Killeya-Jones Selected to Attend Great Britain Training Camp

Sophomore forward Sacha Killeya-Jones has accepted an invitation to attend Great Britain's national training camp that will determine the team's final roster for FIBA EuroBasket 2017. Killeya-Jones is eligible to play for Great Britain via his British-born mother, Ley.

Killeya-Jones is one of 24 players selected to a preliminary squad for Great Britain's senior men's team. The eventual roster will be whittled down to 12 players for FIBA EuroBasket 2017, which begin competition Aug. 31.

Training camp for the team began July 31 in Manchester, England. In addition to a game against Greece on Aug. 18, Britain will also play in two tournaments in Greece and Poland, as well as one friendly in Tel Aviv against Israel. That will complete Great Britain's preparation before heading to Istanbul for FIBA EuroBasket 2017, where it will face Belgium, Turkey, Latvia, Serbia and Russia in Group D, starting on Sept. 1.

Wall, Hacker to be Inducted into UK Athletics Hall of Fame

Kentucky men's basketball star John Wall (2010) will be part of the six-man 2017 class that will be inducted into the UK Athletics Hall of Fame, Sept. 22-23. Longtime radio broadcaster Ralph Hacker will also be inducted.

The UK Athletics Hall of Fame was started in 2005 to recognize and honor persons whose participation and achievements enriched and strengthened the University's athletics program. The charter class included 88 individuals who had previously had their jersey retired by UK.

There is a five-year waiting period after leaving UK to be eligible for inclusion into the Hall of Fame. A committee consisting of Hall of Famers, media members, campus representatives and current coaches and administrators elects new inductees each year.

Trio of Wildcats Win Bronze, Wynyard Flourishes at 2017 FIBA World Cup

The Kentucky men's basketball team was well represented at the 2017 FIBA U19 World Cup in Cairo.

Freshman guard Hamidou Diallo, freshman forward PJ Washington, redshirt sophomore forward Tai Wynyard and UK head coach John Calipari all were a part of the biennial FIBA World Cup.

Diallo and Washington, coached by Calipari, captured a bronze medal for Team USA, while Wynyard was the star for the New Zealand

Junior Tall Blacks.

Washington led Team USA in scoring at 12.9 points per game and added 5.1 rebounds and 2.2 assists. Diallo contributed 10.9 points, 3.9 rebounds, 2.3 assists and 1.1 steals per game. Wynyard led the Junior Tall Blacks in scoring at 14.3 points per game and rebounding with 9.3 boards per outing.

Freshman Kevin Knox made the final 16 cuts for Team USA before the roster was trimmed to 12, but he pulled his name from contention after suffering a minor hamstring injury. Freshman Shai Gilgeous-Alexander declined an invite to join the Canadian national team for its training camp.

Wildcats Dominate NBA Summer League Rosters

With three more Kentucky players selected to the NBA Draft and several young Wildcats moving their way onto NBA rosters, UK dominated rosters in the NBA summer leagues in Las Vegas, Orlando and Utah.

Malik Monk (Charlotte Hornets) and Tyler Ulis (Phoenix Suns) were on rosters but did not participate as they recovered from offseason injuries.

Former Greats Earn NBA Postseason Honors

Former Kentucky men's basketball stars Anthony Davis and John Wall were honored as some of the best in the league following the 2016-17 season.

Davis (first team) and Wall (third team) were tabbed to the All-NBA teams, while Davis added a second-team selection to the All-NBA Defensive Team to his growing list of awards in 2017. Jamal Murray was a second-team honoree on the All-Rookie Team. Dakari Johnson and Alex Poythress were named as All-NBA D-League performers as well.

Davis was named an All-NBA First Team member and to the All-Defensive Team squad after also earning the 2017 NBA All-Star Game

Most Valuable Player award.

Wall's third-team selection is his first such honor of his career after leading the Wizards to the Eastern Conference semifinals.

Murray became the 11th former UK player under John Calipari to earn selection to the All-Rookie Team, which recognizes stellar first-year performances. Murray was also tabbed the Rising Stars Game MVP at this year's All-Star Weekend festivities to combine with Davis in sweeping the MVP awards during the league's dynamic weekend showcasing its brightest stars.

Another Successful NBA Draft for UK

It was another successful NBA Draft as De'Aaron Fox (fifth, Sacramento Kings), Malik Monk (11th, Charlotte Hornets) and Bam Adebayo (14th, Miami Heat) were selected in the 2017 NBA Draft.

Fox is the 12th UK player since 2010 to go in the top seven picks. Monk and Adebayo added to the Wildcats' lottery selections in the last eight years under John Calipari as Kentucky's mark reached 17. The trio taken in the top 14 of the draft upped the Wildcats' first-round selections to 24 under Calipari since 2010. Also, with three lottery picks, UK became the first school to have three players picked in the lottery in three different drafts.

The Wildcats have had more top-10 picks, more lottery selections and more first-round picks in the Calipari era than any other team in the country.

In eight seasons with Calipari at the helm, Kentucky has churned out three No. 1 selections, 24 first-rounders, 17 lottery picks and 31 total players in the NBA Draft. The 31 draft picks is 14 more than the next closest school (Duke). With another surge of first-round picks, Kentucky has more first-round selections (37) than any other school in the NBA lottery era (since 1985).

Kentucky has now had 122 players drafted 124 times in its illustrious history with 47 players selected in the opening round.

It is the eighth consecutive NBA Draft that Kentucky was represented by multiple players in the first round of the draft. UK is the only program since the draft went to two rounds in 1989 to have multiple players selected in the first round in eight straight years. Calipari is the only coach to have multiple players selected in 10 consecutive NBA Drafts, dating back to his time at Memphis.

Miller Wins Third Straight German League Title

Already a professional at playing basketball, Darius Miller appears to be a pro at winning championships. The former Kentucky men's basketball standout captured yet another championship, winning a third straight

easyCredit BBL title with Brose Bamberg in Germany. Brose Bamberg swept EWE Baskets Oldenburg for its ninth easyCredit BBL crown. The BBL is the top league in Germany.

The latest championship continues a remarkable title run for Miller. The Maysville, Kentucky, native won the Kentucky Sweet Sixteen with Mason Country in 2008, the NCAA national championship with the 2012 Kentucky men's basketball team and now three straight titles with Brose Bamberg. Miller also won two Southeastern Conference regular-season titles and two SEC Tournament crowns with the Wildcats.

Miller averaged 12.0 points, 4.0 rebounds and 3.0 assists in the best-of-five easyCredit BBL championship series. He made 10 of 17 shots from behind the arc (58.8 percent). That's after winning the most valuable player honors in the championship series a season ago, a performance that included an 8-for-9 day from 3-point range in game one.

Non-Conference Schedule Demanding

If one of the goals of a schedule is to prepare a team for postseason play – a high priority on John Calipari's check list when his staff pieces the slate together each year – the 2017-18 Kentucky men's basketball schedule, which was unveiled in early June, checks off that key box.

Twelve of UK's 13 nonconference opponents in the upcoming season made a post-season tournament in 2017, including eight of which made the NCAA Tournament. Three of those advanced to the Sweet 16 or better.

Five teams finished the 2016-17 season with an RPI in the top 50 and four ended the season in both the Associated Press Top 25 and USA Today Coaches' Poll. All told, Kentucky's 2017-18 nonconference opponents combined for a record of 314-134 in 2016-17, a .701 winning percentage.

All that lies ahead for arguably Calipari's most inexperienced team ever. UK will be tasked with replacing 92.6 percent of its scoring and 76.6 percent of its rebounding from last season's production.

Kentucky's nonconference schedule will see the Wildcats play in premier venues such as the United Center in Chicago (vs. Kansas) and Madison Square Garden in New York (vs. Monmouth), take them to a Big Blue Nation favorite in New Orleans (vs. UCLA), and feature a difficult trip to Morgantown, West Virginia, to play the West Virginia Mountaineers.

SEC Schedule Home-and-Away Designations Determined

Kentucky's path for a 49th Southeastern Conference regular-season crown has taken shape with the announcement of the 2017-

18 home-and-away designations for the entire league's schedule. Although dates and times have not been determined, the SEC announced designations for all 14-member institutions, including revealing the home-and-away opponents for each team.

As announced prior to the 2015-16 season, Kentucky's permanent home-and-away opponents include Florida, Tennessee and Vanderbilt. This upcoming season, the Wildcats will add Texas A&M to their home-and-away slate for the second consecutive season as well as Missouri, which is highlighted by the addition of head coach Cuonzo Martin and one of the best freshman prospects in the country.

Kentucky's home schedule will include the five aforementioned teams, as well as Alabama, Georgia, Ole Miss and Mississippi State. UK's lone matchups for the conference season on the road will come against Arkansas, Auburn, LSU and South Carolina.

In early season projections, Kentucky, Florida and Missouri are top-25 ranked teams. Twenty-four of ESPN's top-100 recruits in the 2017 class have signed to play in the SEC, including seven with the Cats. The league is coming off a season in which its teams combined to go 11-5 in the NCAA Tournament and had three teams advance to the Elite Eight.

Kentucky has claimed at least a share of the last three SEC regular-season titles and five overall under the direction of ninth-year head coach John Calipari. The Cats have also won the SEC Tournament five times in the last eight years during Calipari's helm, including each of the past three years.

2017 Signing Class Finishes at No. 1

The Kentucky men's basketball team has had some stellar recruiting classes under ninth-year head coach John Calipari. The 2017 haul may be its best ever, according to the recruiting experts.

The Recruiting Services Consensus Index, which tallies major recruiting rankings and plugs them into a formula to calculate a consensus ranking, not only rated UK's 2017 class the best of the season – it measures this group as the best ever.

With 592 points in its recruiting calculations, this 2017 Kentucky group beat out another Wildcat class – the 2013 haul – to claim the title as the best recruiting class ever. That 2013 group had 557 points and consisted of Julius Randle, Andrew Harrison, Aaron Harrison, Dakari Johnson, James Young, Marcus Lee and Derek Willis. The RSCI rankings began in 1998.

The 2017 class consists of Kevin Knox (No. 9), Jarred Vanderbilt (No. 12), PJ Washington (No. 14), Nick Richards (No. 17), Quade Green (No. 22), Shai Gilgeous-Alexander (No. 29),

Hamidou Diallo (No. 45) and Jamarl Baker (No. 68).

The RSCI includes individual player rankings from all of the major recruiting services, which this season featured Rivals, Scout, 247Sports and longtime recruiting analyst Van Coleman. The RSCI formula uses each of those services' rankings (only the top 100) players to assign a point value to each recruit. Using the point totals for all the five major services, it then adds the totals for all players in a class for the team's final score.

Each of those recruiting services ranked this Kentucky class No. 1.

UK has ranked No. 1 in the RSCI in seven of Calipari's nine classes at Kentucky. During that period, the Wildcats have ranked no worse than No. 3 in the RSCI calculations.

Kentucky's signing class will certainly be put into action in 2017-18. Although UK has had to annually reload its roster in recent seasons, the upcoming team will be Calipari's most inexperienced yet. Kentucky will be tasked with replacing 92.6 percent of its scoring and 76.6 percent of its rebounding from its 2016-17 production.

Diallo Returns to Kentucky After Testing NBA Waters

Hamidou Diallo, a freshman guard, returned to UK for the 2017-18 season after going through the process of declaring for the NBA Draft. Utilizing NCAA rules that allow players to "test the waters," Diallo entered the NBA Draft without hiring an agent to protect his NCAA eligibility with the option of returning to school.

Players had until 10 days after the conclusion of the NBA Draft Combine to make a final decision based on a rule between the NCAA and NBA so long as the player didn't hire an agent.

Diallo will return in a unique situation as one of the team's leaders. Although he didn't play in 2016-17, he became an important player in practice after reclassifying and enrolling at Kentucky in January. In recent interviews at the NBA Draft Combine, former teammates De'Aaron Fox and Isaiah Briscoe raved about Diallo's defensive presence in practice as the Wildcats went on to win both the Southeastern Conference regular-season and tournament titles before advancing to the Elite Eight.

Diallo enrolled at Kentucky in January after graduating from Putnam Science Academy in Connecticut in May. A top-10 prospect in the 2017 class before reclassifying. In his final full season in high school, in 2015-16, Diallo led Putnam Science Academy to a 38-3 record with an appearance in the state semifinals. The two-time all-state honoree averaged 19.0 points, 6.0 rebounds and 3.0 assists in his

senior season before graduating in the fall. He averaged 17.0 points and 4.0 rebounds as a junior.

Cats Win NCAA Academic Award for APR Score

The Wildcats received an NCAA award for placing in the top 10 percent of all men's basketball teams in the country in the NCAA's annual Academic Progress Rate. UK scored a perfect 1,000.

It's the third straight year the men's basketball team has received the award and the fourth time since 2009.

The APR provides a real-time look at a team's academic success by the progress of each student-athlete on scholarship. The APR measures academic eligibility, retention and graduation. The scores are a four-year composite, covering the 2012-13 through 2015-16 school years.

Every Division I sports team across the nation calculates its APR each academic year, similar to a report card. Scholarship student-athletes each semester earn one point for remaining eligible and one point for staying in school or graduating.

UK has received a perfect 1,000 mark in each of the last four single-year APR rates. The NCAA cut score to compete in the 2016-17 postseason is a 930 four-year APR. Teams scoring below 930 can face consequences intended to direct additional focus on academics. Those penalties can include practice restrictions and playing-season reductions.

Four Wildcats on SEC Academic Honor Roll

Four Kentucky men's basketball players -- Jonny David, Isaac Humphries, Dillon Pulliam and Tai Wynyard -- made the Southeastern Conference Winter Academic Honor Roll.

Any student-athlete who participates in a SEC championship sport or a student-athlete who participates in a sport listed on his/her institution's NCAA Sports Sponsorship Form is eligible for nomination to the Academic Honor Roll. To make the SEC Academic Honor Roll, a student-athlete must have a grade-point average of 3.00 or above for either the preceding academic year (two semesters or three quarters) or have a cumulative grade point average of 3.00 or above at the nominating institution.

Incoming Wildcats Shine at High School All-America Showcases

PJ Washington earned MVP honors for his team at the inaugural Allen Iverson Roundball Classic in Portsmouth, Virginia, a week after Shai Gilgeous-Alexander snagged MVP honors at the Derby Festival Basketball Classic.

Washington scored a game-high 37 points for Team Honor, which defeated Team Loyalty 198-152. Gilgeous-Alexander shared MVP honors after recording a game-high 29 points, nine rebounds and six assists in just 19 minutes in Louisville.

Washington, Quade Green, Kevin Knox, Nick Richards and Jarred Vanderbilt participated in the annual McDonald's All American Game. Green, Gilgeous-Alexander, Knox, Richards and Vanderbilt took part in the Nike Hoop Summit, while Green, Knox, Richards, Vanderbilt and Washington were a part of the Jordan Brand Classic.

Willis Named MVP of West Team in Reese's College All-Star Game

Awarded one final college game after a tremendous college career, Kentucky men's basketball senior Derek Willis made the most of the opportunity with a solid performance in the Reese's College All-Star Game.

Willis recorded 13 points, a team-high eight rebounds, a block and a steal for the West Team in 21 minutes at the University of Phoenix Stadium, site of this year's Final Four. Willis made 6 of 11 shots and was named the Reese's Perfect Player from the West.

Willis' participation marked the first time the game has featured a UK player since its inception in 2009. He finished his Kentucky career with 555 points scored, 354 rebounds and 108 3-point field goals made. His career 3-point field-goal percentage (.3985) ranks 12th among the school's all-time leaders.

Associated Press Names Kentucky No. 1 All-Time Program

The "greatest tradition in the history of college basketball" and the nation's all-time leader in wins and NCAA Tournament victories has a new descriptor it can add to its storied name: the best all-time team in college basketball.

That's according to the Associated Press. The AP, using a formula of its all-time polls, determined Wednesday that UK is the top program in the sport, ranking UK ahead of bluebloods North Carolina, Duke, UCLA and Kansas -- in that order.

To determine the all-time top 100, the AP used a formula that counted poll appearances (one point each) to mark consistency and No. 1 rankings (two points each). The list focuses on those programs that consistently appear in the poll and/or are at the top during the regular seasons.

The AP has been ranking teams in its week-by-week polls since January 1949. A total of 200 schools have been ranked in more than 1,100 polls by the AP throughout the 68 years of its rankings.

According to the AP, UK has appeared in 75.37 percent of all of its polls with its first appearance on Jan. 18, 1949. The Wildcats have been ranked No. 1 a total of 124 times, third most all-time.

The AP lists the 1950s as Kentucky's best decade with the Wildcats appearing in 89.63 percent of the polls. The 1990s were a close second, as UK appeared in 89.33 percent of the rankings during that period.

A testament to Kentucky's consistent success, the schools has missed appearing at least once in the polls for only three seasons (1952-53, 1988-89 and 1989-90) during the 68-year history of the poll, the fewest poll-less seasons of any program, according to the AP.

Kentucky leads college basketball with 2,237 all-time wins in addition to a nation-leading 124 NCAA Tournament victories. The Wildcats are among the country's leaders in national championships (eight) and Final Four appearances (17).

Monk Wins Jerry West Shooting Guard of the Year Award

Malik Monk rewrote the Kentucky record books as one of the more prolific scorers in program history. He also owns the official designation as the top shooting guard of the 2016-17 college basketball season with the awarding of the Jerry West Shooting Guard of the Year Award.

The UK sharpshooter was the first player in program history to win the award and the second in school history to win one of the Hall of Fame's historic positional awards after Tyler Ulis was the Bob Cousy Point Guard of the Year a season ago. Monk is the third player to ever win the West Award, joining Ohio State's D'Angelo Russell in 2015 and Oklahoma's Buddy Hield in 2016 as the others to do so.

The Southeastern Conference's Freshman of the Year, Monk beat finalists Marcus Foster (Creighton), Luke Kennard (Duke), Peter Jok (Iowa) and Bryce Alford (UCLA) to win the award.

Monk became one of the nation's most dynamic and exciting players to watch throughout the season. He concluded the year owning the UK freshman record of points scored with 754, passing Jamal Murray's output of 720 from a season ago. His record-breaking 754 points is also fourth all-time in UK's history books regardless of class, trailing only Dan Issel (948; 1970), Jodie Meeks (854; 2009) and Jamal Mashburn (767; 1992).

He finished his freshman season averaging 19.8 points per game, second among all freshman nationally, and reached double-figure scoring in all but two games this season.



Kentucky Basketball Head Coach

John Calipari

A “players-first” coach with a penchant for helping people reach their dreams, John Calipari, a Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Famer, has guided six teams to the Final Four, led one to a national championship and helped 42 players get selected in the NBA Draft during his 25-year college coaching career.

Calipari guided Kentucky to its eighth national championship and his first national title in 2012. In becoming only the second coach in NCAA history to lead three different schools to the Final Four, he has racked up more than 600 victories, 18 NCAA Tournament appearances, six Final Fours and numerous national coach of the year honors.

In 2015, Coach Cal led college basketball’s first ever 38-0 team, and became one of just three coaches to make four Final Fours in a five-year span. At the end of the season, Calipari became the 96th coach to join the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

While building a program out of obscurity at Massachusetts, laying the foundation at Memphis and restoring luster at the sport’s greatest program at Kentucky, he has totaled the second-most wins in NCAA history in the first 20 years of a college coaching career.

Quite honestly, though, Calipari’s on-court success overshadows a much more significant picture.

In his goal to lead a players-first program, he has helped 42 players realize their dreams and guide them to NBA Draft selections, including a record five first-round draft picks in 2010. Two years later, six Wildcats heard their names called at the 2012 draft, the most in the two-round draft era. UK, with Calipari’s help, would tie those six picks again in 2015, including a record-tying four lottery selections. His four No. 1 overall picks are twice as many as any other coach, and he’s had 31 players drafted during his first eight years at Kentucky, including 24 first-round picks.

Calipari’s players have entered the league NBA-ready. He’s coached an MVP, four All-NBA players, three Rookie of the Year winners, and 10 players from Calipari’s first six teams at Kentucky have made the NBA All-Rookie teams.

Much like he did at UMass, where his players graduated at nearly 80 percent, Calipari has stressed academics. Fifteen of his last 18 seniors at Memphis earned their bachelor’s degrees, and all 17 players at UK who were eligible to graduate by the end of their senior years walked away with a diploma in hand, including three players who earned their degree in just three years. Calipari’s teams routinely have posted a combined team grade-point averages of 3.0 or better.

His foundation, The Calipari Foundation, has raised millions of dollars to help the lives of those in need in the Commonwealth and across the country. In 2010, he used a telethon to raise more than \$1 million for victims of the devastating earthquake in Haiti, and he organized another one in 2012 for victims of Superstorm Sandy. A year after helping raise \$350,000 for charity during the inaugural UK alumni weekend, Calipari was the driving force behind the more than \$1 million that was donated to local and national organizations during the second annual alumni weekend, and then \$1.5 million in 2015.

With Rupp Arena under construction in 2016, Calipari held a celebrity softball game during the annual UK alumni weekend. That game, with the fantasy experience, raised approximately \$1.5 million for charity with matching funds, including more than \$450,000 that went to Louisiana flood relief efforts.

In 2017, Coach Cal was named the head coach of the 2017 USA Basket-

ball Men’s U19 World Cup Team, which finished third at the 2017 FIBA U19 World Cup in Cairo.

Author of five books, including the New York Times Best Seller “Players First: Coaching from the Inside Out,” Calipari is a master of communication and maximizing talent. He lives by the motto that “it’s never a matter of how far you have fallen, but instead it’s about how high you bounce back.”
