PRIVACY ACT STATEMENT

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We do not collect personal information for any purpose other than to respond to you. If you choose to provide us with personal information - like filling out a Contact Us form with an e-mail address and submitting it to us through the website - we use that information to respond to your message and to help us get you the information you have requested. We only share the information you give us with another government agency if your question relates to that agency, or as otherwise required by law. www.dcpas.osd.mil never collects information or creates individual profiles for commercial marketing.

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For site security purposes and to ensure that this service remains available to all users, this government computer system employs software programs to monitor network traffic to identify unauthorized attempts to upload or change information, or otherwise cause damage.

Except for authorized law enforcement investigations, no other attempts are made to identify individual users or their usage habits.
