


Total Enrollment





Dr. Zada Komara,
Senior Lecturer in the
Lewis Honors College
and an affiliate faculty
member in the Department
of Anthropology and
the Appalachian Studies
program, is one of the

Teacher Award recipients.

"For me, teaching is first and foremost about community building, and education follows from that," Komara said. "The more community building you do, the more real you are with people, the more connection you try to make — the easier it is for everyone to teach and learn transformatively. I really believe in that, and I feel absolutely privileged to teach in Lewis Honors a place where people are there to do the good thing."

Komara's research focus is archaeology of the recent past in Central and Southern Appalachia, oral history, public history, and general material culture studies. Her work focuses on early 20th-century company coal towns and explores the entanglement

of material culture (the everyday goods that populate our lives) with persistent stereotypes and narratives about the Appalachian region. She also administers the UK Appalachian Center's Coal Camp Documentary Project, a collaborative documentation effort focusing on company coal towns in Kentucky's 54 Appalachian counties.

Komara teaches courses such as Ritual, Myth and Magic; Pseudoscience & Society; Modern Material Culture and the Archaeology of Us; Race and Gender in the Material World; and Encountering Appalachia: Film, Photography & Material Culture.

Jack Goebel '25, a physics major, nominated Komara for the award. "Dr. Z is a great example of exactly what the Lewis Honors College offers," he said. "She puts an amazing amount of effort into her pedagogy and how she's actually teaching her students. I have described it before as sort of a scavenger hunt of learning — she puts all these breadcrumbs out for you,



and you go along the path thinking that you discovered it yourself, but she actually was the one laying it out for you. She's an amazing professor."

Komara says bringing her "authentic self" to class helps in making connections with students and enhancing their learning experience.

"I always liked in the 'Anne of Green Gables' movie, where she said, 'if you're going to present publicly, you make them laugh or you make them cry,' and I always thought, 'why not do both?'" she said. "Present things with so much gravitas that people are moved emotionally. But also, make them laugh."

Student Spotlights

PRINCESS MAGOR AGBOZO

Princess Magor Agbozo '24, a firstgeneration, international student from Ghana, graduated with a public health major and will pursue a Master of Public Health at the Harvard T. H. Chan School of Public Health.

Agbozo found community and mentorship in the Lewis Honors College. Her overall time in the college was "enriching" and the Rising Leaders program was "truly one of the best programs that I was in here at the university."

"I was able to learn a lot about leadership," Agbozo said. "Including fighting impostor syndrome, how to present yourself, how to network, how to make sure that you are being the best that you possibly could be, especially as a leader."

During her time at UK, Agbozo worked as an intern in the Division of Epidemiology and Health Planning in the Kentucky Department of Public Health and was highly involved in undergraduate research, including the CHANGE Team in the UK College of Nursing; the Markey STRONG Scholars Program; and the SPARK Program with the Center for Health Equity Research and the Center for Clinical and Translational Science. She placed second in the UNITE Research Showcase and third in the College of Public Health Undergraduate Showcase.

Agbozo was very

involved in campus activities, including the Student Activities Board (SAB), where she served as vice president of internal affairs, director of multicultural affairs, and engaging issues chair. She was named "Director of the Year" by SAB in 2022. She served as a tutor for the Center for Academic & Tutorial Services (CATS); a peer navigator and a first-year experience ambassador in the Office for Student Success; a resident advisor; a Student Wellness Ambassador; a College of Public Health Ambassador and an International Student

She received numerous awards and honors, including the UK Women's Forum 30 Under 30 award and the Lyman T. Johnson Torchbearer Award; 2023 UK Homecoming queen; and was selected as one of four commencement speakers.

"I'm grateful that I could be a form of hope or an example to people to see that they can also achieve their dreams," Agbozo said. "And it's not just within the academic spectrum, but as a leader, as somebody who's able to have a positive impact on campus."

ASA O'NEAL

What does it take to be named a Barry Goldwater Scholar and an Astronaut Scholar in the same year? For Asa O'Neal '25, it appears an extensive resume in research and internships supported his winning both recognitions in 2024.

Not only did O'Neal serve as a Chellgren Fellow, but he also interned with Toyota Motors North America and NASA's Langley Research Center, and this summer he will intern at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

"Each of these experiences has contributed differently to my current career plans. Most notably, my work as an undergraduate researcher at UK and my internships at NASA have shown me that I want to pursue a STEM research career," O'Neal said. "I plan to pursue my Ph.D. in aerospace engineering."

As a mechanical engineering and physics major with a mathematics minor, O'Neal joined the Lewis Honors College because "it encouraged the interdisciplinary exchange of ideas and deep thought. It allowed me to explore and think about topics not related to my course of study." In addition, O'Neal found a sense of community among

Honors students during his first year.

O'Neal said, "The Honors classes I took my freshman year exposed me to ideas that I would not have otherwise thought deeply about. The topics we



discussed have allowed me to engage with current events and the social sciences more than I would have been able to otherwise."

His advice for Honors students is to "find opportunities that interest you and join them as early as possible. Join clubs, find internships, join a lab, etc. This is the only way to find out what you like and will help you plan your studies and career accordingly."

One example of an activity that O'Neal enjoys is working on the Kentucky Solar Car Team "where we design, build, and race a manned, fully solar electric vehicle."

The mission of the Center for Personal Development (CPD) is to partner with students in their exploration of purpose to cultivate self-awareness, well-being, and career readiness. Lewis Launch Orientation

Honors Experiences

Of the 30 hours of required Honors coursework, students must complete six credits of Honors experiences such as participating in Education Abroad, internships, research, or service-learning.

EDUCATION ABROAD

Between UK's Education Abroad program offerings and the affiliated Honors portfolio, students gain multi-cultural exposure, leadership, and a new frame of reference for understanding the world and their role in it. The curated Honors education abroad programs include faculty-directed and partner organization opportunities that facilitate study, research, service, or internships worldwide. Honors students participated in the inaugural Explore First program for first-generation students to travel abroad and faculty-led excursions such as "Navigating the Grand Tour" with Dr. Jane Jensen which included visits to London, Paris, Rome and more. Through the tremendous generosity of donors, the Lewis Honors College awarded \$54,000 in Education Abroad Scholarships for 2023-2024.



INTERNSHIPS

Whether here or abroad, internship experiences fulfill an Honors curricular requirement, provide career goal clarity, and build relevant work experience. Students can choose from among many internship-credit courses across campus.



RESEARCH

Faculty mentorship of undergraduate research is integral to the academic success of all Honors students. Highlights include: nine Honors students received the Commonwealth Undergraduate Research Experience Fellowships, six Honors students presented at the Kentucky Honors Roundtable, five Honors students were named Gaines Fellows, four Honors students were selected as Sustainability Summer Research Fellows, and one Honors student was named a Beckman Scholar.

SERVICE-LEARNING

HON 393 allows our student leaders (Honors College Ambassador Team, Peer Mentors, Rising Leaders, and the Lewis Liaisons) to learn about leadership, service, and higher education in ways that complement their work for the Lewis Honors College.

HON 399 is an option for an independent service-learning project with a faculty mentor.

HON 394 blends a threecredit traditional course with a strong community service component. Singletary Scholar Kotomi Yokokura '24 received the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award (UK's highest honor for humanitarian efforts) for those "who exhibit Sullivan's ideals of heart, mind and conduct as evince a spirit of love for and helpfulness to other men and women."

HONORS EDUCATION AT RESEARCH UNIVERSITIES (HERU)

As the sixth biennial host of the HERU Conference, the Lewis Honors College facilitated "Dialogue, Debate, and Discourse: Having the Hard Conversations" over two days of programming which included keynote speakers Dr. Sigal Ben-Porath and Irshad Manji; a Moral



Courage workshop; and topical sessions covering themes such as administrative leadership, admissions/ recruitment, advising, assessment, dialogue, high-impact



practices, philanthropy, and student engagement. Of the nearly 200 attendees, approximately half were first-time conference participants. The conference benefited from the generous financial support from the UK Office of the Provost.

Lewis Honors College Leadership
Conference. Scholars planned,
fundraised, and presented this
conference for over 100 UK student
leaders from across campus. With

they had learned with their attendee peers. They will also mentor the incoming Scholars when the new class takes on the task of expanding the conference.

During the sixth One Day for UK, the Lewis Honors College was proud to showcase the Kate Johnson Scholarship Fund. Alumni shared their memories of Johnson — and other special Honors staff members throughout the years — during the celebration of the 20-year anniversary of this scholarship.





KATE JOHNSON SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Faculty from the former Honors Program, led by Dr. Jim Albisetti, established this scholarship in 2004 to honor the retirement of advisor Kate Johnson. In an outpouring of recognition for her impact on the lives of our students, the fund has now been supported by gifts from over 1,200 individuals, foundations, and corporate entities to date. It is to be used exclusively for "student skills development outside the normal curriculum, including non-UK summer programs, educational or conference travel, or research projects."

During April's One Day for UK, an additional \$18,400 was raised to make these opportunities possible. Featured below are three of the scholarship's 2023 recipients:

Helena Arjona '25 is a Lexington native. As a triple major in Media Arts & Studies; Writing, Rhetoric, & Digital Studies; and Broadcast Journalism & Multimedia, she also moonlights as a radio show host on WRFL 88.1 and works as a junior staff member at KRNL. Earlier this year, Arjona was selected as a prestigious Google News Initiative Fellow and invited to attend the Gracie Leadership Awards in New York City. "I am excited to not only represent the University and my colleges, but also the Lewis Honors College. As a woman of color in journalism, every opportunity counts and I am excited to share my gift and point of view to better my communities in the future."





Megan Mendez '26 is a Political Science major and Trunzo Scholar in the College of Arts & Sciences. The scholarship assisted with expenses related to her summer 2023 internship with the National Air and Space Intelligence Center at the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base. As an intern, Mendez learned to study and track foreign aerial threats and other national security concerns. The internship "was the perfect environment to shape me professionally, to hone and sharpen my analytical and organizational skills, and to prepare me for a life of public service and leadership in my field."

Faith Sammons '26 is a Singletary Scholar from Gurnee, Illinois. She is a triple major in Digital Media Design, Vocal Performance, and Spanish, with a minor in Theater. Following a study abroad in Florence, Sammons was offered a position in the highly-selective TuttoToscana program at the James Beard Foundation. "I hope to eventually merge my passion for disability advocacy and culinary arts. My dream is to create adaptable culinary resources. I want to teach adaptable culinary courses because I believe that it is crucial to promote independence and can simultaneously allow

people to utilize food as medicine."
