Understanding aphasia recovery through Functional Near-Infrared Spectroscopy

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Many questions regarding the nature of neural recovery in early post-stroke aphasia remain unanswered, largely due to the shortage of functional imaging studies in this population. Logistical challenges of MRI are central barriers to early stroke imaging. Functional Near-Infrared Spectroscopy (fNIRS) is a promising—although underutilized—alternative to MRI as it is relatively inexpensive and portable. In this talk, I will describe an fNIRS pilot study protocol aimed at indexing recovery over one year after acute left or right hemisphere infarct, present preliminary results from this pilot project, and discuss the benefits and barriers of using fNIRS to expand our understanding of aphasia recovery.
