1. Base Fee of \$2,000 per registration

2. Proposal regulation change to Section 4900 in Title 3 of the Code of Regulations from \$900 to \$2,000 per registration.

Reasons for Proposed Registration Fee

- The funds generated from the \$2,000 registration fee would cover the costs for county agreements and lift the burden from the counties and the likelihood of banning hemp.
- It is a small step towards the program becoming self-sustainable.
- The registration fee can be reevaluated 6-12 months after regulation is in effect with new registration fee and adjust, as necessary.

Potential Impacts Due Lack of Funding

- Currently limited amounts of reserves are being borrowed from other CDFA programs.
 - All borrowed monies must be repaid with 1% interest
- Reduce budget for County Contract Agreements → Reduction of program activities → Federal and state compliance issues
 - CDFA: rulemaking, board meetings, training and support for counties, and public outreach
 - Counties: registration, regulatory enforcement, and public outreach
- CDFA may raise fees despite of board recommendation
 - Obligation to establish a registration fee to cover actual costs
 - Delays in fee increases will result in higher fees later

Proposed State Legislation for Hemp

Senate Bill (SB) 292

- Introduced by Senator Wilk on February 1, 2021
- SB 292 proposes legislative changes related to industrial hemp cultivation

Assembly Bill (AB) 45

- Introduced by Assembly Member Aguiar-Curry on December 7, 2020
- AB 45 proposes changes to the Health and Safety Code to clarify the requirements and enforcement for manufacturers of dietary supplements, food, beverages, cosmetics, and pet food that contain industrial hemp

Senate Bill (SB) 235

- Introduced by Senator Allen (Assembly Member Aguiar-Curry as Principal coauthor) on January 19, 2021

Status of California State Regulatory Plan for Hemp Cultivation

- •USDA established the interim final rule on October 31, 2019.
- •CDFA submitted proposed state plan based on the interim final rule to USDA for review and approval on September 17, 2020.
- •USDA published the final rule on January 15, 2021, which took effect on March 22, 2021.
- •CDFA is communicating and coordinating with USDA to amend the proposed state plan based on final rule. CDFA is also developing proposed regulations to harmonize with the final rule.
- •Once CA's state plan is approved, the following sections will take effect:
 - Amendments to FAC Section 81000, related to definitions
 - FAC Section 81004.5, related to registration requirements for established agricultural research institutions
 - FAC Section 81012, related to violations

Additional Program Activities
