This photograph shows the destruction wrought by fire during the recent race riots in Tulen, Okla. More than ten blocks of homes in the negro sections of the city were burned, while many lives were snuffed out in the street fighting. The rioting continued the better part of 24 hours. A special grand jury, acting under the direction of the attorney general of the state, Prince Freeling, is at present conducting a probe into the conditions which led up to the race war.

# IS SUGGESTED BY OKLAHOMA SOLON

ADVISABILITY GOVERNMENT BUYING SURPLUS WHILE MARKET IS FALLING

Tulsa, Okla., June 10.-United States Senator Robert L. Owen, here looking after business interests, pointed out a partial solution of the stagnation in the ou market when he sent a telegram last night to President Harding recommending that the United States government take advantage of the present low market by purchasing the surplus for its own

Senator Owen's telegram read: "The administration, while oil is cheap and the oil industry is in need of a market for fuel oil, ought to put up tankage and store one hundred million barrels of cheap oil against future needs of the navy and merchant marine. .1 commend the consideration of this matter to you and your cabinet."

Senator owen declared such action on the part of the government would result in saving of much money since oil is sure to rise in price and the commodity would be purchased otherwise for federal use in smaller quantities at a far greater cost. He expressed the belief that the proposition would receive serious consideration and was hopeful of its adoption.

At the present price of \$1.50 per barrel, the oil storage program outlined would entail an expenditure by the government of \$150,000,000.

Senator Owen was of the opinion also, that the buying of surplus oil at this time by the government would stimulate the general market speedily and result in a quick return to higher price levels , with renewed activity and the furnishing of employment to many idle men through the midcontinent oil fields.
