All indictments will be turned over to the court clerk and deputies from the attorney's department will begin serving warrants at once.

Only Five Are in Jail. So far only five of the 38 indicted by the grand jury have been apprehended.

Very few of the 34 original indictments returned have yet been served, as most of the men left the city immediately following the riot.
