Dear fellow Kentuckians:

The Kentucky Homeplace program has continued serving the uninsured, underinsured and underserved citizens of Kentucky. Family health care advisors have encouraged preventive care services and participated in community service projects and local events in addition to their regular assignment – assisting clients with their needs.

Here's a summary of services for this quarter, Jan. 1, 2007 – March 31, 2007: The number of unduplicated clients served was 6,510; the amount of medications accessed were \$6,609,152; other services values accessed totaled \$508,353; and number of services was 118,163. The top client problems included high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, heart disease, and mental disease.

Preventive care remains a top priority of our program. Homeplace will continue focusing on women's health, addressing access to screening mammograms and pap smears, and providing education on prevention and early detection. We will continue to encourage healthy behavior such as smoking cessation, eating well and exercise.




Total Clients Served By Region January 1, 2007 – March 31, 2007



TOTAL CLIENTS FOR QUARTER: 6,510*



Client Services January 1, 2007 – March 31, 2007



Top Five Client Problems By Condition January 1, 2007– March 31, 2007




Client Medications Value January 1, 2007– March 31, 2007

This quarter our family health care advisors served 1,358 clients. A total of 27,770 services were provided to these clients, with \$1,692,822 worth of free medication and \$160,050 of services.

The FHCAs training for this quarter included the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation, Knights Templar, Shriner's Hospital, Kentucky AgrAbility Program and information on the Carl D. Perkins Comprehensive Rehabilitation Center. The Kentucky Homeplace annual retreat provided additional training on topics including heart disease, obesity, and smoking cessation.

FHCAs and/or the regional coordinator have attended the following meetings: Bath County Interagency; St. Claire Rural Health meetings in Elliott and Bath counties; Magoffin County Free Health Clinic; Elliott County Christian Social Services Open House; Elliott County Senior Citizens Center annual Valentine's Day event; Carter County Interagency meeting; three Carter County Community Health Days; Our Lady of Bellefonte Mammogram and Osteo Screening Day in Carter County; Boyd County Interagency Meeting; Eastern Kentucky Advocates for Wellness meetings with the Boyd County Health Department; and Our Lady of Bellefonte presentation to the Canonsburg Outreach Center.

This quarter our family health care advisors served 1,026 clients. A total of 14,388 services were provided to clients in this service area, along with other services valued at \$55,622 and \$553,830 worth of free medication.

"Park it and they will come" – that was the headline in one of our local newspapers concerning the collaboration of Kentucky Homeplace and the Western Kentucky University Health and Wellness Mobile Unit. Kentucky Homeplace hosted the unit at our offices. The unit was open to the public but Homeplace clients were especially targeted to attend the events. More than 150 people were served on the unit with 68 of those being Homeplace clients. Each person received screenings for blood pressure, blood glucose, bone density and cholesterol. All services were free and provided by students from the WKU Nursing Department.

Several of our counties have also hosted diabetes education classes for our clients. The classes were provided by the Barren River District Health Department, Kentucky Diabetes Prevention and Control Program and the Monroe County Health Department.

Various vision and health/cancer coalition meetings were also attended by staff throughout the quarter.

This quarter our family health care advisors served 1,340 clients. A total of 26,784 services were provided to these clients, with services valued at \$91,277, and \$1,487,032 worth of free medication was provided in this service area.

In the Western Region during the first quarter of 2007, everyone enthusiastically worked on starting walking programs in their areas and looking for ways to help their clients and communities "get fit." Many of the FHCAs are also very involved in working with the Cooper-Clayton smoking cessation classes and encouraging their clients to kick the habit.

As a region, we attended the *Generation RX* training program held in Hopkinsville. The *Generation RX* program has been developed to help educate our youth and parents on the dangers of prescription drug abuse. This program contains an interactive component that allows the users to see what could happen when they make the wrong choices where drugs and peer pressure are concerned.

The region had representatives from the American Cancer Society attend a staff meeting to explain the programs that they offer and how they can be of assistance to our clients with cancer. The speakers stressed that American Cancer Society is concerned with treating the person as a whole, not just the illness.

This quarter our family health care advisors served 1,289 clients. A total of 23,605 services were provided to these clients, with service values of \$120,502. Nearly \$800,000 worth of free medication was provided in this service area.

The Southeast Region educational trainings this quarter included speakers from Vocational Rehabilitation, access to diabetic supplies with Elesha Combs, and the social workers from the Hazard ARH Hospital. The Southeastern region attended a Get Fit Kentucky meeting at Perry County Central High School with Gov. Ernie Fletcher as keynote speaker.

This quarter our family health care advisors served 1,328 clients. A total of 19,175 services were provided to these clients, with service values of \$58,667. More than \$2 million worth of free medication was provided in this service area.

The Southern Region attended three Get Healthy Kentucky meetings at which Gov. Ernie Fletcher and his staff traveled across the state promoting a healthier Kentucky. These meetings have been exciting and have provided us the opportunity for recognition with our walking programs.

Nancy Brock and Helen Collett, along with staff from the Center for Excellence in Rural Health, attended the Tri-state Career/College Expo held at Pineville High School. Our region has also attended interagency meetings and held several community health days this quarter.

CLIENT ENCOUNTERS Actual situations encountered by our family health care advisors this past quarter

A 64-year-old female called for assistance with glasses. I scheduled a home visit with her and during the visit, I found that her home was very cold. Her apartment was a concrete block garage and her only source of heat was a wall heater. The apartment was neat and clean but she did not have much in the way of belongings. Her only source of income was Social Security, but since she had not worked her payments were very low. I inquired about her medications and she was getting assistance through a local clinic but was have trouble with transportation to get to the doctor. After the interview, I made her an appointment for an eye exam and new glasses. I was able to locate a portable heater and went to a food pantry to get a supply of food. Since transportation was a problem for her to get to the doctor, I checked into the area transit system and found I could get her discount tickets. I was able to purchase a supply of tickets with the help of a donation so she could travel to get her glasses and keep her medical appointments.

I was referred to a 70-year-old male by one of his friends. I did a home visit and found that he was very hard of hearing. He asked if I could help with hearing aids. I did an assessment and explained the Starkey Foundation to him. He said he would like to apply. I got an application, and during another visit I filled out the application and explained what he had to send with it. I made him an appointment and gave him directions to a local agency that participates with the Starkey Foundation. I recently called to do a follow-up with him and he had received his hearing aids. He thanked me and said the hearing aids were working well.

One of my clients finally got her hearing aid this quarter through the Hear Now Program. She was living in government housing and had just a small income. Her friend took her for a hearing exam and she was accepted into the program and received her hearing aids, with a total savings of \$ 4,490. She said that when she went to church now she could hear all the singing and the sermon and was so thankful that I could help her.

I had a 47-year-old female client who lived alone. She gets a \$625 disability check but when she contacted me, she was out of money, had no heat and was out of all her medications. I did a home visit and was able to get her three of her medications, heating assistance, and also made her an appointment for a Pap smear and a mammogram.

I recently went on a home visit with a lady who needed help with glasses and dental work. She is fairly young, raising two grandchildren by herself and has breast cancer. She lives in a low-income apartment complex. The cancer treatments apparently had affected her eyesight, and she did not have the money to buy glasses. She hadn't been to a dentist in a very long time either. I helped her with her glasses and got her a dental appointment. She also mentioned that she was trying to apply for a Habitat for Humanity house, but did not understand the application and feared she would never get it complete. So, after her eye and dental appointments are completed, she is going to call me and I will help her with the application process when she is ready.

I received a request for a home visit from a client who was unable to come into the office. He recently had back surgery and as a result was in severe pain. Unable to work, he is in need of medication assistance.

During a home visit, as we were completing his paperwork, I discovered that he was not participating in a Medicare D drug plan. He explained that his wife had recently passed away and he was not used to doing any paperwork and was not familiar with Medicare D. He went on to tell me that he had saved some money and had been using it to pay for his medication. Then, someone broke into his home and stole his safe. Now, with no savings to help he couldn't afford his medication for heart disease, high blood pressure and high cholesterol. I completed all the necessary paperwork to enroll him in a Medicare D plan and patient assistance medication programs.

Two years ago I received a call from a person inquiring about Kentucky Homeplace. They were interested in help with their medications. I made an appointment for this future client but they failed to show and that was the last I had heard until two months ago.

When they called, they asked if I would still help them since they never kept their appointment. After listening to their dilemma, it was quite different from the first call they made. Now, not only are they in need of medication assistance, they also are homeless and without anyone to help them at all. They had been allowed to stay at a local motel but now have to leave. I went to visit the client at the motel and got the forms signed and the applications for medicine assistance. I began to search local agencies that help with housing but there was nothing available at the time. I found a boarding house that supplied everything for their residence except their food. I was able to negotiate with the manager of the boarding house to take this person in immediately.

I also worked with a local Christian food pantry and obtained two weeks worth of food. I went back to the motel owner who had let him stay there and he helped with transporting the client to the boarding house along with their belongings. The client was able to afford the housing with the monthly income they received. They are still there and have established new friends and more networking ability by being here.

My story this quarter is about a very special client that I always considered being an angel. She was 76 years old and always had a smile on her face. Everyone that she came in contact with loved her like their own mother; she made everyone smile with her humorous ways.

She was a very neat person and always worried about her appearance. Her glasses had broken and she was using tape to keep them on. Unfortunately, she then became very sick with bladder cancer, but kept her Christian smile and attitude the whole time of her sickness. With the help of my regional coordinator, we accessed her a pair of new glasses. She and her family were very appreciative. Her last words to us were "Thank you for everything, and for my new glasses, and I love you." She died in March. She left precious memories to a lot of people and she will be greatly missed.

I am writing a story this quarter on someone who has been my client for almost three years. When she became my client she only needed help with medication for her cholesterol and thyroid.

In the summer of 2004, she found out that she had leukemia. I worked along with her cancer doctor to apply for her medication for her treatment. She was allergic to almost everything they tried. I referred her to the American Cancer Society and the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society for help. This woman, whom I now call a friend, had no insurance or prescription coverage. She had been on SSI before she married, but her husband's income made her ineligible for continued coverage. She was then left with nothing to cover her medical expense.

I did a home visit to her one day and found her in her bed with sores covering her body. My heart went out to her. This was an allergic reaction to a new treatment they were trying. She now receives a spend-down card to help with medical bills since she has so many. I still continue to help with her medication and other needs, such as diapers and referrals, when she needs something.

She has expressed her gratitude many times to our program for all the help she has received from us. She just recently gave me a copy of her autobiography and the effects that cancer has had on her life. Sometimes with our program, you meet people who you help once and they go on their way, and then you meet those who need our help for many years and many reasons. I feel that sometimes we not only become a provider for these people, we also become a friend that they can turn to in their time of need.

This quarter brought for me one of the most emotional times that I have encountered as an FHCA. I was contacted by a local family that was in an immediate housing crisis. I live in a very small community and I guess I just didn't realize there were families in such great need. This family of four, two of which were children, lived in a trailer with a small addition. The roof had fallen in and the only running water in the home was in the bathtub (later I learned they had been without hot water for more than two years). There was black mold growing everywhere, and this was in the coldest time of the year. While trying to find housing for the family, the water lines froze and burst, leaving them with no water at all in the home.

After many days of daily calls, trips to the home and talking to everyone I knew, we were able to find the family housing. The gentleman that had the house was gracious enough to assist this family with move-in costs and is allowing them to purchase the home on contract.

When the family moved in and was settled, the mother called to thank me. She was crying, because this was the first time in more than two years she had hot water coming out of her faucets.

I have since been able to help the mother get a job; the family is still struggling, but doing much better. Working with this family has been one of the most touching and rewarding things I have ever been involved with.

This quarter I saw a woman who was in need of help with obtaining her medications. She was on several medications and had no health insurance. During the assessment, I realized she was a smoker and was eager to quit. I talked with her about a new smoking cessation medication, Chantix, and enrolled her in a Cooper-Clayton class being provided for my clients.

I also found out that she has a child in the home without health insurance, with chronic health problems. She estimated that her daughter had missed 30-40 days of school during the last year due to illness. I encouraged her to apply for K-CHIP, but she stated that she had applied once but they were \$100 over the limit. They both receive benefits from the mother's deceased husband.

I knew she hadn't received a check-up in a while so I referred her to the local health department. Her child is definitely high risk, weighing 280 pounds at the age of 13. I scheduled an appointment to get her blood sugar and cholesterol checked and a flu shot. I also scheduled an appointment with an optometrist for an eye exam and glasses through the VSP program.

Overall, they were very glad to have found this program and now know there is assistance available.

I had a lady call me who had been diagnosed with sleep apnea and could not afford to purchase the C-Pap machine she needed to help with her sleeping difficulties. I spoke with some of the FHCAs in my region to see if anyone had a machine or knew where we could get one. With the help of my co-worker, I was able to get the medical equipment that my client needed. I also called one of the local medical supply stores in the area and they agreed to set the machine up and program it for my client, free of charge.

I scheduled a home visit with my client to deliver her machine and tell her the good news about the set up and programming. She was so thankful and was looking forward to the prospect of getting a night's rest.

Recently I received a referral on a gentleman requesting help with a battery-powered wheelchair. He is 60 years old, disabled and on Medicare Part A and Part D, but did not have Part B. This situation struck me as being a little unusual. Upon further investigation, I discovered after first becoming eligible for Medicare, this gentleman did have both Medicare Part A and Part B, but had dropped Part B because he felt he could not afford the premium deducted each month from his Social Security check. During that same time period, his physician had prescribed a battery-powered wheelchair for him. The client went through a durable medical equipment company and received a new battery-powered wheelchair. The durable medical equipment company had assumed the client had Medicare Part B. When they discovered he did not, he was informed he would have to either pay for the chair or it would be repossessed. The client could not afford to buy the wheelchair and it was repossessed by the company.

After enrolling the client in Homeplace and evaluating his situation, it seemed strange this client qualified for the low-income subsidy for Medicare Part D (prescription coverage), but did not have similar coverage for Medicare Part B. After making several phone calls to various agencies, it was determined this individual did qualify to have his Medicare Part B premiums covered and would not have any deductions from his Social Security checks. This client has now re-applied for Medicare Part B and when his enrollment becomes official he will qualify for a new battery-powered wheelchair. This should all take place in the next several weeks.
