
From the Executive Director

Centennial celebrations are a big deal, so I was excited to join Oladiran Fasina, head of the Department of Biosystems Engineering at Auburn University, for a dinner and a section meeting celebrating his <u>department's centennial</u>. The department has created a <u>nicely crafted video</u> and an impressive history book to mark the occasion. It was also a treat to catch up with old friends Bob Schafer, Paul Turnquist, Steve Taylor, and many others. A special tribute was given to Jimmy Butt and Art Cooper, who were lifelong friends of the department and ASABE. They both passed away just last year after long and useful lives— Art was 100 and Jimmy was 96.



The centennial dinner also served as the dedication ceremony for ASABE's 59th historic landmark plaque (see photo at left), for the Cooperative Program of Rural Electrification, which will be placed at the

department's Tom E. Corley Building. Back in the 1920s, the Alabama Power Company (APC) reluctantly completed its first rural line down the Whitesburg Pike in Madison, Ala., providing service to ten farms, a cotton gin, and a dairy. Hoping to sell more power—rather than "just lighting a farmer's single lightbulb"—APC worked with Mark Nichols (professor and head of Auburn's then agricultural engineering department, and future ASAE president) to establish a cooperative program for rural electrification. This was the first agreement of its kind between a power company and an agricultural engineering department, and it lasted more than 50 years. Click here to learn

GreenBiz Group's Makower to Keynote 2019 Annual Meeting



Joel Makower, chairman and executive editor of <u>GreenBiz</u> <u>Group</u>, has been announced as this year's keynote speaker for the ASABE Annual International Meeting.

Nearly every company is assessing itself through the lens of sustainability. For a handful of leadership companies, it involves asking the question, "How do we compete in a world in which energy, water, materials, carbon and toxicity are constraints to growth?" Makower is author of more than a dozen books, including his latest, *The New Grand Strategy: Restoring America's Prosperity, Security, and Sustainability in the 21st Century.* In 2012, Makower was awarded the Hutchens Medal by the American Society for Quality, which cited "his ability to tell compelling stories that both inform and inspire business leaders toward profitable action." In 2014, he was inducted into the Hall of Fame of the International Society of Sustainability Professionals.

Twenty-Second Annual 1/4-Scale Competition Set for Late May



Twenty-nine university teams from the US, Canada, and Israel will vie for prizes and global recognition for their design innovations in ASABE's Annual International ¼-Scale Tractor Student Design Competition. The competition will be held May 30 to June 2, at the Expo Gardens in Peoria, Ill. The event is free and open to the public.

Teams have spent the 2018-2019 academic

year designing and building utility or recreational pulling tractors that they will present and demonstrate at the competition. Each team is supplied a set of Titan tires and one 31-hp Briggs and Stratton engine. They are responsible for acquiring all other components of their machines.

The ¼-scale competition is unique among student engineering design contests in that it provides a realistic "360-degree" workplace experience. A panel of industry experts judge each design for innovation, manufacturability, serviceability, safety, sound level, and ergonomics. Teams also submit a written design report in advance of the competition, and onsite they must "sell" their design, in a formal presentation to industry experts playing the role of a corporate management team. Finally, machines are put to the performance test in a demonstration comprising a series of tractor pulls, a maneuverability course, and a durability course.

Corporate sponsors for this year's event are AGCO, Briggs & Stratton, Campbell Scientific, Inc., Case IH, Caterpillar, Danfoss, Deere & Company, Kubota, New Holland, SolidWorks, Thomson, and Titan International. The O*NET Data Collection Program, which is sponsored by the US Department of Labor, is seeking the input of experts in precision agriculture. The nation's most comprehensive source of occupational data, O*NET is a free resource for millions of job seekers, employers, veterans, educators, and students.

ASABE members have the opportunity to participate in this important initiative, and your participation will help ensure the complexities of your profession are described accurately in the O*NET database for the American public.

O*NET Description of Precision Agriculture Technicians

Apply geospatial technologies, including geographic information systems (GIS) and global positioning system (GPS), to agricultural production or management activities, such as pest scouting, site-specific pesticide application, yield mapping, or variable-rate irrigation. May use computers to develop or analyze maps or remote sensing images to compare physical topography with data on soils, fertilizer, pests, or weather.

You are considered an Occupation Expert if you meet the following criteria:

- You are currently active in the occupation (practicing, supervising, teaching and/or training) and based in the US
- You have a bachelor's degree and at least five years of experience in the occupation.

Soupir Honored by Iowa State



Michelle Soupir, associate professor of agricultural and biosystems engineering, lowa State University, is the recipient of the 2019 McNair Scholars Faculty Mentor of the Year award. Each year, the Ronald E. McNair Scholars Program awards the McNair Faculty Mentor of the Year achievement to one faculty member in recognition of their work for the program and for exceeding the program's mentor expectations. Faculty are nominated by the McNair Scholars they mentor, and Soupir was nominated for her great connection and meaningful interactions with her mentee.

The McNair Scholars Program is designed to prepare qualified undergraduate students to enter a PhD program following their graduation. The program supports students from traditionally underrepresented groups in higher education, including first-generation and low-income students.

Soupir is a 22-year member of ASABE.

Biofuels Standards Champion Melin Set to Retire

After a long and distinguished career, Staffan Melin is planning to retire. Melin is best known by ASABE and CSBE members for <u>his work with wood pellets</u> and safe use of this important biofuel. He was also very active in ISO Technical Committee 238, Solid Biofuels, and worked to align Canada and the US during the development of key international standards.

Fouss Receives Royce J. Tipton Award



The American Society of Civil Engineers has honored ASABE Fellow James L. Fouss with the 2019 Royce J. Tipton Award for significant contributions to the advancement of agricultural drainage and water management through research, technology transfer, and service. Fouss had a distinguished 46-year career with USDA-ARS as an agricultural engineer and research leader, retiring in 2011.

Fouss is recognized as a world leader in agricultural drainage. From 1960 to 1972, he conducted original and pioneering

research and development of 4-in.-diameter polyethylene plastic corrugated-wall drainage tubing, and the laser-beam automatically controlled plow-type equipment for rapid and accurate subsurface drain installation. He directed and supervised fabrication and testing of prototype corrugated plastic tubing, plow equipment, and the laser-beam grade-control system using modeling/simulation and laboratory and field experiment methods, and provided technical assistance in developing the first ASTM standard and specification for corrugated high-density polyethylene plastic tubing based on research findings and product testing.

Fouss has authored more than 160 technical journal articles, bulletins, and conference proceedings, ten book chapters, sixteen US and two foreign patents (while in industry), and many technical reports and private engineering consulting reports on corrugated plastic pipe design.

He is a 57-year member of ASABE.

AAAS Seeks Women for If/Then Ambassadors Program

The AAAS IF/THEN Ambassadors program brings together 100 women from a variety of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics careers to serve as high-profile role models for middle school girls. The program highlights women in STEM who are contributing in all these fields, showing girls the different career pathways they can pursue and how STEM impacts their lives every day. Ambassadors will gather for in-person summits, create personal press kits that highlight their stories and take their outreach to the next level, be featured in original entertainment and media content, and engage with middle school girls in formal and informal educational spaces.
