# **Guidance for Livestock Markets during COVID-19 Pandemic**

This guidance is based on what is currently known about the transmission and severity of COVID-19 and information made available by Nevada Health Response. The Nevada Department Agriculture (NDA) will update this guidance as needed and as additional information becomes available. Local agencies may have additional guidance and/or requirements regarding these operations in their jurisdiction.

#### **Recommended Precautions for Livestock Markets**

Animal agriculture including the sale of animals falls under the category "agriculture" which has been deemed "essential" under <u>Governor Sisolak's directives</u>. Livestock markets and other operations must prepare and take precautions to help prevent the spread of COVID-19.

## **Livestock Market Guidance**

Social distancing

- Minimize market attendees to essential personnel only such as necessary employees to
  operate the market, regulatory employees, veterinarians, brand inspectors, and buyers (no
  additional visitors or social gatherings).
- Require all individuals to maintain at least six feet of space between each other.
- Request consignors remain in truck as much as possible, unload livestock and leave premises as soon as possible.
- Use market staff to assist in unloading livestock.
- Any restaurants on the market premises should be closed for dine-in eating. Only take-out food can be offered.

### Cleaning and protecting individual health

- Require washing stations or an alcohol-based gel before entering and after leaving the facility.
- All individuals are recommended to wear cloth <u>face coverings</u> when around other individuals or animals and should refrain from touching the covering or their face.
- Cover cough with elbow and sneeze with a tissue, then dispose of it.
- Frequently wash hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or with an alcohol-based gel.
- All contact surfaces should be disinfected twice daily or more frequently.
- Follow CDC Disinfection Guidelines when cleaning and use approved disinfectants.

#### Monitoring illness

- Monitor staff for signs of illness.
- Anyone experiencing signs of illness should stay home, contact their healthcare provider and follow CDC-recommended steps.
- If anyone becomes sick:
  - Close off areas and identify equipment used by the sick person.

- Open outside doors and windows to increase air circulation in the area. Wait 24 hours (or as long as possible) before you clean or disinfect.
- Clean and disinfect all areas and equipment used by the sick person, such as vehicles, bathrooms, common areas, tablets, computers, etc.
