Physical Examinations at Any Recruiting Station Aid Admission.

CLASS WILL NUMBER 800

Will Have the Advantage of Training Together Nearly All Summer.

ANNAPOLIS, June 25.—All previous records will be broken in the formation of the new class at the Naval Academy and it is expected that it will reach the number of about 500 within ten days. It is possible to obtain these results because of a change in the method of physical examination, sreally expediting the work of the examining board and also becausee a better system of issuing the outfits to the new midshipmen has been devised.

candidates for the Naval Academy are now permitted to take their physical examinations for admission before the medical officer at any navy recruiting station in the country. While the examining board at the Naval Academy also makes an examination, it is much smaller in scope than that previously given and a far larger number can be examined. In fact, from seventy-five to a hundred youths are being examined daily, while not more than a third of that number could be examined under the old method.

Many youths who pass the mental tests make the trip to Annapolis, in some cases from the extreme western part of the United States, to find that they are not fitted physically for the service. This will be obviated in almost every case, though there have been a few instances where the local board declined to approve youths who had been passed by the medical officer at the recruiting station. This will be very ware, however.

In view of its early completion the new class should be further advanced by the beginning of the new academic year, October 1, than any which has preceded it. TULSA POLICE CHIEF INDICTED OVER RIOT

Seven Civilians and Four Other Policemen Named by Grand Jury.

SHERIFF IS EXONERATED

Underlying Cause of Rioting Rests on Propaganda of Race Equality, Says Report.

Tulsa, June 25 .- Grand Jury investigation of the recent race riots here against seven civilians and five of the city police, including Chief John Gustafson. Previously about ninety indict-

ducted the inquiry, told the court he could not fully concur in the jury's findcould not fully concur in the jury's findlngs, believing that accusations should
have been made against other officials
and alleged rioters. Chief Gustafson
and the four policemen are charged with
conspiracy to dispose of stolen automobiles, and the Chief in addition is
charged with failure to enforce the prohibition law, failure to suppress vice
and failure to enforce the law against
the carrying of firearms.

On request of the Grand Jury and the

Attorney-General. District Judge Val-jean Biddison, to whom the report was made, immediately ordered the sus-pension of Chief Gustafson from office. Judge Biddison announced that all the accused policemen stood suspended pend-tres trial.

The report of the Grand Jury found that the race trouble resulted from armed negroes marching up town to defend Dick Rowland, negro, from lynching; that no attempt had been made or was being made to lynch Rowland and the crowd of whites assembled about the Court House was largely a peaceful one; that the armed negroes were responsible for the riots; that the whites who assembled at the Court House and took part in the fighting there later were not to blame.
