He announces the cancellation of the arrangements for a conference and the necessity of his consulting his colleagues on the subject.

The premier is careful not to close the door to possible resumption of the negotiations. On the contrary, he gives Mr. de Valera and his suporters the ampiest time and opportunity to reconsider their position.

The fact that Premier Lioyd George is suffering from a chill was confirmed at his official residence in Downing street tonight. It was also announced that it would be necessary for the premier to remain indexes for a few days.

Objections, particularly by peasa, members, to classifying married women whose household duties were performed by serv-ants as "professional wives" brought about an attempt to evade the issue by the use of the words "professional callings" in-stead of laborers, in the con-stitution.

There is a probability that hus-bands will be asked to put their wives on a salary and recognize woman's equality by sharing in the work of cooking, washing and caring for the children.

Controlling the jobs of the representatives of the workers, controlling their very lives, with advantages which this control exercises upon the minds of the 'workers' employer representation' is a tragic farce.
