

MRS. SCHLEMMER SEEKS SEPARATION

Asserts Hardware Merchant Sought to Force Her Into Collusive Divorce.

NAMES MRS. WILKINSON Refuses to Seek Absolute Severance of Ties Because of Religion.

HUSBAND'S FORTUNE BIG He Disputes Wife's Claim That His Income Is \$250,000 a Year.

Asserting that her husband, William F. Schlemmer, head of the hardware house of Hammacher, Schlemmer & Co., "mocked, sneered and ridiculed her religious beliefs in refusing to consent to a collusive divorce."

Trouble Began at Party.

The Schlemmers were married Aug. 29, 1914, at Danbury, Conn. They have no children. Two years ago Mrs. Schlemmer established an estate at Great Neck, L. I., at an expense of \$250,000, according to the complaint.

Charges "Kultur'd" Cruelty.

Mrs. Schlemmer asserts that her husband has refused since September, 1920, to associate with her in a husbandly fashion "or to show her any of the social attentions and courtesies incident to such relationship."
