Darwin on Insectivorous Plants.

A recent work has made its appearance from the pen of Mr. Darwin, entitled "Insectivorous Plants," and has been reprinted in this county by the Appletens. It is said to prove beyond a doubt, that certain plants not only catch insects, but devour and digest them by a process essentially the same as that seen in animals, and absorb the products of digestion into their system. He discovered that one 9,-760,000th. of a grain was sufficient to excite the tentacles to action. It is needless to say that Mr. Darwin believes that insectivorous habits have been gradually developed in these plants, and he traces the steps by which any ordinary plant having viscid glands, might, under favorable circumstances, be converted into a species capable of true digestion.
