CRAIG SKINNER

HEAD COACH • 19TH SEASON



Since being tabbed Kentucky's head coach in December 2004, Craig Skinner has rejuvenated the Kentucky volleyball program into national prominence and is the program's all-time winningest head coach. He will enter his 19th season in 2023 with an all-time record of 423-139.

He reached the pinnacle of the sport in April of 2021, winning the 2020 NCAA National Championship at the CHI Health Center in Omaha, Nebraska. In doing so, he became the head coach of the first volleyball team in Southeastern Conference history to win a national championship. He was named the AVCA's National Coach of the Year in 2020-21.

Skinner has directed the Wildcats to 18 consecutive NCAA Tournaments – a feat only nine other schools in the nation have achieved. That run includes eight Sweet Sixteen appearances since 2009, two Elite Eight appearances, the 2020 NCAA Final Four and back-to-back-to-back-to-back SEC titles in 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020-21, 2021 and 2022.

Furthermore, the Wildcats have captured 17 or more victories in all 18 seasons under Skinner's direction, including tallying 20 or more wins in 14 of the last 16 seasons. Kentucky's historical run to a national title in 2020-21 was one to remember. UK went 24-1 on the season in an all-conference regular season, winning the SEC for the fourth year in a row. UK then swept through the bubbled NCAA Tournament, winning games against UNLV, Western Kentucky, Purdue, Washington and Texas along the way to the NCAA National Championship. Skinner helped guide Madison Lilley to the 2021 AVCA Player of the Year Award, 2020-21 Honda Award for Volleyball and was one of three players to be named AVCA First Team All-America.

In 2014, a 3-0 victory over Georgia Southern gave Skinner his 211th win as the head coach of the Wildcats to become the school's all-time leader in career wins.

Skinner became the fastest coach in school history to total 100 career victories in just his fifth season, and is the only coach in program history to advance to postseason play in each season at the helm. In 2012, Skinner notched his 100th career Southeastern Conference victory.

During his tenure, the Wildcats have amassed 24 All-America first, second or third team distinctions, while UK has hauled in 66 All-Southeastern Conference honors in his 17 seasons – including the 2008, 2018, 2019, 2020-21 and 2021 SEC Player of the Year, 2006, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2021 SEC Freshman of the Year, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020-21 and 2021 SEC Libero of the Year and the 2005 SEC Defensive Player of the Year.

The Wildcats have enjoyed unprecedented success which has included a school-record run of 86 consecutive weeks ranked in the top 25 of the American Volleyball Coaches Association poll, record-breaking attendance marks and a nine-time host of NCAA Tournament play including serving as one of four host sites for the 2017, 2015, 2013 and 2011 NCAA Regionals.

Skinner and the Cats reached the pinnacle of success in back-to-back SEC Championship winning seasons in 2017 and 2018. The Wildcats claimed the 2017 title and Skinner was tabbed the co-SEC Coach of the Year and led the Wildcats to the Elite Eight for the first time in modern program history. UK earned a top-four seed for the time ever after winning a share of the SEC title with an impressive 17-1 record. Two Wildcats – Leah Edmond and Madison Lilley – were named to an All-America team while Edmond earned first team. Madison Lilley won SEC Freshman of the Year, and Kentucky continued its dominance in the SEC Libero of the Year category as Ashley Dusek won her third straight.

The 2018 season saw the Cats drop their first three matches of the season before putting together a Skinner-record 23-match winning streak, including a perfect 18-0 run through the SEC for another title. Kentucky advanced to the NCAA Regional Semifinals and Edmond and Lilley repeated as All-Americans. Skinner was tabbed the SEC Coach of the Year, while Edmond was named the league's Player of the Year. Gabby Curry took home SEC Libero of the Year accolades and Alli Stumler was the league's Freshman of the Year.

The magical run continued through to 2019 when the Wildcats went 16-2 in SEC play to earn their third-straight SEC title. Included in the SEC run was a home-and-away sweep of Florida and wins over Georgia, South Carolina, Tennessee and Mizzou on the road. Leah Edmond was named the SEC's Player of the Year, a First-Team AVCA All-American and the AVCA Region Player of the Year, as well.

Prior to Skinner's arrival, the Kentucky volleyball program had not experienced a winning season in the previous five years and had not made an NCAA Tournament appearance since the 1993 season.

In just one season in the Bluegrass, Skinner led the Wildcats to a 17-12 record and their first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since 1993. For the team's accomplishments and quick turnaround, Skinner was named the 2005 SEC Coach of the Year.

In 2006, Kentucky posted a 19-12 record – its most wins since the 1993 campaign – and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament after toppling No. 20 Ohio in the opening round. The Wildcats took perennial power

Florida to five sets for the first time since 1988 and knocked off No. 18 Tennessee in Lexington. The win over the Lady Vols was significant as it marked the first time UK knocked off a ranked foe in 66 attempts dating back to Sept. 24, 1993.

Skinner in his third season then achieved something no other UK volleyball coach had ever done – he led his team to a third consecutive NCAA appearance after another improved season. The Wildcats went 22-10 and toppled another ranked opponent in No. 18 LSU on national television in Lexington on its way to a fourth place overall finish in the conference.

The Wildcats emerged as one of the best teams in the nation in 2008 reaching the AVCA national polls for 10 consecutive weeks, including finishing the year with a No. 22 overall ranking. Kentucky posted 26 victories, including a school-record 17 wins in the SEC. Skinner's squad finished second in the league standings, the best finish for the school since 1990. Included in that extraordinary conference run was a five-set upset victory over No. 12 Florida in front of the fifth-largest crowd ever to witness a volleyball match in Memorial Coliseum.

Additionally, the Wildcat program took another big step under Skinner's direction when Lexington was selected as a host site of the 2008 NCAA Tournament First and Second Rounds. The selection solidified Kentucky as a program no longer on the rise – but, as one of the teams others will have to contend with for years to come.

Several Kentucky players achieved impressive honors, including junior Sarah Rumely who was named the 2008 SEC Player of the Year. With the honor she became the first player in UK history to win the award voted on by league coaches. Rumely and senior Queen Nzenwa were All-America honorees and led a record-breaking five UK players on All-SEC ballots.

The 2009 season signified the Wildcats had officially arrived on the national scene. The Blue and White opened the season rated as the No. 21 team in the country and remained in the polls during every week of the season en route to a 29-5 year and the first Sweet Sixteen appearance under Skinner's direction. UK was selected to host the First and Second Rounds of the national tournament for the second consecutive year, and the Wildcats knocked off the tournament's No. 13 seed in Oregon to advance to Regionals. UK soared up the polls and reached as high as No. 7

in the national rankings during the season.

The Wildcats finished second overall in the SEC and claimed the SEC East crown for the first time in program history. For the fifth consecutive season, Skinner led the squad to more victories than the previous year. On Oct. 9, Skinner claimed his 100th career victory in Lexington with a 3-0 win over Auburn. Kentucky's fifth-year head coach reached the 100-win plateau faster than any other previous coach in the history of the program. In postseason recognition, Kentucky matched its record of five players named to the All-SEC squads with Rumely and junior Sarah Mendoza tabbed to the first-team. Senior BriAnne Sauer would team with the duo to claim a school-best three All-America distinctions. Rumely was a second-team selection, with Mendoza and Sauer named honorable mention honorees.

Although faced with a tough challenge of replacing three All-Americans from the previous season, the 2010 edition of the UK volleyball team continued its impressive streak of NCAA tournament runs. Kentucky capped its season with 17 victories for the sixth consecutive season and advanced to the NCAA Tournament yet again. Sophomore Stephanie Klefot headlined postseason accolades as she became the first player in school history to obtain SEC Libero of the Year honors, while Lauren Rapp earned All-America honorable mention honors.

The 2011 season saw the Wildcats back among the top-rated teams in the nation with UK capping a 28-6 season ranked No. 13 in the country and hosting the NCAA Regionals for the first time in program history. Led by Klefot, a second-team All-America selection, UK ventured on the road to College Station, Texas, and knocked off Dayton and the host-team Texas A&M Aggies to return to Lexington for its second appearance in the Regionals in the last three seasons. Kentucky went toe-to-toe with the tournament's No. 1 overall seed in Texas before the largest crowd in the Skinner era in Memorial Coliseum.

Klefot repeated as the SEC Libero of the Year and set a new-single season UK record with more than 600 digs. She also helped match a program-record with three All-America selections joined by junior Christine Hartmann and sophomore Whitney Billings. Billings became the youngest player

under Skinner's direction to earn All-America status. Kentucky also matched a program-record with five All-SEC selections for the third time in four seasons in addition to 17 victories in the grueling SEC. For his efforts, Skinner earned AVCA All-South Region Coach of the Year accolades for the first time in his career.

UK continued its run of success stories in 2012 as the Wildcats claimed a 22-11 overall record and advanced to its third Sweet 16 in the last four seasons. The Wildcats knocked off No. 14 Ohio State in Lexington after having been picked to host a portion of the NCAA Tournament in four of the last five seasons en route to another Regional appearance.

Led by three-time SEC Libero of the Year in Stephanie Klefot the Wildcats again had three players selected as All-Americans. Billings was a second-team selection and joined Klefot and Hartmann (honorable mention selections) as the only trio of teammates to earn consecutive All-America honors in program history. Senior Ashley Frazier was a Senior CLASS award All-America selection honoring excellence achieved both on and off the court.

For the fifth time under Skinner's direction, the Kentucky volleyball program capped the season ranked among the top 25 in the nation to end the 2013 season. UK posted a 22-9 record and an unprecedented ninth-consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament. The Wildcats finished the season ranked No. 20 and Billings became UK's first-ever three-time All-America selection. Senior Alexandra Morgan became the ninth player in Skinner's tenure to earn All-America accolades.

Memorial Coliseum played host to the opening rounds of the NCAA Tournament for the third time in Skinner's tenure and also hosted the Regional rounds. It marked the first time in program history UK hosted the NCAA Tournament in consecutive weeks.

The 2014 season was highlighted by Skinner becoming the all-time career wins leader in program history. Junior Morgan Bergren claimed second-team All-America accolades and senior Jackie Napper earned the program's fifth league award as the top defensive performer when she was tabbed the Libero of the Year. Napper was joined by classmate Lauren O'Conner as honor-

able mention All-America honorees. The trio all earned All-SEC honors and were joined by sophomore Anni Thomasson.

UK earned a 27-6 overall record, hosted the first and second rounds of the NCAA Tournament and finished the season ranked 17th in the country. The final ranking marked the 33rd consecutive poll UK was tabbed a part of – besting the program and Skinner's record of 31-consecutive polls ranked.

In 2015, Skinner guided the Wildcats to their 11th-consecutive NCAA berth following a second place finish in the SEC. Ashley Dusek continued a lineage of success at the libero position, earning SEC Libero of the Year for the first time, while marking the fifth time in six years that a Kentucky player had earned the distinction. Dusek, along with Bergren and Kaz Brown, earned both All-SEC and AVCA All-Region nods. Dusek and Bergren became the Wildcats' 26th and 27th AVCA All-America selections, while Bergren became Kentucky volleyball's first ever first-team CoSIDA Academic All-America selection.

In 2016, Skinner took the Cats to the NCAA Tournament once again, and saw four players earn awards for their play after the season. Three players were named to the AVCA All-America team. Edmond found herself on the third team, while Olivia Dailey and Dusek were honorable mention.

A native of Muncie, Indiana, Skinner spent three seasons as an assistant coach under Cook at Wisconsin, from 1994-96, aiding the Badgers to a 68-35 record and three postseason appearances, including the 1996 NCAA regional semifinals. Skinner returned to his alma mater in 1999, helping guide the Ball State men to wins over three nationally ranked teams and an 8-4 record at mid-season in 2000 before leaving for Nebraska. That team finished the season ranked 13th in the USA Today/AVCA Top 25.

Skinner is married to former Nebraska assistant women's soccer coach Megan Bechtold Skinner. The couple has two daughters, Sophie and Isabel and a son, Eli.

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH • 1ST SEASON



The Kentucky Volleyball team announced Friday that Ben Josephson has accepted a position in its coaching staff for the 2023 season. He will begin immediately in his new role of associate head coach.

Josephson joins Kentucky after a 16-year stint as the head coach of the Trinity Western men's volleyball team just outside of Vancouver, Canada. Josephson, who hails from Strathmore, Alberta, Canada has helped develop the TWU Spartans men's volleyball team into one of the most dominant men's volleyball programs in North America.

"I'm humbled and honored to have the chance to work with the University of Kentucky and the Wildcats Volleyball program," Josephson said. "After meeting Coach Skinner and the staff, it is no surprise why Kentucky Volleyball has won six-straight SEC Titles. The success is a clear reflection of the family-feel team culture and the professionalism of the complete athlete development philosophy. However, the thing that stands out the most, and what makes me most excited to get to Lexington, is the high level of character top to bottom in this program. Thank you to Craig and the administration for allowing me to join this team and I can't wait to get to campus and get started. Go Cats!"

During his time as Trinity Western's head coach, the Spartans won the national championship five times including 2011, 2012, 2016, 2017 and 2019. He also helped guide TWU to five Canada West championships with those titles taking place in 2012, 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2020. His teams have a current run of nine-straight appearances in the conference final.

To go alongside Josephson's coaching at the collegiate level with Trinity Western, he has terrific international volleyball coaching experience as he served as the head coach for the Canadian Men's National Team from 2021-2022, helping Canada to qualify for the 2022 Volleyball Nations League. He was also an assistant with the Canadian Women's team from 2019-2020. His previous national team appointments included coaching as a guest assistant with Canada's senior men's team in 2009 and as an assistant with Canada's World University Games men's teams in 2005 and 2011. Josephson was the head coach of Canada's Youth National team in 2015 and 2016. He was also the head coach for B.C.'s U21 side that finished third at the 2013 Canada Summer Games.

"We are thrilled to add a coach like Ben to our staff," UK head coach Craig Skinner said. "He has one of the best coaching minds in North America and his success as a coach speaks for itself with the results. It's who he is as a person that we are most excited about adding to Kentucky volleyball. Ben has a great passion for people and helping them get to where they want to go both on and off the court. We are lucky to have him aboard and can't wait to get him immersed in the program."

His playing resume includes being named Trinity Western's first-ever All-Canadian honor in 2003, while also being named a Canada West First-Team All Star.

He has a Bachelor of Human Kinetics Degree from Trinity Western and also earned a Certificate in Biblical Studies from Covenant Bible College in Strathmore. He and his wife, Jen, have three children, Cooper, Zeke and Gracie.

MERIDETH JEWELL

ASSISTANT COACH • SECOND SEASON



University of Kentucky Volleyball head coach Craig Skinner announced that former Wildcat and two-time Southeastern Conference champion Merideth Jewell will return to Lexington to serve as an assistant coach on his staff on Jan. 6, 2022. She will begin her first season as an assistant coach in 2022.

Jewell recently was the assistant coach at South Dakota State, where she helped the Jackrabbits to a 19-12 season in 2021 and a semifinal appearance in the Summit League

Tournament.

Prior to her stint at South Dakota State, Jewell worked at the University of Louisville where she served as a graduate manager and was then promoted to a volunteer assistant coach for the Cardinals. Jewell managed the Cards film system in her time with UofL before being promoted to a volunteer assistant, where she led Louisville to back-to-back Sweet 16 appearances, and a spot in the 2019 Elite Eight.

Jewell is a native of the Bluegrass state, having played high school volleyball at Mercy Academy. At Mercy, she was named as the 2014 Kentucky Gatorade Player of the Year, Miss Kentucky Volleyball and with her team, won the 2014 state championship and club national championship.

She spent her freshman and sophomore years at Morehead State where she was voted as the 2015 Ohio Valley Conference Freshman of the Year and voted to the All-OVC Team in her inaugural season. In 2016, Jewell earned her second-consecutive spot on the all-conference team and was top 50 in the nation in total digs for the season.

After two years at MSU, she transferred to Kentucky where she played in 55 matches for the Wildcats, including both matches to clinch SEC Championships in 2017 and 2018. She was also an All-SEC Academic honoree

MEMORIAL COLISEUM RECORDS

Playing in the friendly confines of Memorial Coliseum is a tremendous home-court advantage for the Kentucky volleyball team, which plays all of its matches in the historic facility.

The Wildcats have compiled a 490-169 record, good for a .745 winning percentage in their 40th season in the facility. In the last 18 seasons under Coach Skinner, Kentucky is an astounding 232-50 (.856) at home.

It played host to NCAA Regionals in 2011, 2013, 2015 and 2017. Memorial also currently serves as the home court for the UK women's basketball and gymnastics teams. The storied gymnasium also housed some of the greatest moments in UK men's basketball history as its home for 26 seasons from 1950 to 1976.

UK'S VOLLEYBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS

1979

In only its third year of existence, the Kentucky volleyball squad put together a 35-18-1 record and the Wildcats did not even drop a game against SEC foes to win the first SEC title in the sport of volleyball. UK, which played 44 of its 54 matches away from Memorial Coliseum, advanced to the AIAW National Championships in Carbondale, Ill., after finishing first in the Region II Tournament held in Lexington. UK Coach Delphine Nemeth was named the KWIC Coach of the Year. The title established the Wildcats, who also won the SEC Tournament with a perfect 5-0 sweep through league foes, as a volleyball power.



1980

Kentucky won an impressive 39 matches and again swept through the SEC Tournament en route to its second consecutive league crown. Kim Clay was named to the SEC All-Tournament team for the second consecutive season, joining teammate Sandy Glasscock. The Wildcats, who finished first in the AIAW Region II Tournament, notched their first win in the AIAW National Tournament that year with a 2-0 victory over Northwestern in Santa Barbara, Calif. The Cats did not drop a match to an in-state foe and were a perfect 6-0 at home, making them the team to beat in the SEC.

1983

The Kentucky volleyball team posted a school-best 44 victories as the Wildcats won their third SEC title with a perfect 5-0 league record. Lexington was the site of the SEC Tournament and the Cats defeated Ole Miss and Tennessee for their first tournament title under the single-elimination format. Karolyn Kirby was an all-SEC selection after hitting an impressive .311 on the season. Coaches Marilyn McReavy and Mary Jo Pepler were named SEC Coaches of the Year. UK was rewarded for its success in the regular season with its first NCAA Tournament berth and first-round hosting privileges. The Cats advanced past North Carolina and defeated Texas in its own regional in Austin, Texas before falling to perennial power Hawaii the following night. Kentucky finished fifth in the NCAA that season.



1987

Kentucky notched a 31-2 record, including a perfect 7-0 mark in SEC play and a 15-0 home record, to win its fourth SEC championship. After beginning the season 7-1, the Wildcats put together a 24-match win streak before falling to Texas in the NCAA Regional. The Cats breezed through the SEC Tournament in Baton Rouge, La., with sweeps of Mississippi State, Tennessee and Florida. UK coach Kathy DeBoer was named both the league's Coach of the Year and the NCAA Coach of the Year. Lisa Dausman was named the Most Valuable Player of the SEC Tournament and an All-SEC selection after hitting a stellar .336 on the year. UK swept N.C. State and Texas-Arlington in the NCAA Tournament before falling to the Longhorns on their home court to end the season.



1988

Kentucky claimed its second consecutive SEC title with a 26-7 record and a 7-0 mark in league play. Senior Lisa Bokovy was an All-SEC selection and also was named to the SEC All-Tournament team, completing her career with a then-school-best 1,657 kills, 3,739 digs, a .329 hitting percentage, 147 service aces and 1,057 blocks. She was the first Wildcat to notch more than 1,000 kills and 1,000 blocks in her career. The Cats swept through the SEC Tournament in Pensacola, Fla., with wins over LSU and Tennessee. After winning a 3-2 thriller at home in the first round of the NCAA Tournament against New Mexico, UK fell to Texas-Arlington in the NCAA Regionals in Austin, Texas.



2017

Kentucky took home a share of the SEC title after a 29-4 season and a 17-1 mark in league play. UK split the title with Florida, who both handed each other their only SEC loss of the season. Five Wildcats - Kaz Brown, Ashley Dusek, Leah Edmond, Emily Franklin and Avery Skinner were All-SEC. Lilley took home SEC Freshman of the Year and Dusek won her third-straight SEC Libero of the Year. Head Coach Craig Skinner garnered Co-Coach of the Year. The Wildcats went on to earn the program's first top-four seed in the NCAA Tournament, and made it all the way to the Elite Eight for the first time in the modern era. UK beat ETSU, WKU and BYU before falling to eventual national champion Nebraska at home.

2018

Kentucky won its first back-to-back SEC Championships since 1987-88 behind an undefeated 18-0 season in league play. The Wildcats finished the 2018 campaign with a 26-5 overall record. The season was spearheaded by a 23-match winning streak which ranked as the second-longest in program history. The Wildcats swept the league awards with Leah Edmond winning Player of the Year, Gabby Curry the Libero of the Year honor and Alli Stumler as the Freshman of the Year. Coach Craig Skinner earned SEC Coach of the Year honors. Two more Cats earned All-SEC honors in Brooke Morgan and Madison Lilley. UK advanced to the NCAA Regional Semifinal for the fifth time in Skinner's tenure.



UK'S VOLLEYBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS

2019

The Kentucky Volleyball team won its third-straight Southeastern Conference championship, sweeping the Ole Miss Rebels, 3-0 (25-21, 25-20, 25-13) inside of a packed Memorial Coliseum. The SEC title is the program's seventh overall and third in the last three years.



2020-21

Kentucky became the first school in the history of the Southeastern Conference to win a national championship in volleyball, defeating Texas 3-1 (20-25, 25-18, 25-23, 25-22) in four sets at the CHI Health Center in Omaha. Junior Alli Stumler had a match-high 26 kills on Saturday, hitting .471 on 51 swings against one of the best blocking teams in the nation, showing her AVCA All-America First Team prowess. Stumler also had five digs, and closed out the NCAA National Championship match with a kill from the left side. Madison Lilley had 53 assists in the match and the AVCA Player of the Year guided UK to a .349 hitting percentage Saturday, as she also logged a career-high and team-high 19 digs in the process. Lilley's stuff block in the fourth set put Kentucky up 21-19 and UK saw the match out from there.



2021

The No. 8 Kentucky Volleyball team captured its fifth-straight Southeastern Conference championship, sweeping No. 20 Florida 3-0 (25-22, 25-22, 25-20) behind 18 kills from senior outside hitter Alli Stumler. Stumler had 18 kills on the day, hitting .333 on 39 swings. Stumler, along with fellow seniors Lauren Tharp and Cameron Scheitzach, were honored pre-match during Senior Day festivities. Stumler also added in six digs for the match and a block assist, as she helped put a cap on the Kentucky win. With Friday's win, Kentucky clinches the SEC Championship for a fifth-straight season, and the SEC's automatic qualifying spot for the 2021 NCAA Volleyball Championship by virtue of its head-to-head win over Mississippi State in October. With an MSU win and a UK loss Saturday, the SEC title would be split, but UK will still be recognized as the champions due to the head-to-head tiebreaker.



2022

The Kentucky Volleyball team swept South Carolina 3-0 (25-21, 29-27, 25-16) on Saturday afternoon inside Memorial Coliseum to claim its sixth-straight Southeastern Conference volleyball championship, finishing the 2022 SEC season with a 15-3 record in league matches. Senior Azhani Tealer once again led the way for the Wildcats, as she hammered home 16 kills on a .520 hitting percentage. She also contributed two blocks. Two other Wildcats also had double-digit kills, as Adanna Rollins and Reagan Rutherford each had 11 terminations. Rollins padded the stat sheet with eight digs, six blocks, and an ace. Rutherford also added four digs and a block. As a team, Kentucky's offense fired on all cylinders Saturday afternoon. Emma Grome dished out 44 assists and ran the offense to the tune of a .366 hitting percentage. The Wildcats registered 50 kills in just three sets, marking just the fourth time the Wildcats eclipsed the half-century mark in a sweep this season. In addition to the double-digit trio of Tealer, Rollins, and Rutherford, Erin Lamb contributed six kills, while Elise Goetzing and Bella Bell had four and two, respectively.

UK AT THE SEC CHAMPIONSHIPS

Predating the run of dominance in the Southeastern Conference by the Florida Gators during the 1990s, the Kentucky Wildcats set the standard of play in the conference during the '70s and '80s. From 1979 to 1989, the Wildcats won five SEC regular-season titles that preceded five SEC tournament championships. On two more occasions the Cats were the SEC Tournament runners-up, making 1981, 1982, 1985 and 1986 the only years during that 11-year span in which the Cats did not compete in the tournament's title match. While falling short of the championship match in those four seasons, UK was a three-time consolation champion ('82, '85, '86).

In the inaugural SEC Tournament of 1979, UK swept the competition behind Kim Clay and her first of three SEC All-Tournament selections, as the Cats won their first of two straight SEC tourney titles. With 1980 serving as the last year for the tournament's double-elimination format, UK successfully defended its home court against five opponents to win the crown.

UK claimed both regular season and tournament championship honors in 1983 with Marsha Bond leading the way and earning her third SEC All-Tournament team honors. Karolyn Kirby was also named to the All-Tournament team in '83. The Cats lost in the championship match in 1984 after finishing the regular season second in the conference. During these two years, the SEC Tournament featured just the top four teams and required just two wins to earn the title.

In 1987 and '88, the Cats capped off their fourth and fifth perfect SEC regular seasons by sweeping through the tournament each time. Laura Linder and Kim Thompson were named to the All-Tournament team on both occasions as head coach Kathy DeBoer's program reached elite status in college volleyball.

Although the Wildcats have not played in the championship match since 1989, a return to those previous days of glory appears within reach under second-year head coach Craig Skinner. The Cats posted their best league record since the 1993 season with a 10-6 mark in 2005.

The University of Kentucky is one of only four member institutions to earn multiple SEC Volleyball tournament titles and its five tournament championships are second only to Florida's 11.

Following the 2005 season, the league's coaches voted to play home-and-home series with each opponent instead of participating in a conference tournament.
