She achieved a significant milestone in the Australian cheese-making industry by becoming the first to receive a license for raw milk cheese production in 2018. Under her guidance, Pecora Dairy has evolved to include Pecora Cheese and Wine, a European-inspired hospitality venture within a regional Australian backdrop.

Increasingly aware of the decline of small family dairy farms, Cressida founded Dairy Cocoon, a not-forprofit initiative that has been instrumental in providing farmers with the resources to transition towards producing niche dairy products, tapping into a growing consumer demand for Australian owned dairy products. This initiative provides a sustainable and profitable path for many small dairy businesses, allowing them to become price-setters, not price-takers, increasing the possibility of securing an enduring legacy for family dairy farms into the future.

Beyond her business achievements, Cressida is a staunch advocate for carbon-neutral agriculture and has been actively involved in promoting peer-to-peer energy trading, driving Pecora Dairy towards an energypositive business model. Her roles as an NSW Women in Dairy Bale Up Committee Member, 2020 AgriFutures Rural Woman of the Year National Runner Up, a member of the NSW Agriculture Minister's Advisory Group, and a board member of Australian Women in Agriculture showcase her dedication to advancing and mentoring within the agricultural sector.

Kristen's expertise extends to agricultural communications and agtech, where she has worked to bridge the gap between scientific research and on-farm application. Barbara is passionate about enhancing community engagement in the Torres Strait, especially regarding participation in ABS census and surveys. Her advocacy in this area has included contributions to the SA Royal Commission into ECEC, chaired by the Hon Julia Gillard AC.
