

SEEK REPEAL OF LAWYER LIEN LAW

Attack on Statute Is One of the Results of the Meeting

WOULD PROBE CHARGE

Citizens Ask Bar Association to Determine Whether Lawyers Are Guilty

That the attorney lien law increases the cost of government, decreases confidence in courts, brings the bar into disrepute and provides a fertile field for "ambulance chasers" and "title ghouls" is one of the statements contained in a resolution passed by the mass meeting of citizens at Convention hall Tuesday night. The resolution asks that the bar association determine if the charges made against members of the profession in the courts and in the public press are well founded, and that it make an effort to repeal the lien law.

The resolution, which was prepared and introduced by Frank H. Greer, follows:

"Whereas, the great number of attacks on titles in this state is destroying the confidence of the people both at home and abroad in our justice, discouraging investors and hindering the growth and development of the state, and

"Whereas, many of these suits are directly due to a statute of this state authorizing contingent fees and giving attorneys filing such suits a lien for attorney's fees and imposing the payment of the fees contracted for up to 10 per cent of the value of the property on the defendant in case of compromise without the attorney's consent, and this is so imposed without reference to the merits of the plaintiff's claim, the amount paid in compromise or the service rendered, and

"Whereas, a law of this kind offers the greatest temptation to the unethical and unscrupulous lawyer to stir up litigation, to file unjust suits, to prevent the settlement and compromise of controversies, to report to unethical practices in securing evidence, that in increasing the cost of government brings the bar into disrepute, destroying the confidence of the people in the courts which is a menace to good government, that it affords a fertile field for "ambulance chasers" and "title ghouls" who in the language of the streets are called "title ghouls" and "ambulance chasers" that it has brought on all these abuses herein set out and other abuses.

"Therefore, be it resolved that in the sense of this meeting that it be resolved as modified as to prevent said abuses:

"That a law should be enacted making it a crime to stir up litigation with a view to any attorney's contingent fee, and

"That the members of the bar and the commercial bar and a civil club in Tulsa and the state of Oklahoma are hereby requested to petition the state legislature to repeal said law and to such legislation as is necessary.

Copy to Association.

"Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to the president of the Oklahoma Bar Association and that said association be requested to investigate and determine if the charges made against members of the members of the profession on the streets and in the public press are well founded, and that it join in the effort to repeal said statute and correct the abuses herein set out and other abuses.

The crowd was in complete accord with this resolution, especially that portion which referred to the repeal of the lien law. The spark of indignation was fanned into a potential flame when an unidentified man who explained he is a member of the bar association, advanced an oratorical defense of the attorneys. He was unpopular with the crowd, which made no attempt to conceal its feelings. Amid yells and hisses he was forced to retire without finishing his oration.

No Committee Yet.

Mayor T. D. Evans, who acted as chairman of Tuesday night's meeting, has not yet appointed the committee of seven attorneys to advise with property owners and with members of the Oklahoma delegation regarding the memorializing of congress to pass a curative act for titles in Tulsa. The committee will probably be appointed Thursday, according to the mayor, and at the same time a committee of seven property owners from each of the four additions in litigation will also be appointed to cooperate in their plans for relief.

Organize New Church.

A Baptist church will be organized at Red Fork Thursday night by Rev. S. R. Brinkley of the Sand Springs church. Organization will come as the climax of a series of evangelistic meetings held by Brinkley in a tent belonging to the Tulsa Baptist union.

TO PAY RACE RIOT BILLS

Claims Against Oklahoma National Guard Will Be Settled

Three persons and firms that hold bills against the Oklahoma National Guard, contracted during the riot, are to receive payment in full. E. B. Howard, former congressman, who was appointed as a committee to represent the Chamber of Commerce in the settlement of this matter, received a letter from Gov. J. A. Robertson Wednesday stating that a deficiency certificate has already been issued and forwarded, and that the money will be forthcoming immediately.

When Howard called on the governor a few days ago in Oklahoma City, Robertson was apparently undecided as to whether this certificate should be issued. However, he decided to issue a check, as indicated by the letter received Monday. It was first suggested by the secretary that Tulsa business men advance the money in the meantime, and make an application to cover it, but apparently the governor was disinclined to do so.
