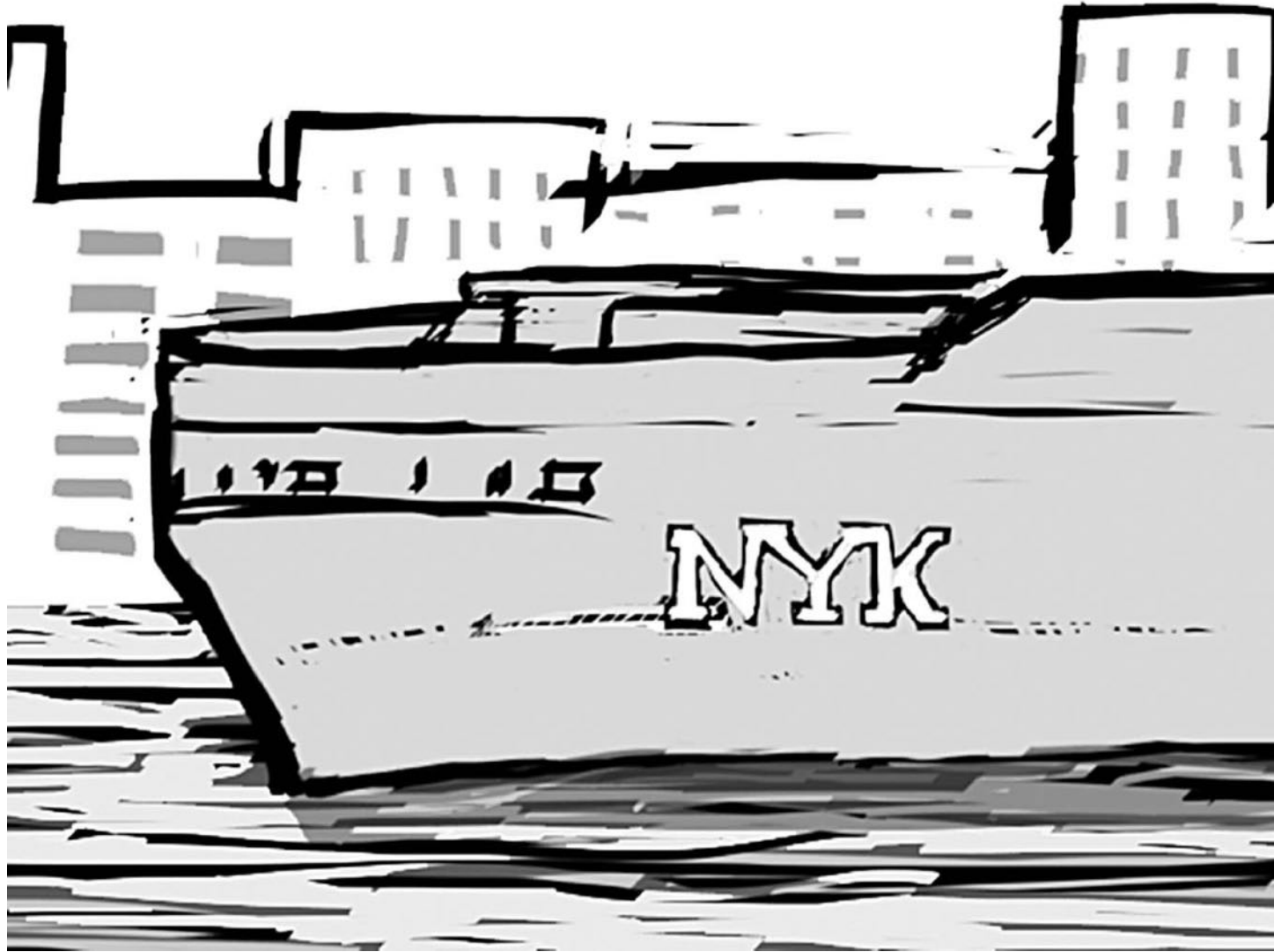
The students from Del Norte High School wondered where the boat had come from.



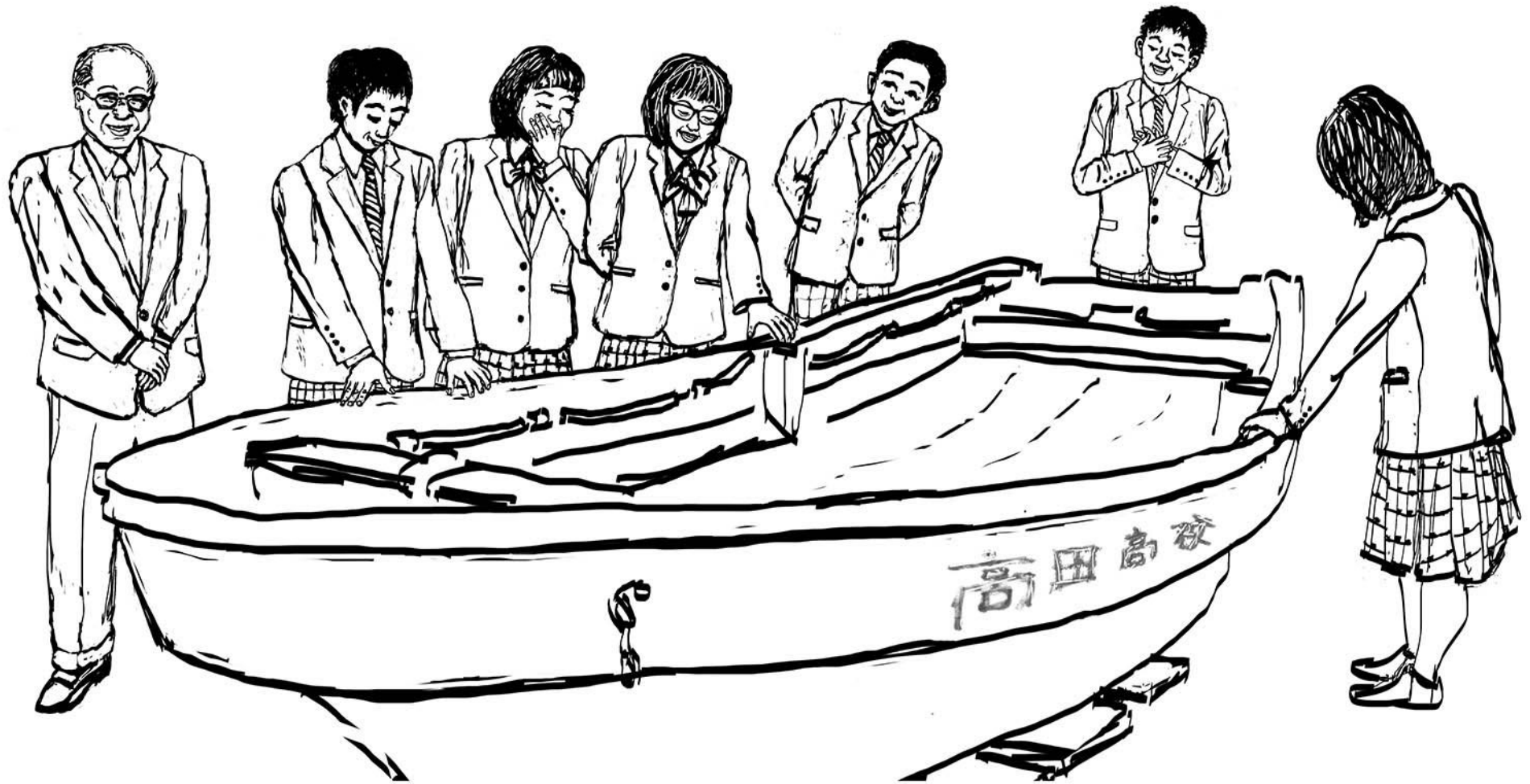
**A Japanese person read the characters on the boat. They said

The students and teachers at Takata High School were very happy to see Kamome again.



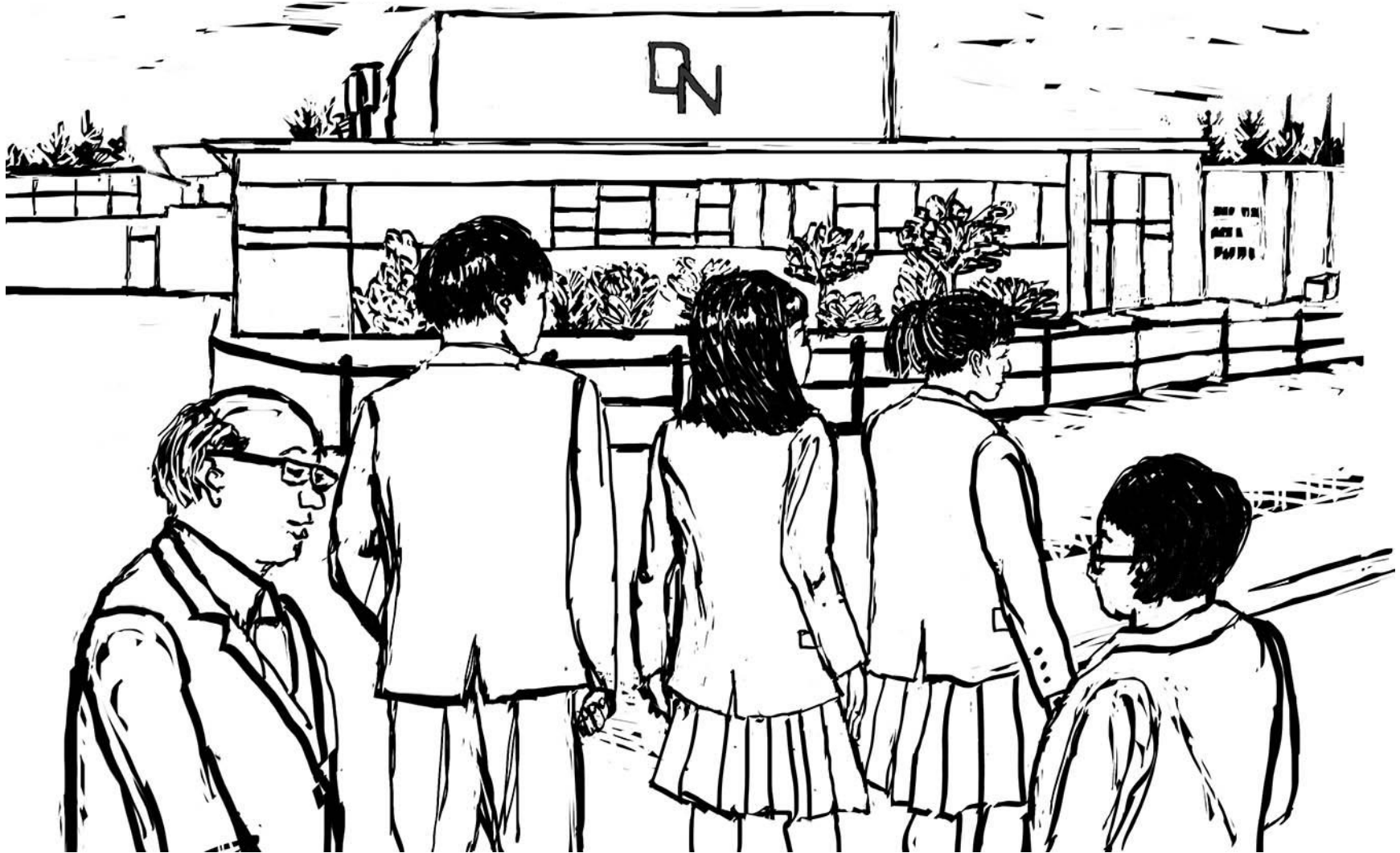
The Japanese students invited the Del Norte students to visit them in Japan. They rode on a bullet train.



The American students were a little concerned about going to Japan. What were some of the things they worried about?



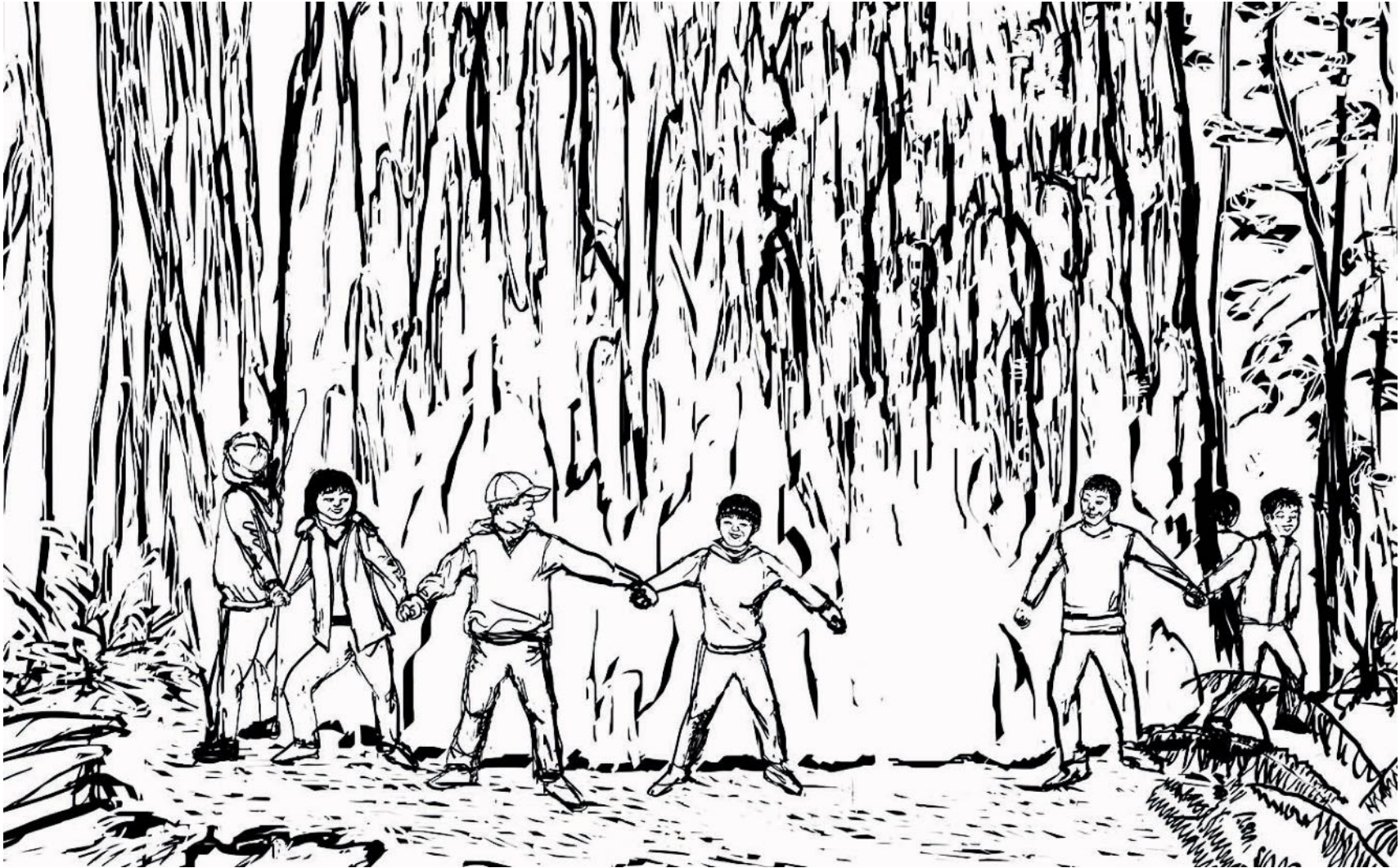
The Japanese and American students became friends.
