The Kentucky Homeplace program has continued serving the uninsured, underinsured and underserved citizens of Kentucky. Family health care advisors have encouraged preventive care services and participated in community service projects and local events in addition to their regular assignment – assisting clients with their needs.

Here's a summary of services for this quarter, October 1, 2007 – December 31, 2007: the number of unduplicated clients served was 6,313; the amount of medications accessed were \$6,536,728; other services values accessed totaled \$608,577; and number of services was 117,009. The top client medical conditions included hypertension, high cholesterol, heart disease, diabetes, and mental health.

Our front page photograph this month is dedicated to our new Family Health Care Advisors (FHCAs). They have been trained to become a vital member of their communities; to network with local agencies; to educate their clients about health issues; and, to assist the Commonwealth's citizens with access to medical, social and environmental concerns. Our FHCAs also have something that can't be taught – they have heart. They care for their clients and will do everything in their power to assist those who can't help themselves. I am proud to present our newest-trained FHCAs to Kentucky.

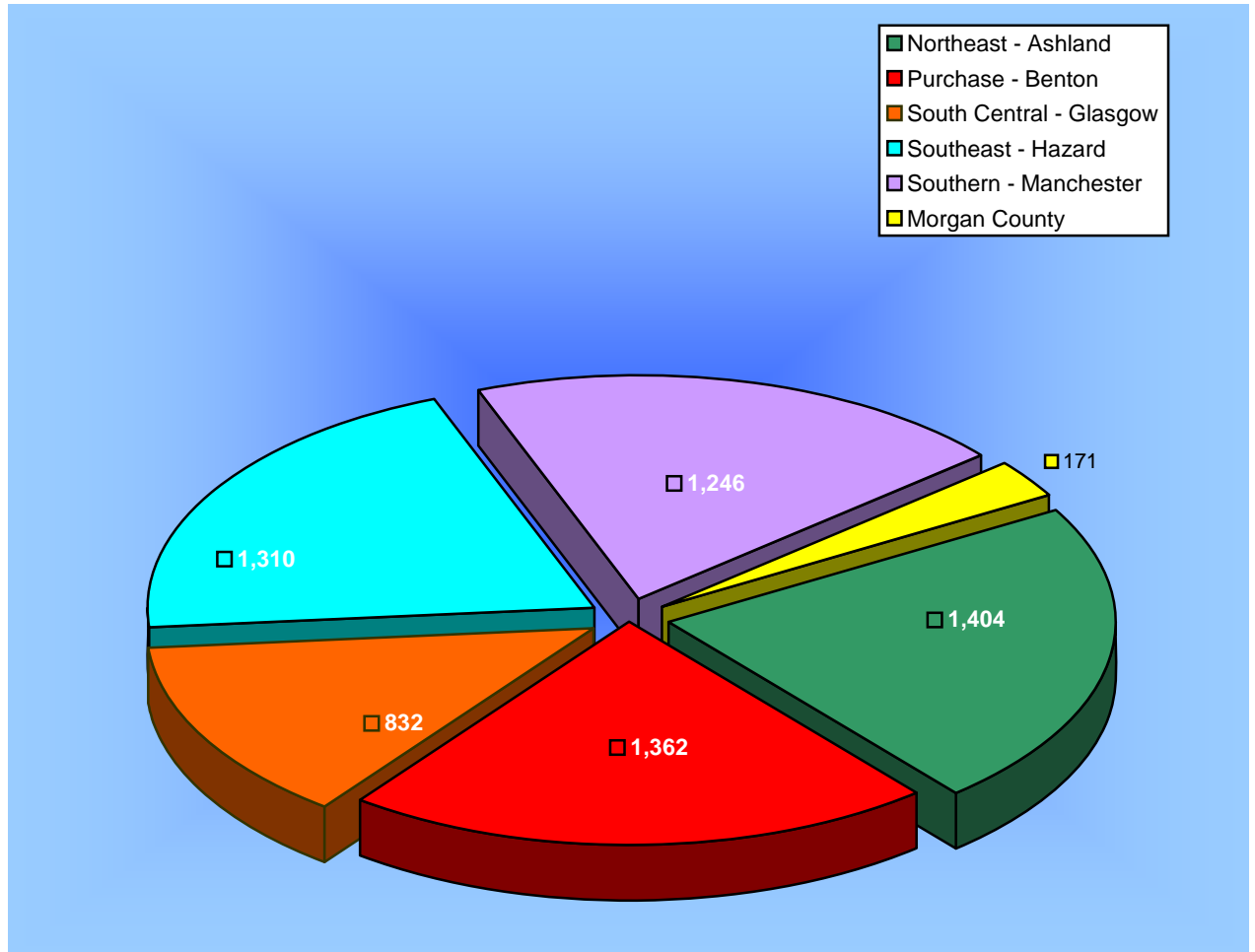

## Total Clients Served By Region October 1, 2007 – December 31, 2007



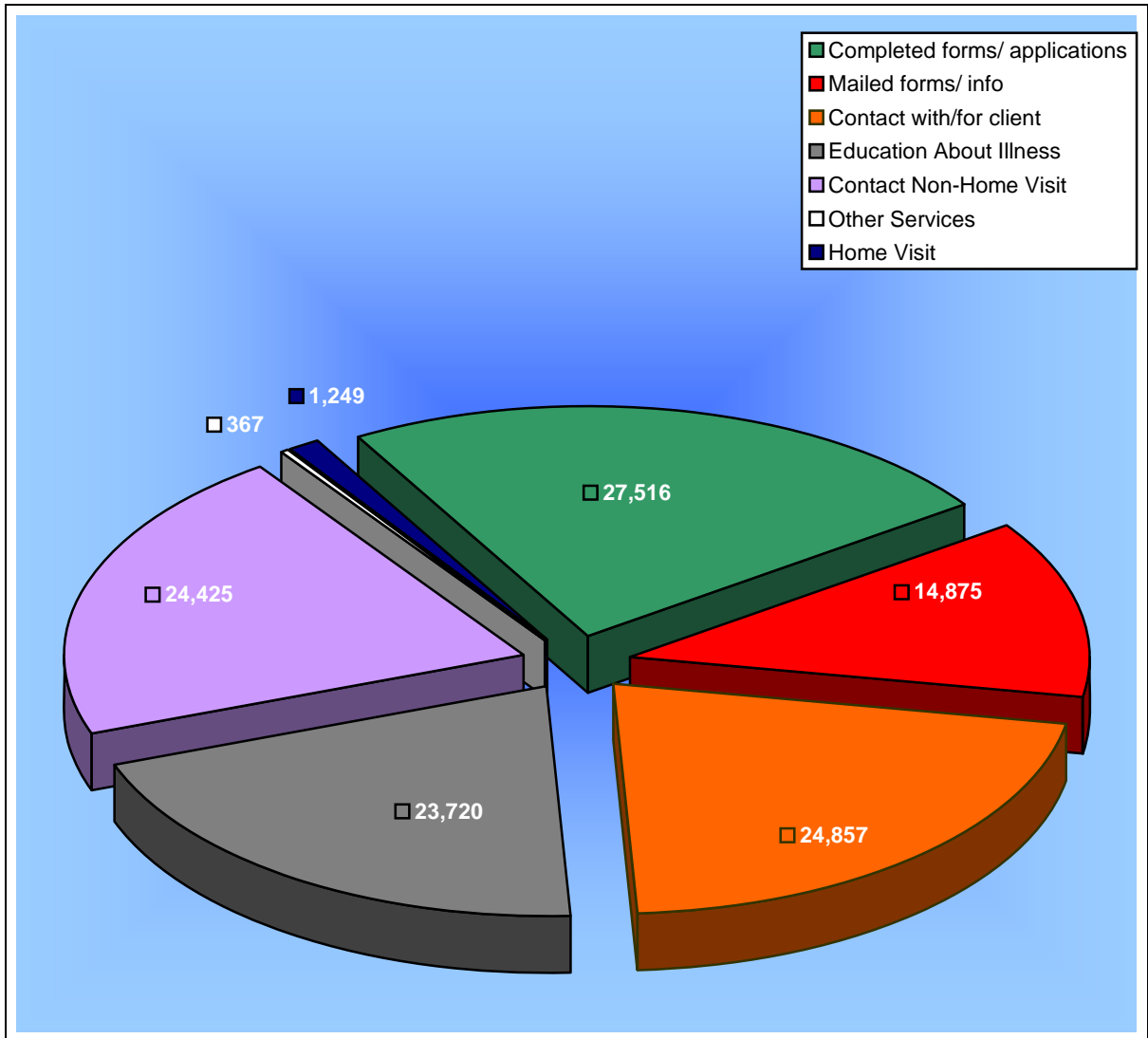

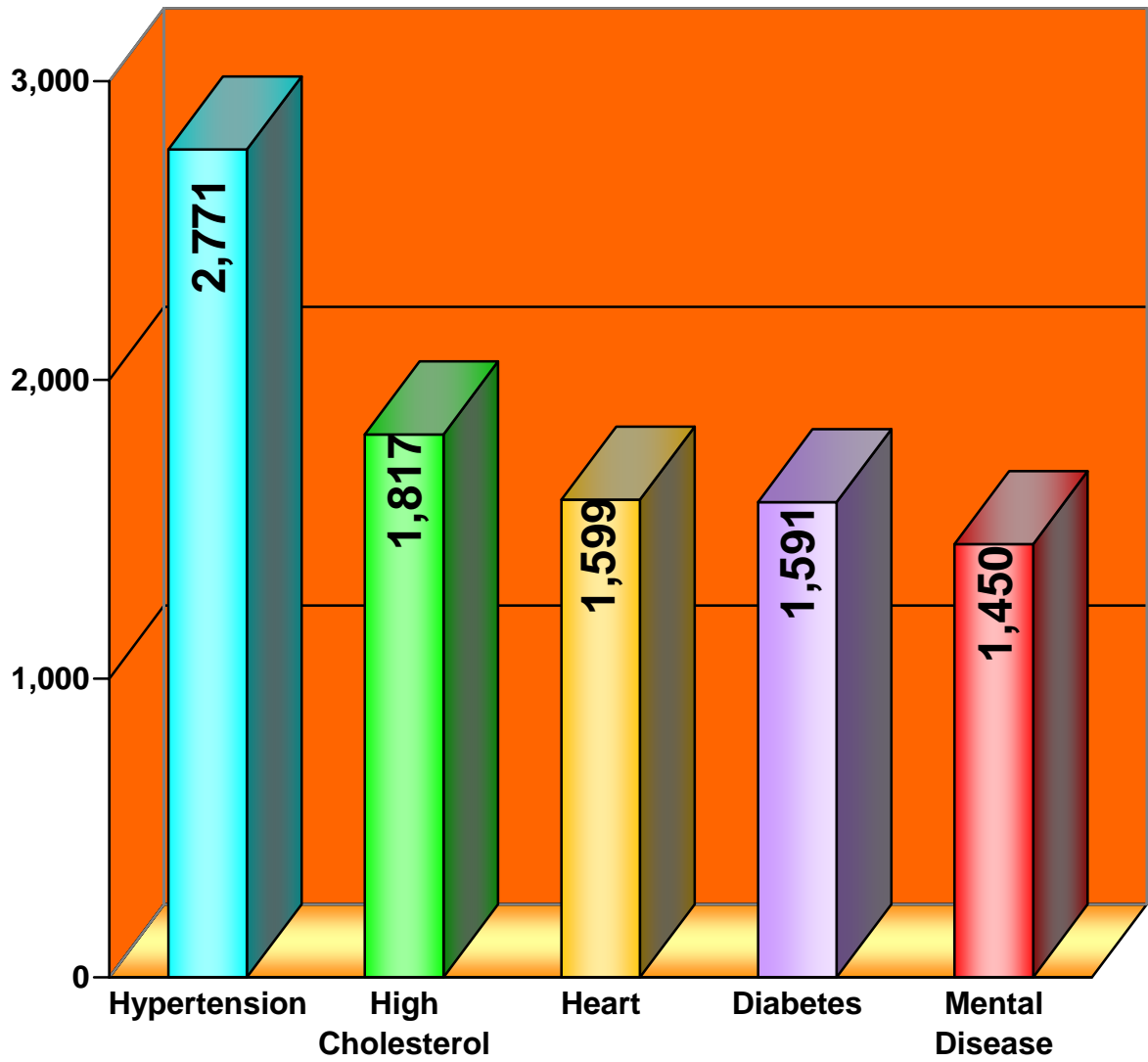

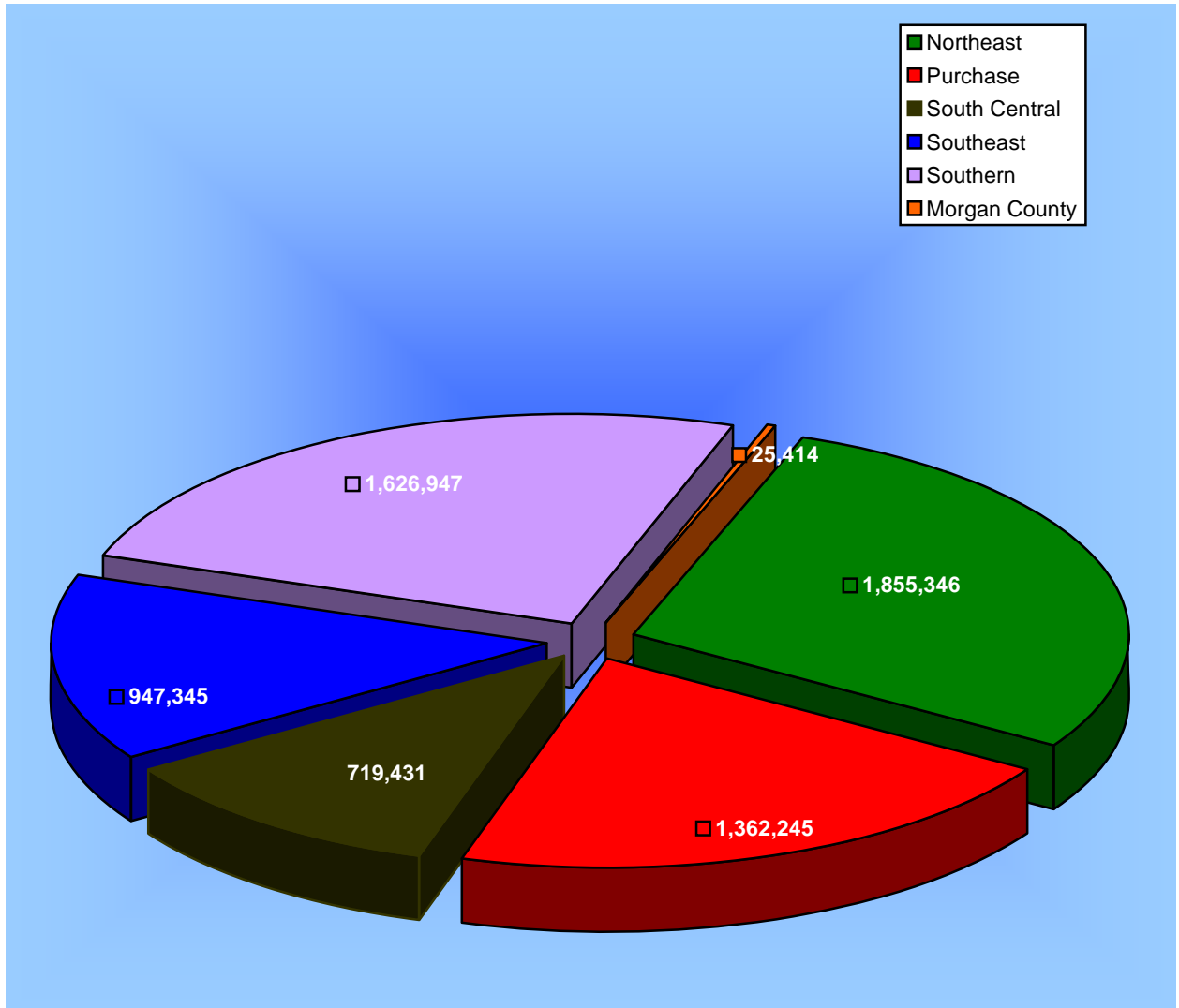

## Top Five Client Problems By Condition October 1, 2007 – December 31, 2007



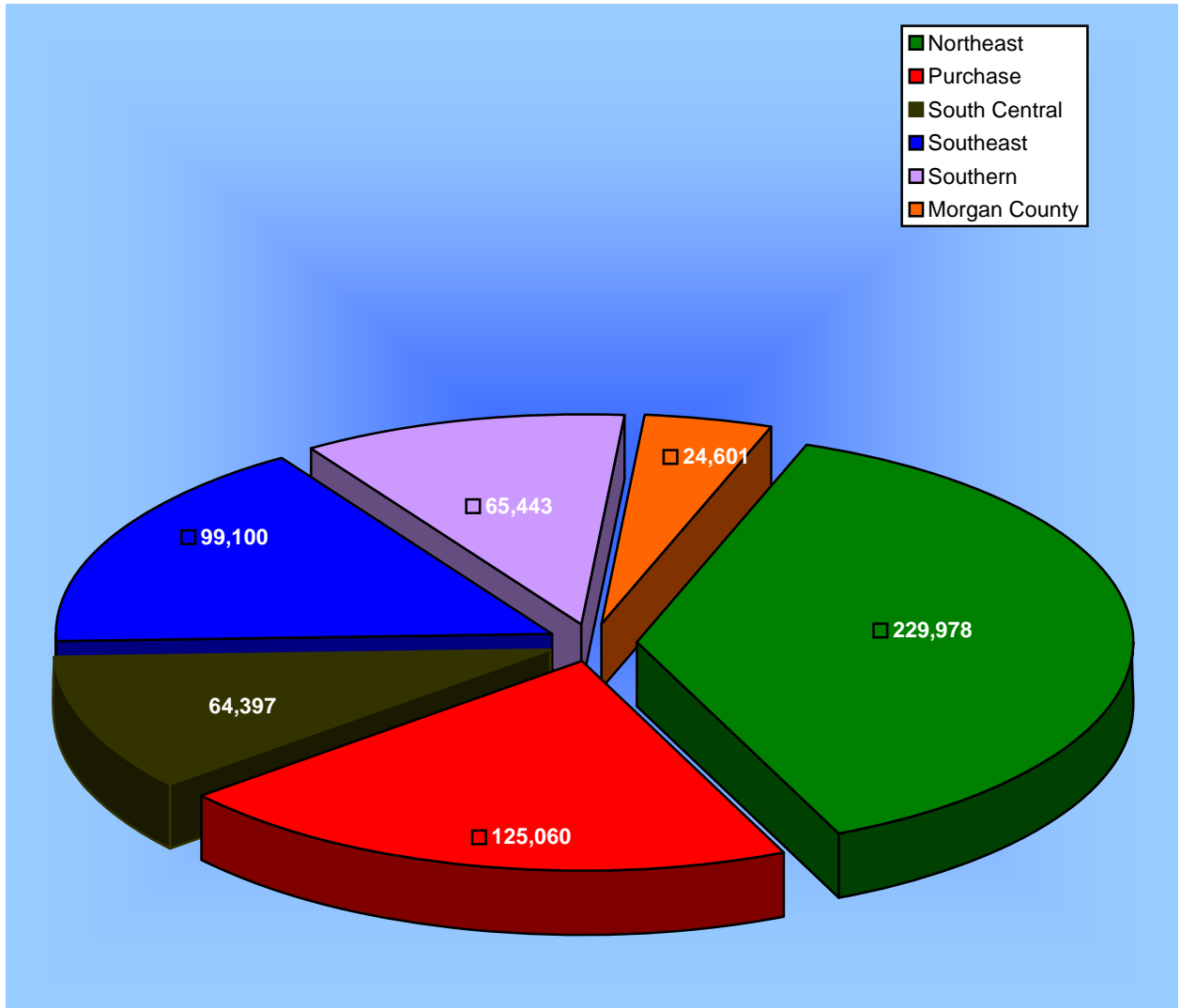
# Client Medications Value October 1, 2007 – December 31, 2007

This quarter our Family Health Care Advisors served 832 clients. A total of 13,932 services were provided to these clients for a value of \$64,397 and \$947,345 of free medication was provided in this service area.

This quarter the Morgan County Initiative FHCAs served 171 clients. A total of 2,749 services were provided to these clients for a value of \$24,601 and \$25,414 of free medication was provided in this service area.

**CLIENT ENCOUNTERS**  
**Actual situations encountered by our**  
**family health care advisors this past quarter**

I had a client who had been injured while on the job. She had received disability from her workplace, but had no insurance. She had been trying to get approved for her Social Security Disability for a long time, but had been unsuccessful.

I came into my office one morning and checked the messages on my machine and this is the message she left: “Hey, I wanted to talk to you. I have the most wonderful news you have ever heard, you won’t have to fool with me anymore. I got approved for my disability and since it has been so long, my Medicare went right into effect. So I now have Medicare D. A week ago I started getting my medicine through there. Now you won’t have to go through all those ump teen 11 medicines for me. But I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart for all you’ve done for me. You will always hold a special place in my heart for all you have done. I’ll always be grateful to you.”

This was a very touching message for me and one that I also was happy to hear. I wrote her a letter and told her that it was people like her that made my job worthwhile. I told her that if there was ever anything that we could do to call us. I will truly miss this person. Most of my clients are not just my clients; they are individuals for whom I care for.

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Kentucky Homeplace is so important to the people of my community. I was able to see one young woman’s life changed for the better, after receiving the services we provide. This client worked a part-time job and did not have any insurance. She needed dental work badly but did not have enough money to get the work done.

The first thing I did was to call and get her an appointment with the health department for the free clinic day. After seeing the doctor, I was able to help access the medications she needed from various pharmaceutical companies. The client was then referred to a dentist to have all her teeth pulled and received new false teeth.

When the client had recuperated, she felt so much better about herself that she went on to find a better job and will be attending classes to become a Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) and eventually will work at the local nursing home. She stops by all the time to let me know how she is doing and always reminds me that if it were not for our program that she would have never been able to do what she has done.

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A client came by the office to sign off on a pharmaceutical form. As he was leaving, he turned around and said a friend had been airlifted again to a hospital. He said his friend has had two heart attacks and this was the second airlift; and, if he doesn’t get two stents put in his heart he will die.

I asked why he didn't have it done when he was at the hospital, especially since this the second time and he said he was told both times that the hospital would not do it without insurance or \$10,000 cash payment.

I called the friend to see how he was doing and told him about our program and that I would start working on how to help him get this surgery.

At an Interagency meeting, I introduced myself to several people including Pastoral Service Workers from a local hospital and asked her what could we do to help this man? I explained the situation and that he had no transportation to even get to a doctor. She said afterwards she would also start working on it and let me know something. That afternoon She called and said that he should qualify for 100% coverage of stent replacements.

I had him get in touch with the worker and she mailed him the paper work. Finally, he was told that he is 100% eligible and the entire bill in the amount of \$10,000 will be paid. And, the hospital will provide transportation for this procedure. Now, Community Based Services is now reconsidering him for a medical card.

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An elderly male came by my office after being referred by a friend to see if they could get help with surgery. The client had a large bulging growth above his eye and another on his back.

After signing the client into Kentucky Homeplace and accessing his needs, I explained the options the client had to receive care. The client didn't have a primary care physician or medical insurance and had not seen a doctor in years.

I contacted a local free healthcare clinic and helped him with arranging an appointment for treatment. During the appointment, the doctor told him that it looked like the two cysts needed to be surgically removed. The doctor wrote a referral to the local surgeon in this area.

The client returned to my office and I met with the surgeon's office financial manager for him and negotiated how much the client could pay to have the surgery performed. The client was also able to be enrolled into the hospital's patient assistance program, which took care of all the testing and pre-op costs, along with the total coverage of the client's surgery in an out-patient setting. The surgeon agreed to perform the surgery for a reduced fee. The client is now able to work and is self-employed. The result of the surgery was a benign growth with no cancer cells on both cysts. This was a great relief to the client and he is forever grateful to Kentucky Home Place for their assistance concerning his need.

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I have a client I have been working with that originally came in for help with medications. While talking with the client, I discovered he has sleep apnea and is supposed to be on a Continuous Positive Airway Pressure (CPAP) machine at night. He has no insurance and cannot afford it the machine. I found a website that offers help for people in this gentleman's situation. I have completed the applications to enroll him in this program for assistance with the CPAP.

I had a client come in after being referred by her doctor for help with medications. I completed applications for her medications and learned that the doctor had told her that she needed to start her high blood pressure medication immediately. He had told her that she was in danger of having a stroke if she didn't take immediate precautions which included the medication.

I contacted the local mission and got them to provide a donation to get her prescription so she could have her medication until she receives the shipment from the pharmaceutical company.

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This story is about a sixty-three-year-old widow I recently enrolled into our program. She had a variety of medical and social issues that needed to be addressed. She was receiving her late husband's Social Security and had a list of medication she was trying to buy with limited resources. Her list consisted of twenty-seven prescription and non-prescription medications. She was also seeing two primary care physicians for her various conditions instead of one.

After enrolling her into our program, and evaluating her situation, I found that many of the medicines she was taking were duplicates. She didn't realize some of the generic and brand name drugs were actually the same medication. After sorting through the medicines and eliminating duplication, I convinced her to see only one family doctor and to get her prescriptions filled at one pharmacy. I discussed the situation with her physician and pharmacy and explained to them which medications we could get through various patient assistance programs. Because this client has various health issues (diabetes, allergies, digestive, heart, cholesterol, hypertension and skin problems), she is required to take around thirteen medications, but now there are no duplicates and over half are available through patient assistance programs from various pharmaceutical companies.

I told the client about several programs that she was unaware of and helped her with the paperwork. She has now applied for Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Disability Supplemental Security Income (DSSI) and a Spend-down card to assist with additional income and medical coverage. The client has also applied for heating assistance and with the county food bank for help. I continue to monitor her situation closely.
