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Mission



USAID works closely with the Government of Brazil, the private sector and civil society partners to protect Amazon biodiversity and strengthen sustainable economic growth. These efforts promote conservation, climate action, income generation, and the well-being of the most vulnerable people in the region.

Specifically, we support the management of Brazilian Legal Amazon landscapes, natural resources, and protected areas; strengthen Indigenous and local communities and organizations; and partner with the private sector to develop market-based approaches which generate social impact.

Impact

2023 was marked by hard work and significant achievements. Partnering with the United States Forest Service (USFS), USAID bolstered the Brazilian government's ability to control and prevent forest fires through an integrated fire management approach, as well as promote the restoration of fire-prone degraded areas. These efforts helped to reduce forest-fire emissions and promote carbon sequestration.

In partnership with the Center for International Forestry Research and World Agroforestry (CIFOR-ICRAF), we launched a new project named Regenerative Agriculture for Conservation of the Amazon (ARCA, Portuguese acronym). ARCA aims to develop solutions for biodiversity conservation and climate mitigation by advancing agroforestry and restoration, through technical-scientific knowledge and partnerships.

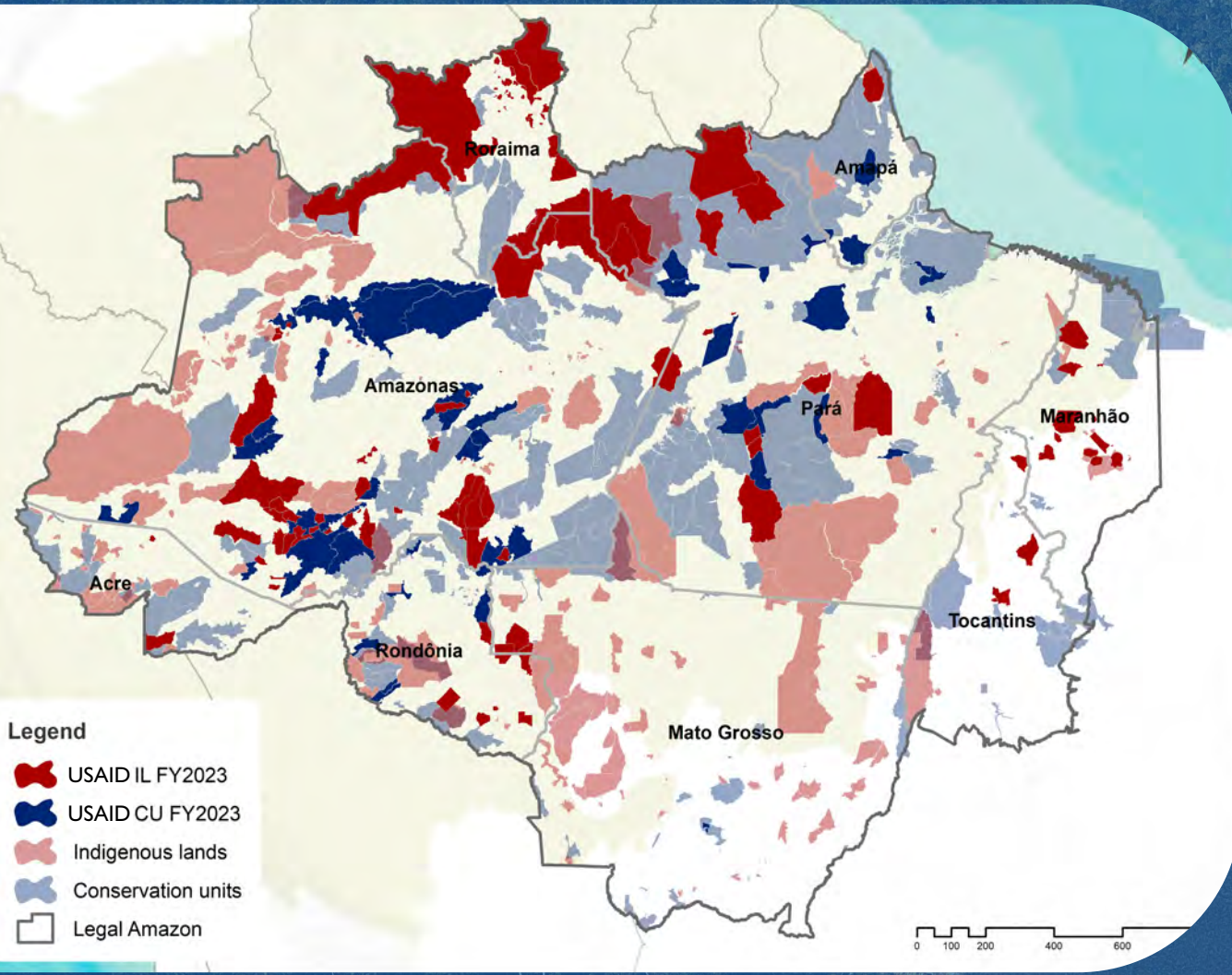

Private sector partners join our efforts to support 15 projects under the Partnership Platform for the Amazon (PPA), which was formalized as an independent institution in 2023. In total, our 287 partnerships with the private sector leveraged US\$ 12 million and supported 229 socio biodiversity products. Our business partners increased the number of enterprises providing solutions to socioenvironmental problems through training and investment in community-based businesses. By strengthening these community enterprises, our partners enhance their autonomy, while generating income and recognizing the value of local cultural assets.

We continued advocating for gender equality and opportunities for women. We are integrating our gender concerns and women's empowerment into our future programming, we uphold building opportunities to elevate women's voices and roles through our work.

Gender equality is one of USAID's top priorities. We encourage our partners to focus on empowering women's organizations and implementing capacity-building initiatives that enable women to hold active roles in community decision-making. By fostering these efforts, we aim to create environments where women can thrive and significantly contribute to their communities.

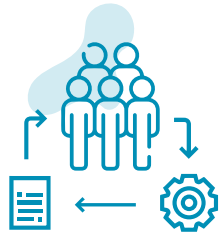

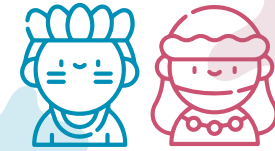

Innovation and Technology

Science, technology, and innovation help USAID overcome a number of challenging development problems. USAID invests in monitoring and training so communities may invest in income-generating activities, while keeping the forest standing and reducing or avoiding greenhouse gas emissions.

New Ways of Funding and Evaluating Biodiversity Investments

The Amazon Biodiversity Fund (ABF) raised R\$ 150 million from BNDES and an international philanthropy network for investments in sustainable private sector ventures in the Amazon. This patient capital fund provides innovative finance arrangements to facilitate the growth of socio-biodiversity enterprises. It also uses Terra-Bio, a new methodology to measure the impacts of investment on biodiversity.
