JOURNAL OF RESEARCHES INTO NATURAL HIS-TOEY AND GEOGRAPHY, by the late Charles Darwin, can be frankly commended as one of the best of recent reprints. Messrs. Appleton. This popular work, that has almost become a classic, is rehabilitated in handsome style and given a new and potent interest through the medium of pleatiful illustration. It may be remarked that this work was first published a quarter of a century ago recording the observations the author made in a lengthy vovage to the various countries of the world on H. M. S. Beigle, in which he was accorded special faculities for the pursuit of his actentific work. It is in the form of a journal, a history of that remark ble voyage, and a sketch of those observations in history and geology that at once makes the narrative one of the most interesting and valuable in the history o. scientific navigation. The extraordinary intenteness and accuracy of Mr. Darwin's obs rvitio s. combined with the chaim and simplicity of his descriptions, hav a moured the popular ty of this book with all class s of readers-and that popularity has even increased in recout yours. No attempt, however, has hitherto been made to produce an illustrated edition of this valuable w rk. Numberless places and objects are montioned a d described, but the difficulty of obtaining antheat.c and original r preseatations of them drawn for the purpose has nev ar be a overcome until now. Most of the vews zi en in this work are from skote es made ob the spot by Mr. Pritchett (wali known by his connection with the voyages of the Su ibeam and Wanderer), with Mr. Darwin's book by his side. Some few of the others are taken fr m engravings which Mr. Darwis had hunself selected for their interest as illustrating his voyage, and which have been kindly lent by his son. The book forms a convenient, tasteful, and valuable compendium of scientific fact recorded in simple and i teresting style.
