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REACH DECISION TO REVISE PLANS OF MINCO BRIDGE

Grady and Canadian Commissioners Place Stamp of Approval on Recommendations of Federal Highway Department

DECIDE TO BUILD A STRONGER STRUCTURE

More Money Will be Spent; Grady to Give \$27,000 in Addition to \$73,000 Appropriated Several Months Ago.

Following recommendations of the federal highway department, the county commissioners of Grady and Canadian counties have agreed to changes in the plans for the bridge to be constructed over the South Canadian river between Minco and Union City.

This agreement was reached at a conference, attended by the commissioners from the two counties and federal and state highway officials, held yesterday in Oklahoma City.

The new plans agreed upon call for a longer and stronger structure, according to Dave Hybarger, chairman of the board of county commissioners of Grady county. The necessity of a stronger bridge was demonstrated when the recent South Canadian river flood washed out the piers that had been constructed.

It is estimated that as a result of the changes in the plans and specifications, approximately \$108,000 in addition to the amount already appropriated, will be necessary to complete the structure. The Grady county commissioners have agreed to appropriate \$27,000 to the extra amount. This sum will be matched by Canadian county and the federal government will give \$54,000—as much as will be appropriated by the two counties.

Fifteen thousand of the additional appropriation will be paid this year and the remainder, \$12,000, must be paid during the next fiscal year. Chairman Hybarger said this morning. Under original plans, Grady county was asked to give \$73,000 to finance the construction. This amount was appropriated several months ago.

Just when the Minco-Union City bridge will be completed is not known. The contract gives the company 365 "working days" in which to finish the job.

That more than one year will be required to complete the bridge is the belief of County Commissioner McElroy.

MOTHER DIES OF GRIEF OVER DEATH OF DAUGHTER

PALMER WOULD CRUSH K. K. K.

By United Press. Austin, July 20.—Governor Pat M. Neff was requested by Representative Wright Palmer, to submit for the consideration of the legislature the matter of suppression of such organization as the Ku Klux Klan.

Palmer is in favor of first, an investigation of the Klan, and if the findings show that it is an extra-legal and lawless body of men, he is in favor of stringent laws that will suppress the organization.

Lee Roundtree has prepared a resolution which, if adopted, would have a committee find out if there is a K. K. K., and if there is to determine what it is doing. This resolution does not look forward to any particular anti-Klan legislation.

BIG LINER NEW COMMERCIAL LINK

Munson Line Names Passenger-Cargo Ship American Legion. Maiden Voyage to South American Ports.

New York, July 20.—When the new passenger-cargo liner S. S. American Legion sails from New York on July 27, on its maiden voyage to South American ports, a new link will have been inserted in the commerce chain between the two Americas, for the inauguration of high-class passenger service between the United States and South America is looked upon as a great boon in the promotion of trade between the two continents.

Plans are now being developed for a reception at each of the South American ports for members of the American Legion. The Legionnaires have posts in all of the stopping points on the ship's schedule. The veterans will be taken aboard and entertained as guests of the New York Shipbuilding Corporation, builders of the vessel, and the Munson Line company, operators of the ship.

Following the recent trial trip of the speedy new craft, when a delegation of American Legion officials headed by John C. Emery, national commander, were aboard, Frank C. Munson, president of the Munson Steamship line, said that the S. S. American Legion would reduce the running time between New York and South America several days.

As a passenger carrying vessel, the 'American Legion' has accommodations that will equal any liner on the Atlantic Ocean and its facilities for cargo handling are far ahead of the old type boats, according to Mr. Munson.

CEMENT COMPANY IS A MONOPOLY MARRICOT SAYS

That Portland Cement Company of Ada is Monopoly and Conspiracy in Restraint of Trade Charge

PETITION FILED WITH CORPORATION COMMISS.

Hearing of Company to Come up August 2. Show Cause Why They Should Not Be Classified Public Utility.

Oklahoma City, July 20.—A petition charging the Portland Cement company of Ada with being a monopoly and operating under a conspiracy in restraint of trade, was filed before the corporation commission today by R. C. Marriott, contractor and secretary of the Builders association here.

The hearing at which company will be asked to show cause why it should not be classed as a public utility was set for August 2nd.

"Before the third game, I went to Abe Attell," said Burns. "I ask him for the \$20,000 he agreed to pay for the first game. He said \$10,000 was enough and that no more could be paid by Arnold Rothstein, New York gambler, as he had \$300,000 in the bets.

Attell took me to a room where there were several gamblers. He lifted the mattress and I took the \$10,000 which was underneath.

IF PEACE FAILS IRISH CAMPAIGN SURE TO FOLLOW

High Officials Say If Present Peace Proposals Unsuccessful, Military Action is Certain

London, July 20.—With Irish peace hovering in the balance today, it was learned authoritatively that a failure of the conference will be followed by an unparalleled campaign on military repressions in Ireland.

If the present effort toward peace is unsuccessful every power of the British government will be exerted to utterly crush out the Sinn Fein. High officials informed the United Press that plans had been prepared which will virtually turn Ireland into a vast military prison, crushing the country economic life and putting a tag on every Irish citizen.

Smuts to See Craig. The newest interest in the negotiations is caused by the report that Premier Jan Smuts of South Africa is likely to be dispatched to Belfast this week in an effort to persuade Craig and his Ulsterite followers to recede from their position.

Premier Smuts had a closed conference with cabinet members and the Irish situation was gone over.

ALL POLICEMEN IN TULSA WILL TALK IN CASE

Defense Will Try to Clear Gustafson by Policemen's Testimony. Commissioner Adkinson Testifies.

Tulsa, July 20.—Every member of the Tulsa police force will be placed on the witness stand in behalf of John A. Gustafson, ex-police chief, who is charged with failure to perform his duty during the race riot here, defence counsel announced today.

Through their testimony the defence expects to contradict the state that the police aided and abetted rioters.

"Busiest Man in Town"

Police Commissioner J. M. Adkinson testified that Gustafson was the "busiest man I ever saw the night of May 31, directing the work of deputizing citizens and sending out automobile loads of deputies in charge of policemen to patrol the edge of the black belt, and to bring in all negroes." Adkinson said by midnight there were 100 automobiles loaded with deputies and sent to the black belt. He testified that by 2 o'clock a. m., June 1, the city hall was full of disgraced negroes and at that time they began to fill convention hall with negroes brought in.
