

New Awards Policy Reflects Emphasis on Ethics

A new <u>policy on ethics in awards and recognition</u> was approved earlier this year by the Board of Trustees and will strengthen the integrity of ASABE's honors.

The policy was drafted by an ad hoc committee led by Kati Migliaccio. The policy was modeled after a draft policy created by the Societies Consortium on Harassment in STEM, of which ASABE is a member and represents general consensus of the consortium member organizations. The new policy describes a process for reporting and investigating honors and awards recipients who may have violated ethical conduct expectations. Unethical conduct includes, among other acts, sexual harassment and discrimination based on factors, such as race and ethnicity, that are unrelated to a person's ability and promise, whether alone or in connection with sexual harassment.

The policy also conveys the standards and expectations that we value in each other as individuals and collectively as a professional society.

We encourage you to <u>read the policy</u> to gain an appreciation of what we value, and of the qualities embodied by those who receive awards and recognition from ASABE.

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Giving Back Awards: Funding Applications Underway

ASABE members have servants' hearts and can often be found sharing their engineering expertise with vulnerable communities. If you are engaged in or considering a humanitarian engineering project that could benefit from financial support, the <u>Giving Back Fund</u> can help.

The Giving Back Fund exists to showcase the knowledge and skills of the agricultural and biological engineering profession through projects that benefit underserved individuals or groups. Past fund recipients include the Purdue PUP vehicle project, and a Village Harvest Center, in Laos. An ASABE Foundation fund, the Giving Back Fund has money available annually to support one or more projects. <u>Submissions</u> are due to ASABE headquarters by December 31 of each year.

Like the concept of the Giving Back Fund? Giving Back projects are underwritten by the ASABE Foundation, and donations are strongly encouraged so that more projects may receive financial support. Donors will be asked to designate what portion of their contribution is to be used in the year given, and which portion is to be placed in the endowed fund, from which the future earnings can be used to support projects.

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Das Presents to National Academies, USAID Audience



ASABE member KC Das is currently serving as a Jefferson Science Fellow at the National Academies of Science, Engineering, and Medicine (NASEM), through which he is a senior science advisor to the US Agency for International Development. Recently he was a featured speaker in NASEM's Distinguished Lecture series, with a presentation entitled "Opportunities in Transdisciplinary Integration: A Journey from Agricultural Engineering to Social Cohesion Theory." In it, he discussed frameworks and theories in positive youth development and related opportunities that could lead to economic development and greater well-

being. The presentation also included an overview of social cohesion theory, to provide a canvas for defining broader development goals, as well as opportunities for integrating food security programming with health, education, and other targeted programming.
