Begins with Station 10399

Oct. 24 Tuesday. Left Washington for Gloucester

" 25 Wednesday. Arrived Boston 7 A.M. Went to Cambridge and went over plans etc with Dr. Bigelow. Went to Gloucester in P.M. Everything ready, but freight had not come.

" 26 Thursday. At Gloucester, waiting for freight.

" 27 Friday. At Gloucester. Notified in A.M. that freight had arrived by rail. Tried all day to get it out of car.

" 28 Saturday. Finally got freight down to wharf at 5 P.M.

" 29 Sunday. No work.

" 30 Monday. Thick fog + calm all day. Decided to wait till tomorrow.

" 31 Tuesday. Came in calm with thick fog. Later it began to scale a little with light variable breeze, mostly N.E. At 11 A.M. cast off lines + proceeded.

2.45 P.M. made Sta 10399

3.30 P.M. fog came in again

At this station the following birds came aboard.
1 junco, tired out. 1 male purple finch, tired out.
8 pine siskins fresh and chirpy, keeping in a close flock, — three last soon left in spite of the fog.

Fog + almost calm during the night. Several schools machine seen, the water firing brilliantly

Nov. 1 Wednesday. Came in with thick fog & calm.
5.30 AM to 6.30 AM. making Sta 10400, inside
Jeffrey's ledge, in 142 m.

Birds aboard at this sta.

1 junco (dying), 1 song sparrow, (fresh) 1 young (juv?) warbler, tiny
Fog & light variable airs all day. Position uncertain.
Spent some time trying to find 155 fath. for Sta 10401,
and finally gave it up, making the station blind
in 120 fath., the position to be determined later. Made
Sta 10401 between 2 + 3.15 PM.

Cleared off after dark, with westerly breeze increasing
in force.

Nov. 2 Thursday. 4⁰⁰ AM to 5.10 AM making Sta 10402.
Wind increasing from W.S.W. to a stiff breeze, &
sea rising. As the deck engine has been giving
trouble, and it is very doubtful if we could make
the next off shore station owing to weather, headed for
Boothbay Harbor, where the vessel came to an anchor
at 9.30 AM., to wait a shift of wind to return to
Gloucester.

Saw Capt Hahn, & inspected the new steamer
Halcyon.

Nov. 3 Friday. Left Boothbay Harbor 6.30 AM., and
arrived Gloucester 6.45 P.M., without incident.

Saturday.

4. At Gloucester. Went up to Boston to do some
errands. Sounding win arrived, and was put on
seas machine. Deck engine overhauled, and an
extra valve ordered for main engine.

Nov. 5 Sunday. No work.

Monday

Nov. 6 Taking stores, gasoline etc. Expect to start south
tomorrow morning.

Nov. 7 Tuesday, Election Day. All ready to start at
2 P.M., but engineer did not turn up. He did
not get aboard until after midnight.

Nov. 8 Wednesday. Left Gloucester 6 AM., in stiff
W.S.W. breeze & choppy sea.

10 AM - 10-40 AM making Sta 10403.
1.45 - 2.30 P.M. " " 10404

Proceeded over Nantucket Shoals.

Nov. 9 Thursday. 3 AM. Stiff SW blow. Came to an
anchor in Vineyard Haven. SW blow continued
all this day and most of the night.

Nov. 10 Friday. Wind veered to NW with rain in the early
morning, later moderating and backing to W.
12.30 P.M. Hoisted anchor & proceeded.
6.15 P.M to 7.00 P.M. making Sta. 10405.

Wind increased from WNW during the night.

Nov. 11 Saturday. 5.15 AM to 6.15 AM. making Sta 10406
Wind increasing from WNW & rising sea.

8 AM reefed mainsail & furled jib
12. M to 1.15 PM. making Sta 10407
3 PM to 4.15 PM " " 10408

Wind dying down and sea flattening out.
6 P.M. shook reef out of mainsail.

Nov. 12 Sunday. Light E breeze. Smooth sea.
 7.25 AM to 8.45 AM. making Sta 10409
 Numerous phalaropes & several whales seen during
 the morning.
 12.20 PM. to 1.45 P.M. making Sta 10410
 3.30 P.M. wind died out, started engine. 4.30 P.M.
 clouding up, gentle showers. 5 P.M. wind freshening,
 stopped engine.
 7.00 PM. wind freshening with rain squalls. Upon
 Capt's suggestion decided to make no further stations
 until weather improved or a land-fall had been
 made.

Nov. 13. 8 AM arrived at Cape May & tied up at Fish Pier.
 Went to Phila. 4.15 P.M.

Nov. 14 Tuesday. In Phila. Met Mr. Vande Bogert
 on P.M. train for Cape May.

Nov. 15 Wednesday. Stormy weather with snow. As it
 would have been useless to try to work, stayed in
 harbor.

Nov. 16 Thursday. Day came in with high NW winds
 By ~~11~~ 11 AM wind had shifted to N. & moderated
 Cast off & proceeded to Norfolk.
 12.00 PM to 1.20 PM making sta 10411
 6.55 PM to 7.30 PM " " 10412

Nov. 17 Friday. Midnight to 12.45 AM. making Sta 10413
 7.30 AM to 9.15 AM " " 10414
 10.40 " " 12 M. " " 10415
 2.15 PM " 3.20 PM " " 10416
 8.45 " " 9.10 PM " " 10417

Nov. 18 Saturday 2 AM Came to anchor in Hampton Roads.
 8 AM. Hoisted up & proceeded to Portsmouth Va.
 Mr. Welsh & I went to Norfolk for mail in A.M. Visited
 Fish Hawk after dinner. Mr. Welsh left for Washington
 on evening boat.

Nov. 19 Sunday. In port.

Nov. 20 Monday. In port. Capt Mahoney brought bottom
 feeder aboard in A.M. Day spent in getting
 water & stores aboard, repairing engine and making
 ready for sea. Weather fine.

Nov. 21 Tuesday. Day came in with brisk NNE winds.
 Left Buoy wharf and proceeded to Seaville Point
 at 9:00 A.M. Anchored at 10:00 A.M.

Nov. 22 Day came in with light airs from N. Got under
 way at 6:30 A.M. Wind died out at 8:30 A.M. very pleasant
 weather. Clear and warm.
 11:15 AM to 11:45 making Stations 10418
 2:00 PM sky overcast. Light South breeze
 4:30 PM to 5:00 PM making Station 10419
 Have bad engine running all day.

Nov. 23 Thursday. Day came in with sky overcast and breeze
 freshening from South.
 3:57 AM to 4:30 making Stations 10420
 6:10 AM to 7:15 AM " " 10421
 8:00 AM to 9 " " 10422

By 9 o'clock sea was too rough to continue stations,
 after taking temperatures and samples, Capt. Carlson
 thought it best to stop work. Steered SW & W for
 42 miles then ran before wind (N & W) Barometric falling
 fast at 4 PM. Ran before wind to midnight

Nov 24 Friday. Ran before wind until 1:30 AM. near whistle buoy at Cape Henry. Wind shifted to SW & W Steered S out under riding sail. fore sail and fore stay sail. Currituck light abeam at 7:00 AM. sky clear sea moderate. wind stiff.

Too rough to attempt stations off Hatteras. Weather pleasant. Fresh breeze.

At 9:30 P.M. wind shifted to N.N.W. and blew a strong breeze. Mainsail taken in and riding sail set.

Nov 25 Saturday. 1 to 1:30 AM making station 10423. Wind force 5.

Sea too rough to make series of stations off Cape Lookout. Weather cold & clear.

8:30 P.M. trying Pan Lh. ship abeam.

Nov 26 Sunday. Arrived Southport N.C. at 8:30 AM. Wind Capt. H. Freeman of arrival. He came aboard with Capt. Osa Burroughs about noon.

I talked with Pilots and fishermen regarding "rocks" and got a lot of information.

Nov 27 Monday. In port waiting for Capt. Burroughs to come back from Wilmington with bait, lines and hooks. Weather pleasant.

Nov 28 Tuesday. Got under way at 8 o'clock and after crossing bar, steered SW $\frac{1}{2}$ S a distance of 9 miles. home two on coral bottom in 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ fms and after putting dory over as buoy, fished 20 min. with 8 lines catching 95 blockfish. Towed drag 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles to edge of coral. Buoy bearing NW \times N $\frac{1}{2}$ W. Tried hand lines. No success. Started back for buoy and stopped half way. Fished 15 min. catching 12 blockfish. Went $\frac{3}{8}$ mile toward buoy and tried hand lines 15 min catching 105 blockfish. This seemed to be best spot on line as it was

a common thing to pull up two fist at once. Fish average from $\frac{1}{4}$ lb to 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ lbs.

Indications of S.E. wind made us discontinue work. Took up dory and left small barrel to mark spot. Arrived in Southport at 4 o'clock P.M.

Nov 29 Wednesday. In port all day. Rain & S.E. wind

Nov 30 Thursday. In port.

Dec 1 Friday. Day came in clear with light air from North. Left wharf at 9:40 AM bound for fishing ground 9 miles SW $\frac{1}{2}$ S from bell buoy. Ran under power to buoy then shut down engines. Ran an ENE course towing drag 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ miles to edge of coral rock. Buoy bearing W.S.W. Fished 10 min, no results. Ran $\frac{1}{3}$ distance back. Fished 15 min with 8 lines caught 65 blackfish. Ran another $\frac{1}{3}$ back and fished with 8 lines for 15 min. Catch 139 blackfish 1 C. nebulosus (38 cms.) Fished stations 12:30

Ran a NNW course 2 miles from buoy, to edge of coral rock. Buoy bearing SSE. Hand lines tried 10 min. no success. Ran $\frac{1}{3}$ distance back. Tried lines 15 min. no success. Ran back $\frac{1}{3}$ distance tried lines 15 min. no success. Bottoms seem to be good on this leg but no fish caught.

Ran a line west 200 yds to edge of coral rock, finishing this rock. which is called "Middle Ground". Home to and waited for daylight before going in.

Dec 2 Saturday. Arrived in harbor at 9:15 AM and lay at T all day.

Dec 3 Sunday. At T in stream. Went ashore for mail and to talk with fishermen and pilots. Capt. Burris and Mr. Montgomery (Off. Fish warden) came aboard in evening.

Dec 4 Monday. After taking on 350 gal. gas and
300 lbs ice left wharf at 10:30 and run to lightship
making stations 10428 from 2:23 to 3:11 P.M.
Weather fine. Sea smooth. Air warm.

6:09 PM to 6:42 making station 10429.

Light Southerly breeze sea calm.

9:00 P.M. Showers and squall. Took in mainsail
and hoisted riding sail.

10:00 PM to 10:45 making stations 10430. Sea rough.
Too rough for making hauls. Ran for lee of Tryon Pass
shoal.

Dec 5 Tuesday. Day came in with fresh SW breeze. vessel
jogging nearly all day. Tried to fish on "Snapper Bank"
too much wind. vessel wouldn't let lines reach
bottom. Home too at midnight

Dec 6 Wednesday. Day came in with fresh NW to N
winds. Decided to go to harbor. Under reefed
mainsail, foresail + fore. stay sail

Dec 7 Day came in with light NE airs. very pleasant.
under way at 6:30. for lightship grounds.
Put drag over at 11:00 AM on courses and ranges
indicated by pilots and fishermen. Towed drag until
7:30 P.M. without locating more than very scattering
single stones. vessel jogged around all night.

Dec 8 Day came in with light southerly airs. very pleasant.
Made stations 10431, 10432, 10433, and 10434
competing small ground 1 1/4 miles WSW of off-shore
light buoy. Barometer falling all day. In port and
along side wharf at 7:30 P.M.

Dec 9 Saturday. Wind and rain. In port.

Capt. Freeman came on board at noon. left at 2:30 P.M.

Dec 10 Sunday. In port. Fresh N.W. breeze. Cold.
Capt. Freeman came aboard in place of
Capt. Burris. Wind freshened in evening.

Dec 11 Monday. Day came in with high SSE winds and
rain. Wind shifted to WSW and continued to blow hard.
Absolutely no chance to work.

Dec 12 Tuesday. Day came in with high WNW winds and
rain. Wind hauling to north. Too rough to go out.

Dec 13 Wednesday. Day came in with cold brisk west
winds. Got under way at 6:30 for clam ground.
Went to river mouth, but sea was too rough
to do outside work. Menadon steamer all at
anchor inside Bald Head. Started to Wilmington,
passing Southport at 7:25 A.M. Arrived Wilmington 9:45
and tied to wharf. Started repairs. Brisk wind all
day.

Dec 14 Thursday. Day came in clear and cold. Light NW
breeze. Discovered 4 planks on port quarter badly
dry-rotted. Must be replaced before going to sea

Dec 15 Friday. Day came in with Southerly winds and rain.
Cleared with N.W. wind in P.M.

Dec 16 Saturday. Day came in with cold N.W. winds. Made
ice in sun until 10 A.M. Work of removing bad
planks continued. 5 planks so far removed. Timbers
in bad condition. Work across river to ship yard.
Railway busy; couldn't haul out.

Dec 17 Sunday

Dec. 18 Monday. Arrived Wilmington 10 AM & met Mr. Van de Bogert & Mr. Freeman. Had a short talk with the latter, who promised to come on board in the P.M. to discuss matters, as he had to be out of town for a few days. (He did not turn up).

Went on board with Van de B. Found five planks removed from port quarter, rotten, and the timbers beneath them partly rotten. Men from yard working on job in very hirsute fashion. Mr. Van de B. left on 3.15 P.M. train. Weather very cold with high winds & showers.

Dec. 19 Tuesday. Still repairing. Very cold. Getting things in shape on board. Recd 2 cases water bottles & 2 boxes by express from Washington.

Dec. 20 Wednesday. Clear & warmer. Still working on planking - very slowly. No mail from Washington since Monday. Checked temp. readings, etc., etc., & installed micro lamp in laboratory.
8.30 P.M. S.E rain & wind.

Dec. 21 Thursday. Cold. Still "working" on planking.

Dec. 22 Friday. Still "working" on planking.

Dec. 23 Saturday. Carpenters "worked" $\frac{1}{2}$ day.

Dec. 24 Sunday. No work.

Dec. 25 Xmas. No work, took walk up swamp road & saw 3 small frogs out. Warmer today.

Dec. 26 Tuesday. Yacht Mariner came off railway, and they attempted to haul us out, but failed on the falling tide.

Dec. 27 Wednesday. Vessel hauled out at last, & men at work on stem and port quarter. In the A.M. went up swamp road with a dip net, and got the following fishes from the ditch alongside the road. Temperature about 65° (air)

Saw one snake out (like garter-snake, but longer and thinner) 1 *Hyla pickeringii*, and one small frog.

About 9 P.M. the *Hyla pickeringii* began to whistle in the swamp back of the railway, and we still at it whenever I woke up during the night (3 or 4 times).

Dec. 28 Still on railway, men at "work." In A.M. went by trolley to have a look at Wrightsville, the thoroughfares, and Wilmington Beach. Man fishing on pier (outside) says nothing doing since Thanksgiving day. Plenty red drum Sept 1st to Oct 30th, many small, 5 to 10 lbs.

In P.M. tried to get some *Heterandria* alive to send to Washington, only got 2, 1 ♂ & 1 ♀. Put in a 1 qt jar to test hardiness. Hylas whistling at intervals in afternoon & evening.

Dec 29 Friday In A.M. fished the ditch up road on Eggle's Id. with a dip-net. Took 11 ~~species~~ species as follows.

Also 2 salamanders, 2 crayfish + 2 turtles (small)

Dec. 30 Saturday. Carpenter still "working" on planks. Only $\frac{1}{2}$ day today. Shifted vessel from yard over to Wilmington side of river.

Dec. 31 Sunday. No work. Went down to Wrightsville beach in P.M.

Jan 1st 1917 New Years Day. No work.

Jan 2 Tuesday. Carpenter finished work of repairs late today. A rough job.

Jan 3 Wednesday. Crew at work smoothing up + painting over repairs. Would have gotten away today, but tide served too early.

In P.M. went to pond on the S. city limit of Wilmington, with a dip-net, & fished around the edges. Took 10 species, & saw 2 more, as follows:

A man fishing had 1 yellow perch + 1 crappie. (he called the crappie "goggle-eye", and the perch "red-fin trout".

Also took 1 newt, 2 salamanders + tadpoles + some fresh water shrimp.

Jan 4 Thursday. At 8.20 A.M. left Wilmington and proceeded down the river. 11.45 A.M. passed out by bell buoy off Cape Fear R. entrance.

1.45 P.M. tried to make a trial for claws (Sta 10435) in 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ fath off Shallotte Inlet, but could find nothing but rough hard bottom. Surface temp 52.5. Proceeded for Brunswick. SW head winds all night.

Jan 5 SW head winds. 2 P.M. had Charleston slightly abeam. Several small boats out fishing for sea bass. At 3 P.M. head winds increasing + barometer falling, Capt decided to put into Charleston Hr. where we came to an t at 4.45 P.M. 5 P.M. heavy squall with rain.

Jan 6 Saturday. Cleared up during night with stiff N.W. breeze. 8 A.M. have up t + started for Brunswick, Ga. Wind steadily failing all day, + about 2 P.M. had

to start motor. Smooth sea all day, no sign of fish except a few gannets diving.

The muddy fresh water off Charleston extends a long way off shore (to the S.W.). Water all day pale green.

Jan 7th Sunday. Arrived at Brunswick about 9 A.M. Met a Mr. Toomey, of the Post Office who introduced me to several shrimp men, and gave me the directions of all of them. Mr. Abrams, of the Glynn Canning Co. was out of town. Looked over a number of the shrimp boats. The otter trawls used are from 30 (25 sometimes) to 50 ft spread, with a mesh of $1\frac{1}{2}$ to $1\frac{3}{4}$ inch stretch. They are ~~are~~ of various shapes, and proportions, each man making up his favorite shape. Some are tanned, and some are not, mostly not. The nets are hauled by hand, even in the large boats, by a crew of 4 to 5 men. When the boards are in, the cod-end is lifted by a tackle slung from a pair of shears-poles extending over the stern. All the boats have wide, square stems, some with overhanging "porches" and rollers. They seldom fish in water over 20 ft deep. Fishing proceeds in every month except May, June & July, when the shrimp are supposed to be spawning.

Jan 8 Monday. Visited every packer in the place in the effort to buy two shrimp-trawls, but none were to be had. If we had been here on Saturday it would have been easy to get them. It would take probably 2 days to get them made. All said the same thing. All said they could be had in Fernandina, without trouble.



A number of fishermen.

Crew busy today stopping leak in bow at waterline, and taking stores, gasoline, water etc.

Jan 9 Tuesday. Left Brunswick ^{ca.} 6.30 A.M. for Fernandina. Arrived Fernandina 2 P.M. Called on several shrimp-packers, in the effort to get nets. Finally arranged with Mr. F. H. Gorenflo, of the Fernandina Packing Co., to have his net-maker make up 2 30 ft shrimp trawls, to be finished and delivered tomorrow, the price not to exceed \$30 each. This is the usual cost of such nets, and the maker, A. Fisher, has a reputation for doing excellent work. There was no other way to get these nets without considerable delay.

There are about 150 boats engaged in the shrimp fishery here, mostly small, manned by 2 or 3 men each, chiefly Portuguese & Norwegians. Arranged with one of the Portuguese fishermen to go out with him tomorrow.

Jan 10 Wednesday. Left vessel in shrimp-boat at 5 A.M. This boat, about 30 ft, 15 h.p. fishes a 40 or 50 ft net with boards as follows



Bridles 16" x 24", the upper pair 1" longer than the lower
Holes 3" from top & bottom. 30 to 35 fath. water

We made 5 hauls of 1 hour each, the first two south of the jetties on sand, 5½ to 2 fath., and the last 3 north of the jetties on mud bottom, using a 40 ft net, 2 in stretch, with 1½ in stretch in cod-end.

Haul #1 1 Bushel shrimp.

A few small fish, cutlass-fish, flounders, tongue fish, whiting, bull-heads, sphyraena, Stelliferus, harvest fish etc etc. Also small squid, sea-urchins, stars, jelly fish, 2 blue crabs.

Haul #2. 1½ Bushel shrimp. 1 sand shark, pickle-fish.

1 sting ray, 1 cow-nosed ray, 1 small bonnet-head shark, ¼ bushel of small fish (as before) 9 blue crabs.

Haul #3. 3 Bushel shrimp.

2 bushels small fish (as before) Many stars, 6 blue crabs.

Haul #4. 5½ Bushel shrimp.

1 bushel small fish (as before) ½ bushel stars, jellies etc. 3 blue crabs

Haul #5 3½ Bushel shrimp.

1½ bushel small fish (as before) 2 bushel stars, jellies etc.

The largest shrimp seen was 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches from tip of rostrum to tip of tail, and its overall length was 26 inches.

The nets were delivered on board at 4.30 P.M., and a voucher given to A. Fisher for \$59.18.

Jan 11. Came in with high N.W. winds. Waited until 10 A.M. and then decided to start for Key West, making stations if possible.. Too much wind against the stream to go off shore. Passed Fernandina buoy 11 A.M., & bore away on course

3 P.M. St Augustine abeam.

9 P.M. Mosquito Sulet ..

Jan 12 2 A.M. Hitzel Shoal abeam.
4 P.M. Jupiter light ..
10 P.M. Hillsboro Sulet ..

Flying fish abundant in the P.M. One trutta seen, but water too rough to see much. Saw some large Carangids after flying-fish. Trolled all day without result

Going up the canal a large Dutch steamer coming down took a sudden sheer, and forced Grampus against the bank, striking a glancing blow, and doing no damage, except the loss of a little paint.

There is a thick layer of asphaltic oil on the water at Port Arthur, which kills all fish which come in contact with it. It is stated that it sometimes kills even the big gars, and that in summer often whole schools of menhaden are destroyed.

Saw the oil killing numerous small anchovies.

4 P.M. caught trolling 1 Spanish mackerel ♂, testis
undeveloped, Stomach empty. 71 cm long.

Sunday.

April 1. 6.30 A.M. anchored at Boca Grande. Went up
to town + saw several fishermen. All fish scarce
since the big mortality last fall. 3 tarpon taken
yesterday still-fishing on the flats. None being

taken in the pass. Mullet very scarce. Quite a few
shrimp being taken with lights and dipnets under
the phosphate wharf. This is very unusual, as shrimp
are seldom taken here.

In evening fished the Pass for tarpon without result.

April 2 Monday. Made several hauls with shrimp trawl
about the harbor, with negative results. Bottom very
barren, + hardly any fish.

Made 3 seine hauls on the beach outside Phosphate
wharf. Young ~~Pomolobus~~ very abundant.
Preserved several hundred. Saw Dr. Atwood who
expressed interest in our work, and hoped we could
come back soon with a better outfit.

April 3. Tuesday. Left Boca Grande 6 A.M. Passed 14 boats
tarpon fishing in the Pass.

7 A.M. to 7.45 A.M. made Sta 10486 at Boca
Grande outer buoy. Shrimp trawl, 45 minutes,
yielded as follows.

- 188 small grunts
- 291 " red mullet (*Mullus*)
- 4 Butter-fish
- 4 Carangids
- 2 Gurnards
- 2 Puffers
- 3 Diflection
- 8 file-fish
- 2 Mojaras
- 4 Orthopristis (1 ripe ♂)
- 2 Sea cats
- 3 squid
- 2 medium sized shrimp.
